1995 World Class Awards: Charting the Year's Progress



For 13 years, *PC World* has presented its World Class awards to the year's most outstanding products and companies. This year, 66 products, compa-

nies, and services earn World Class honors, in categories ranging from best business desktop PC to best online service (see "Best Products of 1995").

Much has changed since our 1994 awards. Last year's World Class desktop PC, for example, was Gateway's P4D-66, a 486DX2-66 system. This time, our panel of experts chose two high-powered systems as World Class winners: for best business PC, Dell's Dimension XPS P90, a Pentium-90 system that dominated *PC World*'s Top 20 charts for most of the year; for best home PC (a new category this year), Micron's P90 Home MPC, a Pentium-90 system with built-in multimedia.

Advances are evident in other hardware categories, too. In notebooks, Toshiba's T4900CT, based on a Pentium-75, succeeds last year's winner, the IBM ThinkPad 755C, which ran on a DX4-75. On the graphics front, the Diamond Stealth 64 DRAM, a 64bit accelerator board, takes over from last year's winner, the 32-bit Diamond Viper. This year's awards also include the first affordable color laser printer, Hewlett-Packard's Color LaserJet.

Hardware Pulls Out in Front

While hardware awards went to a number of new products, the 1995 software winners present a very different picture. Once again, Microsoft swept the awards for business applications, with its word processor, spreadsheet, database, and office suite all at the top of their respective classes this year. For the second year in a row, Microsoft Encarta wins for best reference CD-ROM. Also for the second year, Broderbund's Just Grandma and Me wins as best children's game. More often than not, last year's software winners come out on top again this time a tribute to their quality but also an indication of a broader phenomenon.

Both aspects of this year's World Class awards—powerful changes in hardware, less innovation in software reflect the state of the PC marketplace. Part of the stall in software is due to the delay of Windows 95. But typically, innovation in software lags behind developments in hardware. New class-

es of hardware generally spur sweeping changes in operating systems and applications, often ushering in new interfaces and capabilities. The changeover from command-line DOS to graphical Windows, for ex-

ample, did not begin in earnest until 486- and 386-based PCs had effectively displaced slower 286 machines (and until the third major revision of Windows finally got things right).

As impressive as advances in PC hardware have been this year, the advances we can expect in the coming year will be stunning. On the horizon: affordable desktop PCs based on Intel's P6 chip, which at 133 MHz is expected to run roughly twice as fast as today's Pentium-90. Part of the P6's power will be devoted to standard CPU tasks. Spare bandwidth-and there will be plenty-will go to processing video, 3-D graphics, picture manipulation, and voice. Likewise, graphics boards will incorporate 3-D graphics, video, and MPEG accelerators. Communications speed will accelerate rapidly as well-to 56 or 64 kilobits per second. This summer, for

example, CompuServe and Prodigy will introduce 64-kbps ISDN access in various areas of the country.

Software Innovation Close Behind?

The wild card is software. Windows 95 is slated to ship in late August. Certain capabilities built into the operating system—true multitasking and multithreading—will take advantage of new hardware. With luck, the operating system will also provide a stable, robust platform for new 32-bit applications.

But it would be a waste of processing power to simply do the same things we do now, just faster. What we need are new types of applications, radical im-

> provements to existing apps, and more realistic environments—in everything from geographic databases to presentation software and games—that harness the new class of hardware. We've begun to glimpse this type of change during the past two years as multimedia has caught on. We've also learned that ill-executed efforts will be a given; software that delivers a rich experience and vastly better ease of use will take time.

> For now, we congratulate this year's World Class winners—proven products that we rely on today. Next year, we look forward to recognizing new hardware and software that builds on and goes beyond this year's successes.



Cynics Never Prosper

Your feature "Buyer Beware: Inflated Claims, Unmet Promises" [*Top of the News*, May] was a marvelous piece of reporting. I was appalled by the cynicism described by Rich Sorkin of Creative Labs: "Until consumers are willing to spend what they do in the consumer audio market, you won't see the manufacturers [providing verifiable performance data for PC-based products]."

If this statement accurately represents PC companies' attitude about their responsibilities and obligations to consumers, those companies won't survive long in the global marketplace. The U.S. auto industry learned that in the nick of time. PC customers are more savvy and less forgiving than are car buyers, as the folks at Intel recently discovered.

Compared to some of the excellent audio gear available today at reasonable prices, PC audio products don't deserve to be priced higher. In fact, your test results suggest they are grossly overpriced. When even an analog cassette deck can outperform a digital audio device like a sound board, something is terribly wrong. Small wonder these companies feel the need to lie to us about specifications.

The living trust mania, like many fads, is largely based on ignorance. Even if a will is not in dispute and there are no pursuing creditors, probate is not a waste of time and money. If a will isn't probated, heirs may be unable to get a title policy if they wish to sell an inherited house. Banks and stockbrokers may refuse to turn over assets.

If a will is undisputed and there are no creditors, some states provide for a simple probate. Probate in those cases may be less costly and burdensome than a living trust. Whether a living trust or a will best serves a client depends on many factors. Determining those factors and weighing their importance can be complicated. *Thomas John Fisher*;



Consumers today shop for CPUs with the same savvy bargaining skills as they do for TVs and automobiles. Many returns to PC manufacturers are systems that customers purchased, took home, and tried out for a few days but decided to return because they found a better deal somewhere else.

Second, software problems and conflicts are a major source of questions from consumers. PC manufacturers spend a great amount of time helping consumers work through problems that have nothing to do with the operating functions of the hardware. When your PC does not work correctly, who do you call, Microsoft or Compaq?

Also, Furger's article does not address the unique problems direct PC vendors face when working with consumers on returns. With "build to order" fast becoming the norm, a consumer can purchase a fully loaded PC with numerous options, gut it, and return it within 30 days. The vendor must take the time to open up the unit and make sure that everything is inside, yet the company is obligated to credit the customer's credit card as long as the company has received the returned product.

Finally, a PC manufacturer's attempt to reduce returns by adding restocking fees and charging for help with Windows is a business necessity, not an unwarranted attempt to abuse customers. *Robert A. Goldstein, Houston*

PC User Groups: Ten Reasons to Sign Up Today



Let's play a game of free association. I say "PC user group," you say... If you've never attended a user group meeting, terms like "nerd" and "computer

junkie" might immediately jump to mind. But you don't have to be a hobbyist or a computer professional to join one of the roughly 10,000 user groups in the U.S. and Canada. Ranging in size from as few as 3 members to as many as 20,000, these organizations have something for everyone—from small-business owners to retirees and families hoping to get the most out of their new home computers.

There's no substitute for actually going out and seeing firsthand what your local group has to offer. So, to get you out the door, here are ten great reasons to join a user group, culled from the people who should know---user group members themselves.

1. Hardware and software support. One of the hallmarks of PC user groups is the willingness of the more experienced members to lend a hand to newcomers and get them up to speed. Just about every group has an informal technical support staff, composed of technically savvy members who volunteer their time to answer questions about hardware and software products that they're familiar with. Volunteers' home and work phone numbers are typically published in the group's newsletter (try getting that kind of service through the support plan offered by your software company). The call is free, and chances are the person at the other end of the line will know just as much as the software representative.

2. Industry execs up close and personal. If you like the idea of interrogating hardware and software company executives about everything from buggy products to lousy service, then you'll love the monthly general meetings. Presentations by company executives, followed by free-wheeling question-and-answer sessions, are often featured. You'll get the lowdown on current versions of leading products, plus the chance to quiz executives on a subject of your choosing—like why Windows 95 is so late, or why the Pentium upgrade chip doesn't work quite right, or...

3. Really cheap software. If you can't get enough of PC World's annual survey of great software under \$50, you'll be delighted by the shareware available through your local user group. Hundreds of products are available for downloading from most user group bulletin boards; some groups even offer a different shareware program demo every month.

4. First looks at new software and hardware. User groups are among a software company's best resources when it comes to finding beta testers. Members are routinely asked to try out new products—or upgrades of existing prod-

ucts—before companies release them to the masses. Not everyone has the stomach for beta testing, but if you want to be the first person on your block to have Windows 96, this may be the ticket.

5. The inside scoop on local stores. Thinking about buying a locally built clone, but need some advice on where to shop—or which stores to avoid? Look no further, user group members will fill you in on just about any PC store in town—from the mom-and-pop shops to the computer superstores. Don't be surprised if members even throw in suggestions on mail-order companies for good measure.

6. Tips and tricks galore. Whether you are interested in using your PC to publish a newsletter or manage your investments, chances are your local user's organization has a special interest group for you. SIGs are a great way to brainstorm problems, learn what's new in PCs, and become an expert on a specific application or class of products. And if your local group doesn't have the SIG that you're looking for, ask around—chances are that you'll be able to find it—or you could start the SIG yourself.



U.S. Robotics Sportster V.34 modems

Bug: Sportster owners have reported a problem that's come to be known by the colorful monlker "spiral death

syndrome" on the Usenet news group comp.dcom.modems. Under certain line conditions, if your modem first connected to another V.34 modem at a speed greater than 21,600 bps and less than 28,800 bps, it may gradually fall back to a rate as low as 9600 bps but never return to its original connect speed.

To check for the problem, try downloading a large compressed file from a fairly distant **BBS or online service (closer connections** will tend to connect at 28,800 bps). At the beginning of the download, press +++ (slowly) to switch the modem into command mode, then enter atl6. The modem should display a screenful of connection information, including speed. V.34 connections will display two numbers (such as '26400/ 26400'). The first is the receive speed, the second the send speed. Enter ato to return to terminal mode. After the transfer has completed, enter command mode and check the speed again. If the rate is noticeably slower (such as 14400/26400), your modem may have the problem.

Workaround: U.S. Robotics says it is aware of the problem reports and has assigned two engineers to try to isolate and verify the bug. Meanwhile, you can prevent the problem by disabling fallback with the undocumented AT command s15=2. Although you could store this setting in the

modem's nonvolatile RAM (using the command ats15=2&w), making it a default for all connections, fallback is actually a good thing under most line conditions. A better plan is to identify the connections during which the undesired fallback usually occurs and add **s15=2** to the communication application's dialing string.



I Needed Help, They Wanted Money

recently purchased my first computer—a Compaq Presario CDS 924. I bought it because of Compaq's reputation for service, reliability, and upgradability. My problems began almost immediately with numerous General Protection Faults. After several calls, I finally got the problem solved when a technician told me to change Windows settings.

The next problem occurred when I tried to enable 32-bit disk access in Windows. I wasn't successful, When I called Compaq this time, they initially wouldn't let me talk to a technical support person unless I gave them my Visa or MasterCard number first. I complained and eventually got through to technical support. But nobody could give me the advice I needed. After being transferred and put on hold, I was told by a technician that my Presario was not a local bus system, and that 32-bit disk access wasn't possible. I was also told that since there weren't any local bus expansion slots, it wasn't even possible to upgrade to obtain the 32-bit access.

Basically, 1 am very disappointed with Compaq and its Presario computer. I've contacted Compaq to approve a

refund through the retailer where I purchased the system.

Editor's note: We contacted Compaq regarding Read's problems and learned he was free to return his Presario to the retail outlet he bought it from at any time. The representative we spoke to explained that while Compaq sells local bus systems and systems upgradable to local bus, the Presario is not one of them. It is not necessary, however, to have a local bus computer to run Windows 95. A local bus computer would give better performance, as it would for any operating system or application.

As for the technical support problems, Compaq announced in January 1995 that it would charge \$35 to answer technical questions about software not made by Compaq. This includes Microsoft's Windows and DOS programs, as well as other software that may be ordered preinstalled on the computer. Compaq does not charge to answer hardware questions, questions about TabWorks (an interface included with all Compaq machines), or questions about software installation and configuration. And it doesn't charge corporate accounts for technical support.

When you reach Compaq's technical support line, you may be asked to present a credit card number before your question is answered. If you feel the question has to do with hardware, with installation or configuration, or with a Compaq software product, say so when you get a technician on the phone. The technician will not automatically charge you just because you give a credit card number.

Compaq is not the only company that charges for software technical support. Of the few hardware manufacturers that offer detailed, instructional support on the software programs that come bundled on their computers, most—IBM PC Direct and

Dell, for example—charge for the service. And almost every software company already charges to answer questions about its software—after a grace period.

If you don't want to pay for technical support, check your documentation or go online for help. But if you are desperate to get a problem resolved, the \$35 that Compaq charges may not be too onerous. The fee includes whatever it takes—even if that's more than one phone call—to get your questions answered.

On the Software Side

bought Stacker 4.0 because I heard it was a good program. Then one day my computer crashed and I called Stac Electronics for help. To my surprise, when I typed in my serial number (as directed by the voicemail system that answered the phone), I was told that my period of free service had expired and I would have to pay a fee to get my questions answered.

Editor's note: We forwarded Bedoya's letter to Stac Electronics for a response. A company representative confirmed that 90 days after the first call to technical support, Stac begins charging for telephone support (though online and fax-on-demand support is still free.) According to the Stac representative, Bedoya placed his first call to technical support about three months before the call he reported to us. That's when the clock started ticking on his free support plan. Because Bedoya was surprised by and unhappy with the charge, Stac gave him a free upgrade to the latest version of Multimedia Stacker for Windows and DOS. With that upgrade he will be eligible for another 90 days of support. For more information on technical support policies and trends, see "The Hidden Cost of Tech Support" in the May issue.

And When the Support is Free?

In March 1994 I purchased a Gateway 2000 P5-66 based on *PC World*'s superb review of the product. 'Ioday, I regret not taking more stock in *PC World*'s continued warnings about Gateway's technical support. It has gone from barely tolerable (a typical 15-minute wait on the support line) to intolerable. I have concluded that Gate-



way has shut down the incoming technical support lines. All I get is a message saying, "Call back; all technicians are busy."

I will not buy from Gateway again. Perry Jacobson, Murrietta, California

Editor's note: While Gateway does not charge for technical support, its long hold times and difficulty of getting through are legendary. According to our Reliability and Service surveys, the average caller's waiting time for Gateway is 13 minutes (the industry average is 9 minutes). The time it takes to speak to a person who can help you is 34 hours (industry average is 25 hours); the time to get a problem resolved is 11 days (industry average is 9 days).

We spoke to Wendell Watson, corporate communications manager for Gateway. He told us the company is in the midst of redesigning its technical support department,

which should somewhat alleviate the problem. In November 1994, the company opened a new Kansas City, Missouri, facility-which now has nearly 1000 employees-so it could bring in new sales and technical personnel (the employee pool in North Sioux City, South Dakota, was tapped out). Gateway has hired an engineering expert to redesign the technical support department, and the company has beefed up the phone system. "I think it will go a long way toward fixing the problem," says Watson. "But as soon as we make the service better, more people will call us-rather than calling someone who is charging for the support." Despite the current trend, Gateway has no plans to charge for technical support.

Aces for Saturday Support

While I was trying to connect a faxmodem to my Acer computer, I (or the software) corrupted all 5000 files on my computer. I panicked and called Acer. This happened on Saturday, so I wasn't expecting much help. I was very wrong. The people at Acer spent most of Saturday and part of Sunday helping me. Even when I got frustrated and mad, they didn't. The company is even sending me a repair kit to fix what we could not solve over the phone. I would have been totally lost without Acer's help and probably would have spent a lot of money to have the machine fixed. If the comments of people like me who use the products out there mean anything, I think Acer should be moved up the list of ratings and the word spread that Acer is an excellent computer company and it makes an excellent machine.







Upgrading to Windows 95

n the constantly changing universe of personal computer technology, there are three fundamental precepts. First: Today's state-of-theart system is tomorrow's doorstop. Second: When Microsoft upgrades an operating system, even the most resistant among us—sooner or later—must follow suit. Third: Facing change is rarely easy.

And confronted with the upcoming release of Windows 95, PC users and information systems managers everywhere are gnawing their fingernails. This mother of all software upgrades promises plenty but also seems risky. Its brand-new interface, for example, is supposed to get novice users up and running quickly, while experienced users will reportedly get more power from their PCs. But will Win 95 also unlock a Pandora's box of problems? And how do you get a company full of PC users to make the switch in anything close to an organized fashion?

This month Steve Kaiser, information systems manager for Seed and Berry, a Seattle patent, trademark, and copyright law firm that has been working with a beta version of the product since September 1994, offers words of wisdom for upgrading to the new operating system. — Ed.

The Parent Trap

A good information systems manager is like a good parent—watchful without being overprotective. As an IS manager, I must protect corporate information systems and equipment, while relaxing the controls enough to let employees become productive, responsible users.

The company I work for, Seed and Berry, is a 33-year-old, 120-employee law firm. I'm responsible for managing a network of 115 486-based PCs that store, route, and process nearly 100,000 documents for 2500 clients. Besides answering questions, resolving problems, and organizing training, I also install, configure, and upgrade systems and software—usually doing the latter over long nights and weekends. And in my spare time, I'm supposed to plan a technology strategy for tomorrow.


Because our firm has doubled in size since we switched from DOS to Windows 3.1 four years ago, the IS workload has also doubled. Accordingly, I'm always encouraging users to become more self-sufficient. Our users

include busy attorneys, and getting them to attend software training classes is a challenge.

Other than our expert users, most Seed and Berry employees learn only the basic functions of Word, Excel, or Access—whatever they need for daily use. To switch printers, install a new program, or create a Windows icon for a DOS application, they call me.

Our firm is located in Seattle, where everything Microsoft does makes news. So the more computer-literate users at the firm were excited when they heard about the benefits of Windows 95: a new, friendlier interface; support for long file names; the ability to install devices such as printers, faxmodems, and scanners without fiddling with IRQs; support for 32-bit applications; faster printing; and an electronic in-box that handles faxes, E-mail, and online services.

Most exciting for me, however, was the promise that the new environment would make life easier by automating many of the tasks I handle, while putting more control into the hands of



users. Given all these potential benefits, Seed and Berry volunteered our company to be a beta test site in September 1994.

Radical Windows

Almost as soon as I loaded the software, I real-

ized how radically different Windows 95 is from Windows 3.1 or even Windows for Workgroups. Fortunately, we had already upgraded most of our hardware to 486s with at least 8MB of memory. Thus, upgrading hardware was not an issue for us. I figured we'd be able to take the new environment out for a test drive with a minimum of difficulty, but I decided to play it safe. I developed a strategy to help us make the switch and deal with any difficulties we encountered.

First, I took a good hard look at what the environment would let me administer, control, and plan. Windows 95 offers options for many administrative functions, such as requiring password

access or allowing people to share files on hard drives. So, for example, I customized the setup procedure to prevent users from seeing (or acting on) the options best reserved for the network administrator, such as the capability to change network protocol settings.

Next, I set up a pilot program, in which a core group of computer-savvy users could play with Windows 95 before anyone else. This group would use Windows 95 to perform all their normal work. If they could show that the new operating system wasn't scary, other people might become curious enough to try it.

Before installing the software, I held a few training sessions for the core group. I also made some decisions that forced people to swim. For example, Win 95 offers a choice of interfaces—the old, familiar Windows 3.1 and the new interface. In all cases, I installed only the new interface.

Once Windows 95 was installed on these early users' systems. I held regular meetings with them to discuss any problems they had run into. In all cases, the users liked the new operating system and said the transition from Windows 3.1 to Windows 95 was easy. They reported only one glitch—since fixed—a bug that mixed font sizes at random.

All in all, we have been pleased enough with our experiment to enroll in Microsoft's Preview program: As of March, we're paying \$30 per user to run the prerelease version of the software on the machines of an additional 30 users. By the time August rolls around (assuming Windows 95 is on schedule), we should have all our employees up and running on Win 95. And it has already made a difference in my work. The core group of users say they're more productive, and they call on me less frequently than before. That means I have more time to investigate new technologies and enjoy my weekends.





CD-ROM: Today's Big Sneeze?



In the early days of the film business, folks flocked to Kinetoscope parlors to squint at a state-of-the-art production: a moving image of a mustachioed fel-

low named Fred Ott silently sneezing.

New entertainment technologies are hard to resist, even in their comically stumbling beginnings. In the infancy of various media, people crowded around Victrolas to listen to scratchy recordings, adjusted their crystal sets until faraway singers crackled above the static, and peered at baseball games on TV screens so tiny the ball was virtually invisible. When a new technology is compelling enough, its limitations don't matter: The medium truly is the message.

In the computer industry, entertainment arrived with the video game. Today we chuckle at the crudeness of Pong, Space Invaders, and Donkey Kong; in their time, they seemed the height of accessible technology. After years of promise, their interactivity has now combined with other forms of information and entertainment to produce so-called multimedia, mostly in CD-ROM form. Once more we are at the beginning of an era, a time when pioneers must overlook or overcome major problems as a medium finds its way technically and creatively. All this will get better; for now we must deal with failings that may seem humorous in 10 or 20 years.

Take installation: With DOS or Windows, getting a CD-ROM to run can be more frustrating than putting up a TV antenna rotator. Disney's debacle with its CD-ROM of The Lion King

was widely reported. I've known PCsavvy people who gave up trying to install even the best-selling Myst on equipment just to the left of "standard." My least favorite recent surprise? Installing QuickTime 2.0 for Windows makes most discs using earlier versions unplayable. Imagine the user's delight in trying to figure out why a disc that ran just fine only yesterday is completely dead today! A patch is available online; it isn't perfect.

Then there are the display problems, only some of them related to the classically terrible Windows drivers. The

seven dwarfs of multimedia video are Tiny, Grainy, Fuzzy, Jerky, Blocky, Buggy, and one you can't see at this resolution. I've spotted exceptions: The otherwise lame Blown Away game had full-screen video clips

that were surprisingly good—for a CD-ROM. But the sad truth is that digital video demands a medium designed for it, and that medium is a few years away.

Images: Handle With Care

Since developers insist on producing for the least common denominator— 640 by 480 pixels and 256 colors—even still images require careful handling. Some discs succeed: The travel photos in Medio's Safari and the paintings in Corbis's A Passion for Art look particularly good, except when they include large areas of continuous tones. Still, higher resolutions and more colors are desperately needed.

So are better interfaces. For now, no two are alike, except in their awfulness. Personal pet peeves: disabling the keyboard so you can't use the <Page Up> and <Page Down> keys to move through text, and not indexing reference material so you can search it. Offenders are legion. Some vendors apparently believe that anything at all can sell on CD-ROM, but they are beginning to have a rude awakening. Many titles, like GTE Interactive's awful Vitsic series, are essentially videotapes transferred with all the interactivity (and none of the resolution) of...well, a videotape. Many, many books have been turned into CD-ROMs; with the exception of some reference titles, the discs almost always cost more and are almost always inferior.

Voyager deserves special mention for its titles, which—like my favorite, Dazzeloids—often express a personal

> point of view, all too rare in this age of corporate media domination. Microsoft, the epitome of corporate domination, produces pretty good CD-ROM titles, too. Cinemania is useful if incomplete; good as they are, Microsoft's baseball and basketball references would be better if they were indexed. But no publisher's logo guarantees quality. Both Voyager and Microsoft have delivered their share of clunkers.

> This technology will undoubtedly improve. But in the meantime, we can expect to see modern counterparts of Fred Ott's sneezes—and worse. As with any medium, the item in shortest supply is the one thing technology can't replace: creativity.

Case in point: Intel has just introduced a Pentium that clocks in at 133 MHz, bringing to an end the 120-MHz model's brief reign. Just two months after our first look at 120-MHz Pentium PCs (*Top of the News*, May), we're putting preproduction 133-

> MHz systems from Dell, Gateway 2000, and Micron through their paces.

There's no need to panic if you've invested in a 120-MHz machine. These new 133-MHz PCs, starting at around \$4000 in the configurations we tested, deliver a performance edge that's modest, not monumental—much smaller than the 20 to 30 percent advance the fastest Pentium-120 systems achieve over typical 100-MHz products. The price differential is modest too. Dell's 133-MHz system costs \$275 more than an identically configured 120-MHz version; Micron's is \$300 more, and Gateway's is \$400 more.

Using Intel's clock-multiplying technology, the 133-MHz Pentium runs at twice the speed of its 66-MHz system board, or about 11 percent faster than a Pentium-120 (which runs at two times the speed of a 60 MHz system board).

Our Windows and DOS benchmark suite indicates a greater performance boost


PAYING THE PRICE FOR WIN 95: The cost of upgrading to Windows 95 could be as high as \$1600 per user, say industry analysts. The direct cost will be less than \$500 per workstation: about \$80 per machine for Windows 95 itself, plus \$60 for technician labor and \$350 for user training, says Dataquest senior analyst Rob Enderle. But when you add the cost of buying Windows 95 versions of application software (assuming each machine uses four packages), the price could jump by another \$1100. On the other hand, a new study from the Gartner Group projects companies can save \$1180 per year per user in support costs by using Windows 95 instead of Windows 3.1. "Windows 95 is a heck of a lot cheaper to support," says Dataquest's Enderle. "The operating system is designed to be installed from a central server, along with the applications." -J. A.

WIN 95 ADD-ON: Microsoft intends to ship a pack of add-ons for Windows 95 shortly after the operating system becomes available. Microsoft Plus will include an enhanced compression utility and Microsoft's Internet Jumpstart kit. Drive Space, Microsoft's existing compression utility, will be enhanced to support hard disks up to 2GB, and the user can now set compression levels. Not all Pentium-133 systems will sport these components, either: USA Flex and AT&T are both introducing units that won't use the Triton chip set or EDO RAM. For USA Flex, it's simply a matter of the chip sets and memory being in short supply; when they're more plentiful, the

company will introduce a Pentium-133 PC that uses them, AT&T, however, chose not to use them because the Triton chip set can't support dual-processor PCs such as its Globalyst 730, and EDO RAM doesn't offer parity memory checking.

Of the Pentium-133s, the Micron P133 Millennia and the Gateway 2000 P5-133XL finished neck and neck overall, with the Dell Dimension XPS P133c slightly be-

> hind. The Micron and Gateway tied statistically for the honor of finishing our test suite in the fastest time ever, each around 10 percent ahead of the Dell. But the Dell's weakness was almost entirely with DOS applications; look only at our Windows bench-

marks, and speed differences among the three systems aren't significant.

These systems offer a variety of creature comforts that help explain their price tags. For \$4498, Micron's P133 Millennia provides a 1.6GB hard drive, one of the first 6X CD-ROM drives on the market, a 64bit Diamond Stealth video card with 2MB of VRAM, a 15-inch monitor, a Sound Blaster 16 sound card, Jensen speakers, and a 28.8-kbps modem. Gateway 2000's P5-133XL at \$4399 gives you a 1.6GB hard drive, a quad-speed CD-ROM drive that handles three discs at a time, a 64-bit video card with 2MB of VRAM, a 17-inch monitor, a wavetable sound card, Altec-Lansing speakers, and a 28.8-kbps modem.

The \$3999 Dell Dimension XPS P133c boasts a 17-inch monitor, a 1GB hard drive, U.S. Robotics' V.34 28.8-kbps modem, Creative Labs' high-end Sound Blaster AWE32 wavetable sound card, Yamaha speakers, and a quad-speed CD-ROM drive. This Dell system comes with Number Nine's new FX Motion video card-a 64-bit video card with 2MB of VRAMwhile the 120-MHz Dell we tested sported Number Nine's higher-end Imagine card, a 128-bit model with 4MB of VRAM. The video card may explain why the 133-MHz Dell lagged behind the Micron and Gateway in DOS applications and was actually slower than the 120-MHz Dell in our benchmarks using 1-2-3 for DOS.

While Dell concedes that the FX Motion may cause lagging performance with DOS-based applications, the company says it performs comparably to the Imagine at most resolutions and color depths. The card has one compelling feature the Imagine lacks: built-in support for the MPEG motion video compression standard, which

lets the Dell play back full-screen MPEG video clips that appear nearly as crisp and smooth as broadcast TV images—a feat that previously required a separate MPEG card such as Sigma Designs Real Magic. The Micron's Diamond Stealth card, when equipped with an option card, can also play back MPEG video clips.

If you find these systems' prices intim-

idating, bear in mind that PC manufacturers may initially be able to obtain only limited Pentium-133 chips and are likely to put them in fully loaded big-ticket PCs like the ones we tested. Both Dell and Gateway plan to use the chip only in highend models at first,



but Micron will offer a \$2799 Pentium-133 configuration aimed at home users.

The Pentium-133's arrival is likely to help lower the prices of PCs based on other, more plentiful Pentium models. Work-Group Technologies, a Hampton, New Hampshire, research firm, predicts the average price of Pentium PCs will plunge by \$600 between June and September, in part be-

Now comes the hard part: Will PowerPC price/performance be strong enough to challenge Intel's relentless improvements to its x86 family? The latest Pentium, clocked at

133 MHz, is slated to be followed in months by a 150-MHz version and the next-generation P6.

Another hurdle facing PowerPC system vendors: The only applica-

tions that can perform competitively against Intel systems are 32-bit programs compiled for the PowerPC version of NT. Though programs written for DOS and Windows 3.1 will execute on Power-PCs, they have to run through an emulator (provided to Microsoft by Insignia Solutions)—software that mimics a 286 chip.

IBM says it expects DOS and 16-bit Windows programs to run at about onethird their normal rates, meaning that a 100-MHz PowerPC would run x86 software at roughly the same speed as a 33-MHz 486. The success of the PowerPC thus depends on availability of new 32-bit applications—especially graphics and multimedia programs that take advantage of the PowerPC's fast floating-point unit.

System Choices

Three suppliers will lead in early Power-PCs: IBM, Motorola, and start-up Fire-Power Systems. Most PowerPCs will come from one of these firms, though sold under many labels. A group of Taiwanese vendors, including DTK, will also sell systems. Neither U.S. nor Taiwanese models will be compatible with Apple's PowerMacs.

Motorola's Computer Group said last fall it would sell PowerPC systems running Windows NT. The company's PowerStack systems are set to ship as soon as Microsoft releases the new Windows NT 3.51.

Are you more likely to purchase PowerPCs now that Windows NT is available for them? "That may be a good reason to buy them," Fernholz says. "We'll take a look when IBM re-

leases machines." Until now, IBM's PowerPC systems have run only AIX, the company's UNIX variant. But Fernholz says Windows NT makes PowerPC systems more appealing to more companies. He would like to make Windows a universal platform for the 1100 users at his office, who now use both PCs and Macs. PowerPCs running Windows NT could replace PowerMacs, he says. If PowerPCs deliver more performance than Pentiums at comparable prices, they'll be compelling. The extra speed will help multimedia, desktop publishing, and future needs such as teleconferencing.

IBM's reliability and support make the company Fernholz's favorite PC vendor: A few months after IBM ships PowerPCs running NT, he'll buy a few for his power users. They'll test them using various applications, judging performance and ease of use. If the systems do well and prices are good, he'll buy more. "It's great to see the competition for Intel," Fernholz says. "It makes everyone innovate quickly."

- Fernholz's tips for those considering PowerPC systems:
- Examine performance. See how PowerPC speed compares to Pentium speed for applications you use.
- 2. Assess needs. Which applications require high performance ?
- 3. Think big. Buy from a big-name vendor to ensure good support.
- 4. Run trials. Test a few systems using your most demanding apps.

66, based on a 66-MHz 603 processor, lists for \$2611, with 256K secondary cache, 16MB RAM, a 540MB hard drive, a 2X CD-ROM drive, three PCI slots, and ethernet. The DT604-100, based on a 100-MHz 604 chip, is \$3911 in the same configuration. Server models built on the 66-MHz 603 and 100-MHz 604 cost \$3996 and \$5996, respectively. Motorola hasn't disclosed names of any system licensees.

FirePower has identified a few customers. IPC Technologies plans to ship in June

a \$3995 100-MHz 604 system, the Austin PowerPlay 604, with 256K cache, 16MB RAM, a 540MB hard drive, a 2X CD-ROM, and a 15-inch monitor. Canon is set to announce three systems—a 603-based notebook and single- and dual-processor 604 desktops—in mid-June for delivery this summer. Pricing was not available.

IBM is mum about its long-awaited PowerPCs, slated for June introduction, but sources promise a line of desktops and notebooks based on 603s and 604s, with configurations comparable to Pentiums. (IBM previewed a 132-MHz 604 in April.)

DTK has an entry-level 80-MHz 601 desktop; with 16MB RAM, a 1GB hard drive, and a 15-inch monitor, it will sell for \$2400 and ship in June. DTK is working on a 100-MHz 604 system for third-quarter delivery but wouldn't disclose pricing.

Desperately Seeking Software

Windows NT 3.51 is set to ship in June, but little PowerPC software is announced. A PowerPC version of Microsoft Office Standard, combining 32-bit Word and Excel with a 16-bit PowerPoint, should ship by early August. Novell plans an NT release of PerfectOffice in early 1996, while Lotus has no plans now to port SmartSuite.

The paucity of PowerPC programs may be relieved by shipment of Windows 95, says Phil Pompa, director of marketing for

> Motorola's RISC microprocessor division in Austin, Texas, because Windows 95 applications are relatively easily ported to Windows NT for the PowerPC.

To win in the market, Power-PCs will need better price/performance than Pentiums, but they're starting at a disadvantage. For instance, the IPC Austin system costs \$1288 more than a

comparably configured Dell 100-MHz Pentium system (with a 4X CD-ROM drive), which means it would have to be nearly 48 percent faster to be cost-justified.

Most analysts predict the PowerPC is destined to be a niche product—suited for engineers and high-end–graphics users. Only when *PC World* has the chance to compare Pentium and PowerPC systems head-to-head will we know if the PowerPC turns out to be a Jaguar—or a jalopy.

If this sounds gruesome, take heart: CompuServe also plans "smart rules" technology that lets you specify what mail is vital enough to trigger a page. A message from your boss or a client could reach you instantly, but that pest down the hall will have to wait until you log in. **CompuServe** has partnerships with pager companies MobileComm, Page-Mart, PageNet, and SkyTel. -L. SOFTWARE EXPANDS USES FOR **TAPE DRIVES:** A new program from 3M and PGSoft lets you use a tape drive for more than data backup: The software fools your PC into thinking the tape is a CD-ROM drive. You can store and run multimedia applications from tape. (Because tape's data transfer is typically faster than with a 4X CD-ROM, some applications may actually play better.) Tape thus becomes a practical, affordable medium for manipulating large files, such as those in imaging, desktop publishing, and multimedia. And of course, unlike CD-ROMs, tapes are rewritable. The software, expected by December, should cost around \$100. It will be compatible with leading operating systems and tape standards, including QIC, QIC-SCSI, and Travan. -L. M.

Voice/Data Modem Short on Software

TEST DRIVE 🕨

Not all that long ago a modem was simply a

modem. But times have changed. Built-in fax, voice mail, and speakerphone capabilities are becoming commonplace. Now, a new feature is making its appearance: the ability to handle both data and voice traffic.

The simplest and most inexpensive technology, VoiceView from Radish Communications Systems, will soon be standard in many modems. VoiceView lets a modem switch back and forth between voice and data during a phone call, promising uses in collaborative work, remote help-desk support, and online merchandising. But after testing the first modem that includes VoiceView, we find the technology's not all it's cracked up to be, at least for now.

We tested Boca Research's MultiMedia Voice Modern With VoiceView, an internal 14.4-kbps modern that lists for \$154, including SofNet's FaxWorks 3.0 software, which provides extensive fax, data, and voice features. Setting up the modem is a breeze, with clearly marked jumpers and software that checks for free interrupts and COM ports. VoiceView capability is built into the modem's Rockwell chip set and requires no special enabling. (To ensure broad availability Radish has licensed VoiceView to Rockwell and AT&T for their widely used modem chip sets.)

Online Revelation

Switching between voice and data during a phone call sounds appealing. But off-theshelf Windows applications don't work automatically with VoiceView. For now, you're limited to TalkShop, a program supplied by Radish and bundled by Boca and other sellers of VoiceView modems.

As simple and low-cost as TalkShow Is, however, vendors with limited resources may not implement both it and the Internet's redhot World Wide Web and so may opt only for a Web presence.

On June 5 Radish announced that three companies had signed up for the Voice-View marketplace: Blockbuster Music, 1-800-Flowers, and RR Donnelley & Sons. Blockbuster appears as a button on the TalkShop menu; with a click you can call up a list of the top 20 albums in any music category, view an album cover, read the list of tracks, and even hear 30-second sound samples. And, of course, you can buy.

RR Donnelley offers Metromail, a 900number service that lets you conduct small-scale demographic research. This sort of function makes VoiceView appeal-


Besides electronic commerce, current uses for TalkShop include exchanging business cards, sending and receiving files, and plaving a game called Salvo, Perhaps the most promising application is remote technical support, which Jerry Michalski, managing editor of the Release 1.0 newsletter, calls "a perfect use of this new technology." Michalski expects that once VoiceView-capable modems begin shipping, the demand for applications will grow. Radish surely must hope that he's right, because it'll take more than today's TalkShop, technical support, and file and business card swapping to set Voice-View technology apart from other modes of interactive communication.



NUMEROUS MODEMS SUPPORTING RADISH'S VOICEVIEW TECHNOLOGY—in addition to the models listed above—will soon be available from a variety of vendors. Most of these devices will sell for the same price as today's comparable modems without VoiceView.

TalkShop focuses on what Radish hopes will be a burgeoning market for electronic merchandising, where you will dial in to online "stores" that use audio, text, and graphics to present their wares. But Voice-View needs more than just TalkShop software, and TalkShop needs more useful features. For instance, it would be handy to send slides directly from a presentation graphics package and then switch back to voice to discuss the presentation.

Developers who want to make applications VoiceView compatible must obtain a license from Radish and add code to their programs. This problem will lessen with Windows 95: Microsoft and Radish have agreed to build VoiceView support into the Microsoft Telephony Application Programming Interface (TAPI). But not all Windows 95 applications will have VoiceView compatibility immediately. A spokesperson for Delrina Technology, for instance, says the initial Windows 95 version of WinFax won't support VoiceView because "we have other things we need to do first."

Voice/Data Mélange

Collaborative applications may be better served by Digital Simultaneous Voice and Data (DSVD), a technology that lets you talk and exchange data *simultaneously*. Developed by a group of modem companies, DSVD goes beyond the technology used in analog voice/data modems already available from AT&T/Paradyne and Multi-Tech. Because DSVD is hardware only, it works transparently with any Windows application. However, it's comparatively expensive because it rides on a V.34 (28.8kbps) modem foundation and requires the addition of a digital signal processor (DSP) or special custom circuits.

At press time U.S. Robotics (USR) announced the first DSVD modem, which lists for \$399 and includes Intel's ProShare document conferencing software. By comparison, 14.4-kbps VoiceView modems will be street-priced at \$100 to \$250, and USR sells a 28.8-kbps model for \$339.

VoiceView and DSVD don't compete head-to-head, says Dataquest analyst Lisa Pelgrim. She sees VoiceView as "very important to the industry," especially in electronic commerce and applications such as technical support. Because modem makers can add VoiceView inexpensively, Pelgrim expects it to be ubiquitous. "It's like faxing capability in existing modems. Some people use it all the time, some occasionally, and some don't even know that it's there."

Justice Suit Derails Intuit Sale

In the end, the price—in every sense of the word—may simply have been too high. To the surprise of analysts and competitors, Microsoft in late May called off its controver-

sial merger with Intuit, maker of the popular Quicken personal finance package. Microsoft will go its own way with Money, which it would have spun off to Novell had the intuit deal gone through.

Microsoft chair Bill Gates said the deal was chucked because the U.S. Justice Department's suit blocking the acquisition would delay it too long. "This is a fast-paced industry experiencing lots of change," Gates said. "Progress toward realizing our goals could not wait until the government's lawsuit was resolved."

But some observers saw Microsoft's uncharacteristic backing

down in a different light. The Intuit merger, based on a stock swap, had risen in price from \$1.5 billion to more than \$2 billion since announcement of the deal. And although the software giant had squeaked through a three-year Federal Trade Commission and Justice probe into its business practices, the Intuit relationship elicited a more aggressive response from watchdogs in Washington.

In the wake of Justice's stunning decision to sue, Gates displayed typical confidence that he would not be thwarted. But the combination of Intuit's steep price and the potentially much steeper price in legal trouble for Microsoft tilted the balance.

Money's small market share could postpone Microsoft's bid to become an integrated supplier of home banking services, via The Microsoft Network. And without Microsoft's backing and resources, Intuit has to sign its own deals with financial institutions—a process Intuit chair Scott Cook says is well under way.





Customize...or Compromise?



BUYING BUILT-TO-ORDER systems has worked well for Horace Green, purchasing manager for the Austin, Texas, engineering firm Radian.

ollowing in the footsteps of Dell and Gateway 2000, companies ranging from stalwart IBM to Taiwanese newcomer Tatung are now offering customers built-to-order PCs. They aren't necessarily less expensive than machines you buy at retail and customize yourself. But for buyers who need unusual configurations and have the purchasing power, several vendors will go the distance, even preconfigure PCs for a LAN. Buyers on difficult to obtain even from custom vendors. So Green convened a group of suppliers to assess their ability—and willingness—to satisfy his specialized demands.

"We wanted a 100 percent assembled, networked computer, with both Novell [NetWare] and our software preloaded," Green says. The primary motivation, he adds, was to reduce the configuration and testing Radian had to do on new systems.

smaller budgets who need custom configurations also may be able to use this approach to reduce in-house configuration, inventory, and testing.

One such corporate buyer is Horace Green, purchasing manager for Radian, an environmental consulting and engineering firm in Austin, Texas. Radian engineers need powerhouse computers not readily available through retail channels and The price quotes Green received differed by as much as 20 percent between low and high bidders. The lowest prices came from CompuAdd, with IBM owning the high ground. More telling, Green says, were differences in attitude: "One or two [vendors] felt like we were just asking for too much." IPC Technologies (formerly Austin Computer), which Radian eventually selected for much of its desktop PC business, quoted prices in the middle of the range but offered "outstanding" service and a willingness to meet specific configuration requirements, Green says.

Who Needs It?

Built-to-order is suddenly a sexy marketing concept, but it's not for everybody. Even Radian, with its seven-figure annual PC budget, had trouble getting some vendors to address its needs. What if you're a small business or an individual looking for a custom configuration? Until now you had to assemble the pieces yourself or hire a consultant to configure and

> test your dream machine. Can build-to-order vendors take on this responsibility? PC World set out to see

how well a group of popular vendors could meet the needs of a pseudonymous buyer

seeking a completely assembled, configured, and tested machine. We requested a configuration designed to push the limits of what suppliers typically offer. The highend PC included a 100-MHz Pentium processor, 32MB of RAM, a 2GB SCSI hard drive, a 64-bit PCI graphics card with 4MB of VRAM, Microsoft Windows NT, and an assortment of multimedia boards and peripherals specified by brand name.

Our "buyer" called Dell, Gateway 2000, IBM PC Direct, IPC, and Tatung to request pricing, delivery, and support information. Vendors were not told the caller was from *PG World*.

Mixed Results

Vendors were asked to fax back firm price quotes the same day, and all promised to do so. But only Dell, IBM, and IPC sent the fax. Dell was the only vendor to meet the specification with in-stock parts, and even then, much of configuration would have been left to the buyer.

IBM had no trouble meeting our specs until it came to multimedia. IBM's 12-day delivery time also was near the longest. Tatung was willing to obtain most specified parts even if they weren't in stock, but said doing so would void its normal guarantee. Tatung also quoted the fastest delivery time but never returned a firm bid (an oversight a spokesperson attributed to growing pains). Gateway 2000 offered to

remove unwanted components and reduce the price of the machine accordingly but never responded with a firm bid.

Most other policies were consistent among the vendors, with a few notable exceptions. Tatung has the shortest tech support hours and only a one-year warranty (not on-site), whereas the others offer three-year warranties with a year of on-site service. Tatung also charges a restocking fee of up to 15 percent for returns.

The ultimate test, of course, is price, but only three vendors gave us quotes, and these were for differing configurations. IPC's bid was \$5521; Dell came in at \$6613, but when you subtract the items Dell offered that IPC could not, Dell's price was lower. IBM came in with a \$9236 bid, even without most of the advanced multimedia hardware we requested.

Other Options

To put our experiences in perspective, we shopped for a similar computer at Computer City, the Tandy-owned computer superstore chain, and at Hi-Com, a mom-andpop Houston storefront dealing in noname clone PCs.

Both Computer City and Hi-Com steered us to packaged configurations with significant feature trade-offs. If you're shopping for a high-end configuration such as ours, it may be cheaper to buy such a package and replace the cheap sound card and speakers than to build from the ground up. But this depends on your specific needs, technical skills, and time, because adding exotic components can create nightmarish configuration hassles.

Then there are the lucky businesses with the purchasing clout to establish closer ties with their computer manufacturers. Horace Green of Radian counsels that in addition to convenience, the quality of the

> relationship and ongoing service may be decisive issues. "Everybody is willing to beat the next price on the block," he says. "You have to look at other factors."



Compaq's New Lineup: Smarter Deskpros, "586" Processors

nompaq, with its largest product rollout, has introduced scores of new models in the Presario, ProLinea, and Deskpro series. Presario models, designed for small businesses and consumers, offer Pentium-class processors and quad-speed CD-ROM drives. The ProLineas buttress Compaq's midrange offerings. And the high-end Deskpros feature Compaq's new Intelligent Manageability technology, a collection of inventory and diagnostic tools designed to make the PCs easier to manage across a LAN.

The Smart PC

Compaq's Intelligent Manageability is a set of features that take much of the pain out of running a LAN. For instance, the AssetControl program creates a centralized database of all the hardware and software installed on your network's PCs-a boon to LAN administrators. AssetControl lets network gurus easily track device drivers and end-user programs running on the LAN, an important feature for monitoring

software usage and ensuring that hardware drivers are upgraded in a timely fashion.

The Fault Management feature helps minimize system shutdowns due to faulty components. Working with a number of component manufacturers, Compaq has developed a technology that allows the new Deskpros to monitor themselves for impending problems. For example, a hard drive can sense when it's about to fail, and trigger the PC to send a message to the network administrator and perform an automatic tape backup to preserve its data. Fault Management also detects problems with network adapters and monitors ambient conditions such as a PC's internal temperature.

The Deskpro XL models feature Pentium processors ranging from 60 MHz to 100 MHz. (One Deskpro model will have a 66-MHz 486DX2 processor and an optional hard drive.) Standard features include 8MB to 16MB of RAM; Compag's QVision graphics subsystem with 2MB of video RAM; a 32-bit SCSI-2 adapter; integrated Business Audio with Sound Blaster compatibility; a quad-speed CD-ROM drive; and a Vocalyst keyboard with integrated speakers. The Deskpros also have built-in networking-either an ethernet adapter integrated onto the motherboard, or an IBM token ring adapter in an ISA bus slot.

While the new ProLineas lack the built-in networking and Intelligent Manageability features of the Deskpros,

they're a solid value for business or home use. For instance, \$1999 buys a ProLinea 575 with a 75-MHz Pentium processor, 8MB of RAM, and a 420MB hard drive (the monitor costs extra).

The ProLineas (like the Presarios and Deskpros) offer hard drives that range in size from 420MB to 1GB. You can choose from three system designs: A three-slot, three-bay desktop; a four-slot, four-bay desktop; and a five-slot, fivebay minitower.

"586" for Consumer Market

In the Presario line, popular among home and small-business users, the big news is the addition of Pentium-class processors. While presumably the first new Presarios will use the Intel Pentium, future systems may use processors from NexGen and AMD. Interestingly, Compaq will not distinguish between a Presario equipped with an Intel Pentium and one equipped with another company's chip, simply using the "586" moniker for the Pentium-class Presarios, the 586/75, 586/90, and 586/ 100. Although NexGen's chips run at slower clock speeds than their Intel counterparts, they offer similar performance. AMD's Pentium-class chipcode-named K5-is scheduled to ship in 1996.

Standard features include a quad-speed CD-ROM drive and 8MB of RAM. Other CPU options include the 66-MHz 486DX2 and 100-MHz DX4.

Street prices for Presarios start in the vicinity of \$2000. For \$1849 you get a 66-MHz 486 system with 8MB of RAM, a 420MB hard drive, a quadspeed CD-ROM drive, and no monitor. At the high end, \$2999 buys you a Pentium-100-class computer with 16MB of RAM and a 1GB hard drive. -Joe Abernathy

Hot Multifunction Printers From HP, Brother, and Lexmark

ith multifunction printers, some vendors promise you everything but a set of steak knives. Although not perfect, the newest multifunction products work considerably better than previous models and save space and money in a small or home office. Hewlett-Packard's Office-Jet LX boasts a low price. Brother's MFC-4500ML provides a fast 6-page-per-minute (ppm) printer. Lexmark's Medley 4sx is the first multifunction unit to deliver color.

These devices include a printer, a plain-paper fax machine, a very low end scanner, and a convenience copier. If you bought the components separately, you'd need more

For faxing and copying, the three machines work similarly. You can use them with a dedicated fax line or with one line for both calls and fax. The HP unit's fax-modem transmits at 9600 bps: the other faxmodems transmit at 14,400 bps. You can send faxes from paper or directly from the PC. Likewise, you can store received faxes in your PC or print them. You can also set up speed-dial numbers and program the device to fax documents at a specified time. All the units provide helpful copier features, including multiple copies. The chief differences between the units are price, print speed, and color capability.

HP OfficeJet LX

Hewlett-Packard's OfficeJet set the low price for multifunction products last year, at \$799 on the street. The OfficeJet had two drawbacks: It didn't let you send faxes directly from your PC, and you couldn't scan documents into it. The new OfficeJet LX corrects those deficiencies but costs the same. Price is its major advantage.

As you'd expect from HP, print quality is excellent. The OfficeJet LX uses ink jet technology and prints at 300 by 300 dpi, or at 600 by 300 dpi with resolution enhancement to smooth edges. However, the printer works slowly, from a top speed of 3 ppm to 1 ppm in top-quality mode. An input tray holds 100 sheets. The HP has 1MB of RAM for printing and faxing and holds 24 fax pages in memory.



HEWLETT-PACKARD'S NEWEST OFFICEJET offers a low price, excellent print quality, and improved fax features.

The OfficeJet LX scanner, intended primarily for use with logos and signatures, supports resolutions up to 200 by 200 dpi. The convenience copier may save you a trip to Kinko's, but copies look fuzzier than those from office copiers.

OfficeJet owners can upgrade to LX functionality for \$119.99. Older units will require a hardware upgrade by HP. Call 800/ 772-4329 for details.

Brother MFC-4500ML

The Brother's speed is its biggest advantage. Expected to sell for \$999, Brother's MFC-4500ML provides a 6-ppm, 300-dpi laser printer. Print quality is comparable to the HP's. The Brother has a 200sheet tray and 512K of memory, which acts like 1MB with enhanced memory management. The unit holds 20 fax pages in memory, 70 pages with a memory upgrade.

The Brother's scanner supports 200-by-400-dpi resolution. On the downside, at 18 by 17 by 11 inches, it's the largest of the three multifunction units.

Lexmark Medley 4sx

Lexmark's Medley printer provides color for virtually no price premium. The Medley 4sx, which is expected to sell for \$950, measures 17.3 by 15.4 by 12 inches. (Lexmark will also offer Medleys in the \$850-to-\$900 range; one will be color upgradable.)

I wasn't able to test a Medley 4sx, but based on tests of Lexmark's ExecJet IIc, which uses the same print engine, I'd expect excellent print quality. The Medley 4sx prints at 600 by 300 dpi with smoothing technology in monochrome at 3 ppm. Color printing at 300 by 300 dpi takes 2 to 7 minutes per page. A paper tray holds 150 sheets. With 1MB of memory, the Medley 4sx stores 60 fax pages in memory; a \$229 upgrade to 4MB boosts fax storage to 258 pages. Its scanner supports 300-dpi resolution.

Creative Labs' \$170 Aero-Duet could easily be mistaken for a new Cirque du Soleil act: It's sleek and wireless, and it flies in 3-D. Aero-Duet's two ergonomic pointing devices, a mouse and a pen, work wirelessly by transmitting infrared signals to a desktop receptor, which resembles a radar dish and plugs into the PC's serial port. The receptor calculates the position of the mouse or pen, which you can use on a horizontal or 3-D plane.

The AeroDuet pointers work with a wide range of business and other applications such as WordPerfect, 1-2-3, and Excel. With 3-D mode enabled, you can lift the mouse or pen 6 inches above the desk to create sophisticated CAD drawings or play one of your favorite computer games. AeroDuet's software bundle includes the game Spectre VR, Fractal Design's Dabbler painting tutor, HSC's Digital Morph, and Kai's Power Tools.

This Duet isn't perfect, however, Since the infrared receptor requires a line-of-sight wireless link—much like a TV's remote control—desktop objects prevent the pointers from working properly. QMS Ships Lowest-Priced Color Laser

A t a groundbreaking \$4999 list price, the QMS magicolor LX brings color laser printing within reach of many previously deprived offices. This color laser costs significantly less than its main competitors, the \$7295 HP Color LaserJet and the \$8495 Xerox 4900 Color Laser.

The QMS magicolor LX makes a practical addition to a networked corporate office. Color lasers work up to nine times faster than color ink jets and produce better quality. Thermal-wax and dye-sublimation printers still provide optimal color quality, but they are either too slow for highvolume use or too expensive. When you're printing a 15page presentation in color, you need speed. This QMS zips out color at 3 to 6 pages per minute, and it prints monochrome pages at 12 ppm.

QMS has addressed the problems of print quality that plagued the magicolor printer last year. It worked poorly with photographs, but new screening technology helps the magicolor LX produce bright, sharp images. With 12MB of RAM (expandable to 64MB), the magicolor LX supports 600-dpi resolution in monochrome, 300 dpi in color. With 24MB of RAM, a \$5699 model supports 600 dpi in color, Like Xerox and unlike HP, QMS includes PostScript Level 2 standard.

Cost per page is about 3 cents for monochrome, 6 cents for pages with small color graphics, 20 cents for pages with larger graphics (say, a quarter-page scanned image), and up to 74 cents for pages with 100 percent color coverage (for example, a presentation page on a colored background). 

parable to costs with Xerox's color laser and slightly higher than with HP's. The QMS laser holds up to 500 sheets.

One drawback is that QMS provides only a 90-day on-site warranty, while Xerox and HP warranties run for a full year. Because the magicolor LX uses four toner cartridges and four developer cartridges, it requires a fair amount of maintenance. Still, color lasers make a lot of sense. And with this QMS, the price is right.



dBASE for Windows: New Name, More Tools for Database Mavens

he latest version of Borland's dBASE for Windows has expanded nicely in all directions, including its new name: Visual dBASE 5.5. The program has more Expertsstep-by-step guides that simplify creating tables, generating labels, and other tasks. The programming language includes many additional commands, and dBASE offers enhanced support for SQL databases. A new compiler and the added Install Builder feature make it easier to package and distribute dBASE applications. The program will run under Windows 95.

The three new Experts for creating tables, reports, and labels ran quickly in our prerelease version. The Labels Expert has a time-saver called Quick Address: Click a button, and dBASE searches for fields such as name, address, and city and automatically places the fields in your label form.

Although the Forms Expert isn't new, it's much more flexible than the one in version 5.0. You can create tabbed, multipage forms, as well as customize the objects on a form and reuse them in other designs. On the cosmetic side, you can select fixed font and

Ability Windows 1.0 Battles the Big Kids

f vou have a soft spot for underdogs, you won't be able to resist rooting for Ability Plus Software's Ability Windows. This suite of office productivity programs is entering a market where even Lotus SmartSuite and Novell PerfectOffice struggle to compete against the dominance of Microsoft Office. But Ability Plus Software hopes to carve out a niche with a suite that offers features similar to those of the big-name products at a lower price.

Judging from our experience with a prerelease version of the suite, Ability's lineup of program modules actually falls somewhere between those of entry-level works packages such as Microsoft Works, and those of full-fledged suites. You get a word processor, a spreadsheet, and a flat-file database, plus simple drawing, forms, charting, and communications modules.


Each module offers all the basic tools you need to be productive, something that can't always be said of works packages. Thanks to convenient icons and menu choices, you can exchange data quickly between Ability's applications for instance, adding a spreadsheet to a word processing doc-

Fired of searching through piles of paper for important information? The paperless office is slowly becoming a reality, but the optical character recognition (OCR) programs that let you scan printed matter into searchable, editable text files aren't cheap. The top OCR program, Caere's Omnipage Professional 5.0, lists for \$695, and the company recently absorbed number two OCR manufacturer Calera, effectively removing competition that could help lower prices.

Sensing an opportunity, Xerox has stepped in with a comparative bargain: The \$349 TextBridge Professional Edition offers most of Omnipage Professional's powerful features. The program also offers two unique capabilities. The Instant Access OCR utility lets you launch TextBridge Professional from your favorite Windows applications, and the In-Place Proofing feature calls up your choice of Word 6.0a or WordPerfect 6.1 (Windows versions) for editing scanned documents, allowing you to tap those programs' extensive spell-checking dictionaries. If you get reports in a variety of European languages, Text-Bridge Professional can perform document recognition in several, including French, Spanish, Italian, and German.

Phone Blaster or Disaster? Modem—Sound Board Installation Turns Ugly

reative Labs, maker of the popular Sound Blaster series of PC sound boards. is without a doubt the most reputable name in computer audio. That's why I was looking forward to installing the company's new Phone Blaster product, a combination faxmodem/sound card that uses a single ISA bus slot. Unfortunately, I found installing Phone Blaster a nightmarish journey into my PC's heart of darkness. I spent an entire Saturday afternoon pulling and plugging jumpers on the Phone Blaster board, calling Creative Labs' tech support, fiddling with IRO and DMA settings, and cursing the bozos who designed the IBM PC.

If you've installed a sound board, you'll understand.

Yes, I followed the manual's instructions carefully: Remove the PC cover, plug in the board, turn on the PC, and install the software. Naturally, it wasn't that easy. After I plugged in the Phone Blaster board and turned on the PC, the system wouldn't recognize my Adaptec SCSI adapter. Next I made a long-distance *toll* call to Creative Labs' technical support, listened to elevator music for about 10 minutes, then explained my instal-

lation troubles to a polite tech person. He said the likely culprit was an IRQ or DMA address conflict and suggested I change the default settings on either the SCSI or Phone Blaster board.

I devoted the next several hours to studying the Phone Blaster and Adaptec manuals for IRQ, DMA, and I/O address settings, reconfiguring jumpers on the Phone Blaster board, and plugging the board in again after each change. After several tries, I isolated the problem: The SCSI and Phone Blaster boards were trying to use the same I/O address. I changed the default setting on the Phone Blaster... and it worked!

Well, almost. Although my PC now recognized the SCSI board, Windows occasionally crashed when I played a sound file. I used Phone Blaster's Windows configuration utility to change the board's hardware settings, but the problems persisted, For instance, when I adjusted Phone Blaster's IRQ setting from 2 to 10, Windows appeared to be more stablethat is, until I attempted to use the modem, which apparently wanted IRQ 10 all to itself. Unfortunately, Phone Blaster's configuration utility does not list the system components that are assigned to specific IRQ and DMA settings, an omission that makes reconfiguring the board a trial-anderror proposition. And while third-party utilities such as TouchStone Software's Win-CheckIt can determine IRO and other hardware settings, they're far from perfect.

Modem Works Better

I had better luck with Phone Blaster's integrated 14.4-kbps fax-modem, which assigned itself to COM port 3 and worked properly right away. Phone Blaster includes a variety of software programs to help a home-office or small-business user set up a PC-based voicemail system. You can create up to 9000 password-protected mailboxes for each employee, and each in-box can store a mix of fax, voice, and pager messages. And Phone Blaster supports Radish Communications' VoiceView protocol, which lets you send data files during a voice conversation (but not voice and data simultaneously).

Wait for Plug and Play

But the big question is whether or not most end users will be able to get past the \$250 Phone Blaster's complex and potentially confusing setup procedure to appreciate its communications features. Certainly, not everybody will come up against the same problems I did. The fewer add-in boards your system has, the lower the risk of hardware conflicts. But considering that Phone Blaster is targeted at millions of 386 and 486 PCs (many with preinstalled CD-ROM and tape drives, internal modems, SCSI boards, and so on), a substantial number of Phone Blaster customers will likely share my frustrating experience.

If you own or plan to buy a high-end 486 or Pentium PC that supports the industry-standard Plug and Play specification, you might want to wait for the new breed of Plug and Play sound boards that should reach the market this summer, promising easy installation. (Creative Labs should offer one too.) But for the rest of us with older PCs, the DMA/IRQ shuffle remains an unfortunate fact of upgrade life.





You can use two GoPrint adapters to connect a single PC to a distant printer, or use several to build a network of up to eight printers shared by an unlimited number of PCs. (However, if you're sharing more than a few printers, you'll probably want to install a full-fledged LAN for features such as E-mail and file sharing.) GoPrint's spreadspectrum radio waves can penetrate standard office walls, so you don't need a wide-open, warehouse-type environment to use the product. Documents on Demand

Collect your files in a flash with the right document management tool.

f you've ever saved an important document and then spent hours trying to find it again, you're not alone. "Without a strategy, storing a document on a network can be like putting it in a black hole," says Marie Hardiman, system administrator for John Hancock Life Insurance's legal department in Boston. Hardiman needed a way to let users find

documents quickly while remaining shielded from the complexities of DOS's file- and directory-naming conventions. World Software's Worldox, she says, was the answer. "Our users don't know directories or servers—they just want to find documents quickly. They can now do so, even when they forget document names."

Today's Windows programs make creating documents easier than ever before, and it's a snap to swap files on a network. But the simplicity and efficiency end when you need to track down a file in a hurry. Many programs—from simple file indexers and finders to sophisticated enterprise-wide document/image management systems—can help you crack the code. Here's a sampling

1 A Windows Solution

Windows' Program Manager and File Manager, offer substantial tools for locating and retrieving files. Both have enhanced file managers that enable you to search for documents not only by name and type but also by time of creation, so you can select all the files created within a specific time period.

In addition, you can search within documents for a particular word or phrase. You can then view the contents of a file without opening it. search for files and folders anywhere on the network by file name, date, specified text, file size, location, or other such criteria. Windows 95 also lets you save the results of a complex search as an icon that you can use over and over again.

2 Word Processors as Word Finders If you mostly just need to manage files you create with a Windows word processor or spreadsheet, then you don't need to look far for help. Both Microsoft Office and Novell PerfectOffice, for example, provide advanced file management tools.

In both suites, you can create file-listing filters (called Saved Searches in Office and QuickLists in PerfectOffice) that automatically list files according to the name, pattern, and directory you specify; you can then view the contents of a file before you open it. You can also create document summaries to record vital information—such as the doc-

ument's author, the creation date, and a description of its contents—then include this information in the search criteria. Perfect-Office also lets you build indexes that track the occurrence of words in a document. Once you've built an index, you can create and launch sophisticated search requests that return results almost immediately.

3 Notes for Documents


Lotus Notes comes with a document database template that lets you track a document by author, creation date, and category. You can store an entire document within a Notes field, or you can embed the document as a file attachment. If you do the former, you can use Notes' formidable text indexing capabilities to locate documents based on the words they contain.

Dedicated Document Managers

The tools we've mentioned above are great in the hands of experienced DOS or Windows users. Fortunately, there are other tools for offices where not everyone has an extensive knowledge of PC file and directory structures. World Software's Worldox and Novell's SoftSolutions are good representatives of these types of solutions.

Both Worldox and SoftSolutions come to the rescue just when document management problems usually begin. These programs intercept the File•Save and File• Open commands of popular Windows applications and replace them with their own dialog boxes for controlling the document storage and retrieval process.

Both products let you save and retrieve documents using full-name descriptions (up



to 70 characters) instead of 8character DOS names. Like Norton Desktop and PC Tools, both SoftSolutions and Worldox include a full array of document viewers that let you quickly see a document's contents as you browse. And like PerfectOffice, they both index documents so you can easily locate files based on their content.

A document is easiest to find if you save it with a document profile, and an organization can use SoftSolutions

or Worldox to enforce this practice. You can store standard information in the profile, such as the document creator and the date, or you can opt to create a custom profile that includes the department name or a description of the document's contents.

Both products can be run from either a stand-alone PC or a network server. But while Worldox and SoftSolutions perform similar functions, they differ significantly in their ease of implementation, scalability, and administrative requirements.

Worldox offers the most intuitive interface of the two and is by far the easiest to implement. It's the better solution when you need to manage documents on a file-laden individual PC or in a small or medium-size workgroup and you don't have the services of a full-time administrator.

SoftSolutions also runs on a stand-alone PC or in a small workgroup, but in a larger multiuser environment it requires the ongoing and assertive hand of a knowledgeable

> administrator. In return it delivers enough power to handle document management needs for a large enterprise.

> Both products let the net administrator control access to documents, and both can be set up to save each revision of a document, thereby reducing the chance that an outdated version of a file will supersede the latest version. SoftSolutions also includes a Remote Document Server, which allows for remote document access via E-mail.



Stay Connected to Your Net

Remote access products let you keep in touch with your office network—from wherever you work.

ocal area networks are great—as long as you're local. But these days, you're likely to spend lots of time working without actually being *at* work. And you don't want to lose touch with your crucial files and applications just because you're working from a hotel room or your home office.

Good news: Leaving the office doesn't mean leaving the network behind—as long as you have the proper remote access system installed. You can quickly dial in to your net to pick up the sales figures you left on your office PC, check the latest customer information posted on the net, or grab whatever else you need. You won't get instant gratification—a typical remote connection runs at a maximum of 28.8 kilobits per second (kbps), compared with 10 megabits per second (mbps) on your office PC—but it can be plenty gratifying when the alternative is no access at all.

If this sounds like something your group needs, it's time to talk with your net administrator and start working on a plan for re-

mote access. Today's selection of products ranges from \$99 software packages to hardware devices that cost thousands.

Remote access products come in two basic types: remote control and remote node. Each approach has its own set of virtues and flaws.

With remote control, you use your remote (off-site) PC as a long-distance clone of a PC back at the office. Applications appear to be running on your remote PC but actually ex-

> ecute on the office PC. Remote control software has been around for more than a decade; the new twist is that you can run it on a dedicated server, making it far more practical and cost-effective for most organizations.

> With remote node software your remote PC itself becomes a workstation on the net, connected over phone line by modem rather than with a network card.

We'll explore remote access options by examining four products: Symantec's Norton pcAnywhere Access Server, Stac Electronics' ReachOut Remote Control, Microcom's LANexpress, and Funk Software's WanderLink—and we'll look at how some users profit from such products.

Taking Remote Control

How does Häagen-Dazs get Triple Brownie Overload, Cappuccino Commotion, and other chilly temptations to your grocer's freezer? In part, by collaboration between the Häagen-Dazs employees at offices nationwide—and those employees who don't really *have* an office.

"We have people scattered all over the country," explains David Wagner, division sales manager for the Minneapolis–St. Paul area. Wagner works out of a sales and distribution center in suburban Minneapolis, but some of his colleagues have home-based offices, and still others spend nearly all their time on the road.

Häagen-Dazs turned to Stac Electronics' ReachOut Remote Control. Installed on a modem-equipped portable PC, it lets these disparate workers tap into the company's

Like Symantec's pcAnywhere and other remote control products, ReachOut lets off-site users seize control of a modemequipped PC at the office, giving them access to the software and data files on its hard disk. If that PC is connected to a network, ReachOut can also access E-mail, retrieve files from the server, and perform other network-related tasks.

Unlike some remote control products, ReachOut lets you use all its features from within both DOS and Windows. To initiate a remote access session, you first specify the number you want to dial (a phone book helps you manage multiple numbers); the program then makes the connection with the office PC and prompts you for a password. You can also set up the program so the office PC calls back the off-site system, enhancing security and cutting long-distance charges on the remote PC's phone line.

ReachOut relays your keystrokes and mouse clicks to the office PC and updates your remote system's screen as the office PC's display changes. This technique is pleasingly snappy for most DOS applications. However, transmitting a Windows screen across a phone line can make a 486 remote PC feel more like a 286.

Fortunately, ReachOut provides other features for handling graphics-intensive applications. For instance, the package's DOSand Windows-based file managers make it easy to download files to a remote PC. The program also provides drive-mapping features that let you treat the drives on the office PC and network as local (albeit very slow) disks that can be used from within programs running on your remote PC. The result is much like what you get with the costlier remote node products we'll look at

Choose Your Remote Access Approach

Remote access products fall into one of four general categories: stand-alone remote control, shared remote control, remote node using hardware and software, and software-only remote node. Here's a sampling of products and what to expect from the different approaches.



later. (Note, however, that each ReachOut user needs to dial in to an individual PC, rather than directly to the net.)

At press time, Stac planned an upgrade to ReachOut—version 5.0—for release during the summer. The new version will include additional network-related features and more security options, and will speed data transfers by using Stac's LZS compression, the same technology used in its Stacker disk compression utility.

Sharing Remote Control

For a single user, a remote control program like ReachOut may be the cheapest and simplest way to tap into the network. But outfitting a group of people with remote control software, an analog phone line, and a modem at every office PC can be expensive and hard to manage.

To avoid these problems, Häagen-Dazs runs ReachOut on a dial-up server made by Cubix Corporation. This is a specialized hardware device that contains multiple PCs and modems in a single box. Rather than dialing in to their own computers, the company's workers are really connecting to the Cubix server, which is attached to the network to provide access to E-mail and other group applications.

Remote control packages that are tailored for multiple users, such as Symantec's pcAnywhere Access Server and Citrix Systems' WinView for Networks, provide another solution. These programs, which run under OS/2, let multiple remote users dial in to virtual Windows PCs running on a single computer.

We set up the pcAnywhere Access Server on a net PC running OS/2 Warp. Our test computer had two serial ports and could therefore support two simultaneous remote users; you can add additional serial ports to handle more users. The computer you use as a remote server needs a fair amount of hardware muscle: Symantec recommends a 486 or Pentium system with 8MB of memory, plus an additional 4MB for every simultaneous remote user.

Your remote PC runs the same capable software as the regular single-user Windows version of pcAnywhere. You get features similar to those in ReachOut, plus extras


such as a file manager that synchronizes directories so that both the remote and the office PCs always contain the most current versions of your files. One limitation: You can map your remote PC's drives to the office PC, but not vice versa, so you don't get the remote node-like ability to load files directly from the office system's drives into applications that are running on vour remote PC, OS/2 also contributes some drawbacks of its own. It restricts you to a 640 by 480 display, for in-

stance, and it can't take advantage of OLE 2.0 data exchange.

More important, connecting to a shared, virtual Windows session doesn't provide quite the level of comfort afforded by dialing in to your own PC. It's difficult to configure the applications you run to your exact preferences, since other remote users may dial in at other times and make changes. You do get your own private Windows desktop, however, and your network administrator can set up security groups to ensure that your private files stay confidential.

Remote Node: Nothing but Net

For the 15 attorneys at the Boston law firm Jager, Smith, Stetler & Arata, the workday rarely ends at 5 p.m. In the past, that routine





companies. System Administrator Amy Yachimski, a mother-to-be, is so sold on the product that she plans to continue helping the staff with their PC problems via remote node access while she's on maternity leave.

Like Shiva's LanRover, Rockwell Network Systems' NetHopper/P, and other remote node products, LANexpress is a hardware device that attaches to your net and accepts your dial-in calls. It produces the same effect as the drive-mapping and file-manager features offered by remote control packages, except that as a remote node device it doesn't require a PC on the network to serve as an intermediary. (See "Take Your Net With You," *PC World*, April 1995, for reviews of LanRover and NetHopper/P.)

LANexpress is an all-in-one solution complete with internal 28.8-kbps modems. That may seem like a disadvantage if you already own other modems, but it does make for a tidy, self-contained box that's as close to

being a plug-and-play remote product as anything we've tested. (The remote PC can use any standard modem, but a Microcom model gives you special security features.)


When you boot up a PC with the LANexpress client software installed, it asks if you want to connect to a remote network or a local one (or no net at all), then loads the appropriate drivers. Once in Windows, you can initiate a remote connection, log in to the network, launch your E-mail program, and perform other tasks by clicking large, easy-to-understand icons. (DOS users must connect through a less friendly set of utilities.) When you're not performing a network-related function, your remote PC is every bit as responsive as if you weren't connected to the LAN at all.

There's a catch, however. When you need to pass data across your remote network connection—for example, to load a word processing document from the server—remote node is markedly slower than remote

control. Loading large, non-client-server databases may leave you twiddling your thumbs for minutes. In our tests, copying a 500K file with a 28.8-kbps connection typically took 2½ minutes.

But you don't have to give up remote control when you use LANexpress. The package comes with Carbon Copy, a utility that lets you control any local PC on the net via a LANexpress connection. That's how the attorneys at Jager, Smith access the office's Keyfile document management system, whose images would bog down an ordinary remote node session.

Net administrators like remote node packages better than remote control ones, because they're usually easier to manage. LANexpress, for instance, includes a sophisticated utility that sets privileges for authorized remote users, monitors traffic across the remote connection, and performs other administrative tasks. Network users can also

Five Tips for Remote Access

A hidden bottleneck in many PCs is an aging serial-port communications chip. For quick, reliable connections, you need a 16550C UART chip. Run msd.exe (a DOS utility that comes with both DOS and Windows) to determine which type of chip your PC has. If it uses an 8250 or a 16540 UART chip, you can upgrade it easily and inexpensively with a new serial board.

2 Stick with 28.8-kbps V.34 modems from a reputable vendor. Using the same brand of modem on both ends can reduce the likelihood of unsuccessful connections. Don't bother with V.FC 28.8kbps modems.

To minimize phone costs, plan your work so that you're connected only when you need to be.

With remote node products, make sure that as much of your software as possible is Installed on the remote PC's hard disk rather than the server.

6 Remote node and remote access programs can make subtle changes to your PC's configuration files. Before you install any remote package, be sure to back up those files.

employ the LANexpress and LanRover modems to dial out, making the modems serve double duty; however, neither package supports all communications programs.

LanRover also allows Macintosh users to have remote access to the network, something that the version of LANexpress we tested can't do. LANexpress 3.0, which Microcom was readying for summer release at press time, will support Mac users.

The Serve-Yourself Approach

If you're on a tight budget, you might also consider a software-only product, such as Funk Software's WanderLink or Novell's NetWare Connect. These programs cost a fraction of the roughly \$1000-per-port price of systems such as LANexpress.

WANDERLINK OFFERS REMOTE ACCESS without the specialized hardware required by LANexpress and LanRover.

WanderLink costs as little as \$168 per node (for a version supporting 16 ports) and uses hardware you probably already own. The package runs on any NetWare 3.x or 4.x file server, works with standard modems plugged into the server's serial ports, and lets you dial in from DOS or Windows.

While the setup at the office differs from that of LANexpress, WanderLink provides you with a similar experience when you dial in to the network. Besides giving you a remote node capability, the package comes with Proxy, a remote control application that can be run over a WanderLink connection.

Does running on the server slow things down? With little or no other traffic on the net, our WanderLink test sessions were slightly faster than our LANexpress ones. However, when there was a bit of local activity on the network, WanderLink was slightly slower than LANexpress—though it was still fast enough to keep us productive.

The package does suffer from a few rough edges and some missing features. For example, if you want to initiate your remote node connection from Windows, your remote PC must have an up-to-date NetWare driver that many organizations haven't implemented yet. WanderLink also doesn't provide the software that local users need to dial out from the net using its modems. (For more on WanderLink, see "Five Great Workgroup Packages That Boost Your Productivity," *PC World*, January 1995.)

Making the Right Connection

With all these options, choosing the best remote access solution for your needs can be daunting. We've summarized the product categories in the chart "Choose Your Remote Access Approach." Check it out, and talk with your network administrator to determine which solution provides the best overall fit for your group.

Also keep in mind that Windows 95 will include built-in remote communications capabilities (see "Windows 95 Does Remote Access"). If these features live up to their potential, remote access may become a cheap, simple, and irresistible strate-

gy for any organization whose workers can't afford to be out of touch when they're out of the office. **-Harry McCracken**


I'm Shooting Data Now

The biggest weakness of remote access systems is lack of speed; even when using software with built-in compression and a 28.8-kbps modem, you can feel grass growing under your feet. Integrated Services Digital Network promises a better alternative for telecommuters and other remote workers: high-speed, high-quality data and voice transmission for a relatively small price premium over that of ordinary telephone service.

ISDN provides digital rather than analog communications on twisted-pair wires like the ones that carry telephone service to your home. Standard ISDN service offers two 64-kbps channels that work together for raw transmission speeds of 128 kbps or that can be split for attaching other ISDN devices, such as phones or fax devices. When ISDN is coupled with the data compression techniques that will be built into Windows 95, effective transmission rates may approach 500 kbps, according to Angelo Santinelli, senior director of marketing at remote node hardware vendor Shiva. Monthly charges for ISDN service have fallen steadily and are now typically about 15 to 35 percent higher than for regular analog service, says Sanjay Mewada, a telecommunications analyst at the Yankee Group in Boston. Prices for the necessary hardware have dropped significantly as well, from a high of \$2000 last year to between \$400 and \$800 now.


Hooking up ISDN can still be a chore, though. Some phone companies now provide nearly 100 percent ISDN coverage, but availability in other regions lags, and finding phone company representatives who are familiar with the technology can be a challenge. You need to equip the ISDN line with specialized hardware: a Network Terminator Type 1 and a terminal adapter. You must tweak each installation for its specific equipment and type of connection, and installation glitches are common. In addition, many remote access hardware and software products don't offer full-fledged ISDN support, although that should change by year-end. -Peter Loshin





Welcome to the 13th annual World Class awards. For this year's go-round, we polled hundreds of consultants, market researchers,

user group presidents, writers, and editors, as well as a select group of longtime *PC World* subscribers, and asked them to choose their favorite hardware, software, and online or Internet services in 67 categories. In addition, we asked them to pick the companies that stand resolutely by their customers during and after the purchase. This year our experts' preferences produced some surprising turnovers, and some not-so-surprising long-term winners. In the hardware arena, several newcomers ousted longtime favorites.

Though Gateway 2000 has taken both the desktop category and our panel by storm for several years running, competitors such as Dell and Micron gained ground in 1995. Dell's no-nonsense Dimension XPS P90—our number one Top 20 power system six months in a row last year—took the honors for best business desktop system (though it actually sits on the floor). And Dell's win was paired with a top billing for hardware service and support (sharing



the honors with Compaq). Micron's P90 Home MPC took the home system laurels—no surprise, since it garnered a Best Buy in our February review of home PCs.

Matt Brownell, who supports users at Semiconductor Research Corporation in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina, says he understands why Gateway may have faltered. His company still mostly buys Gateway systems, but he's had up-close-and-personal experience with Micron, too. "We can never get ahold of Gateway's tech support," he says. "Micron has excellent customer service, and I can reach them immediately."

Another regular desktop champion also fell: NEC's MultiSync 5FGe, a prior winner in the monitor category,



"That's quite an achievement for ViewSonic," says Jesse Berst, executive director of the Redmond, Washington-based Windows Solutions Conference and editorial director of the *Windows Watcher* newsletter. "Price is a feature, too, and if a vendor can deliver a certain level of quality and give users a great price, they appreciate it."

Decline of the Desktop?

On the mobile computing side, newcomers stepped up to the podium as well. Last year's top portables, the IBM ThinkPad 755C notebook and the HP OmniBook 400 subnote, took a backseat to a pair of debutantes from Toshiba:

the premium-priced, Pentium-powered T4900C and the tiny Portégé T3600CT. Either computer is powerful enough to replace your desktop system—a trend that could explain why Xircom's Credit Card Ethernet adapter was our panel's fave PC Card (formerly PCMCIA) product, beating out mainstream PC Card products such as the reigning champ Megahertz XJack modem.

A bargain upstart also grabbed the CD-ROM drive spotlight. NEC's double- and triple-speed MultiSpin CD-ROM drives (winners in the previous two years, respectively) lost out

hether we like it or not, computing as most of us now know it will change in the next few years, especially with the release of Windows 95 and the increasing importance of the Internet.

Microsoft already owns the operating system and desktop application markets; with Windows 95, the Redmond, Washington, giant also stands a chance of taking the online world by storm, experts say. "I think there are a lot of great enhancements in Windows 95, plus it's going to be launched with the hugest marketing campaign the industry's ever seen," says Windows Watcher's Jesse Berst. One of the greatest of those enhancements is the bundled client software for Microsoft's new online service, The Microsoft Network. "If Microsoft manages to get off the antitrust hook, I would certainly put Microsoft Network near the top of the blockbuster product list," says Windows 95 Letter's Carole Patton.


Networking is another obvious Microsoft target. Windows NT Advanced Server and the BackOffice suite of network applications servers threaten Novell's dominance. "The real competition will start when people see the cost savings and performance gains that a full suite of network services tightly coupled to the operating system offers," says Berst.

On the Internet front, much of the

hype that accompanied the World Wide Web's splashy debut has abated. So far, the real activity has come not from cable companies and Hollywood studios but from ordinary people posting to Net news groups and creating homemade Web pages. That could all change, as new technologies promise to turn the Web into a giant virtual Home Shopping Network. The main barrier remains access speed, says Vanderbilt University's associate professor of management Donna L. Hoffman, who codirects Project 2000, a study of marketing on the Web and other kinds of new media. "It just takes too long to browse and order from most Web-based catalogs-the experience of shopping from a full-color hard copy catalog is still much easier."

Hoffman predicts that a critical mass of online buyers and sellers will be achieved only when the average cybershopper has at least a 56-kilobits-persecond connection. "Once that happens, we expect the online storefront model to become successful for more than just niche retailers like CDNow and Internet Shopping Network," she says.

All this change hardly means that every bluechip vendor is vulnerable to marauding competitors, though. As in every past year in which they have been contenders, the Microsoft Mouse and the Hewlett-Packard LaserJet printer won hands-down in their respective categories. "Microsoft's Mouse and the HP LaserJet win all the time, for good reason," says Carole Patton, chief analyst with the Mendham Technology Group in Mendham, New Jersey, and editor of *Windows 95 Letter.* "They're simply the best." Compared with the sleek Microsoft rodent, Patton says, her old IBM mouse looks like a floor sander. "It's a great design, if your name happens to be King Kong."

> And the song remains the same in the sound department, with Creative Labs' Sound Blaster 16 continuing as top sound card. But don't expect a repeat performance next year, says Fredric Paul, editor in chief of the consumer multimedia magazine *Electronic Entertainment.* "Get real—it's old technology," he complains. "Wavetable sound is so much better."

Soft Sells

In 1995, Windows versions of software predominated in almost every category, proving that it's curtains for new DOS application development. "If you look at the market figures, DOS applications have fallen off a cliff," says Berst. "DOS users aren't buyers. They tend to be people who've got applications that have worked for a while, so they think, Why should I change?"

Not surprisingly, Goliath Microsoft remained as undaunted as ever, with Word for Windows, Excel, and Access holding onto the titles for top word processor, spreadsheet, and database program (Access's reign is now in its third year, and Excel's in its fourth). The success of the Microsoft Office Professional suite (now bundled with several major mail-order vendors' systems)

wen great products can be eclipsed by new technologies or by a competitor that has simply figured out how to do a good thing better. Increasingly, however, manufacturers are delivering products that aren't ready for prime time or, worse, present a solution in search of a problem. We pestered our pundits for their least-favorite PC tools of 1995 and came up with a few clunkers.

Electronic Entertainment's editor in chief Fredric Paul has some problems with Microsoft's, um, revolutionary home-computer interface of the future, Bob—a product that Paul finds just plain condescending. "The idea of a

social interface and agents is good—I just don't want it to be a talking parrot. There are a lot of people who need a helping hand with their computers, but I just don't think Bob is it."

Another pointless product was the Alps Glidepoint touchpad. "The Glidepoint is a good idea, but the small size of the surface makes it hard to point the cursor-which is the whole point of a touchpad." says Paul. Semiconductor Research Corporation's Matt Brownell criticizes Microsoft's toylike, house-shaped Home Mouse, which comes complete with chimney. "How could that be comfortable to use?" he asks. He's also frustrated with the eraserhead-like pointing devices built into many laptops. "I wanted to like them until I played with one," Brownell says. "A trackball or an external mouse is much easier to use."

One emerging portable technology hit with a particularly loud thud: Infrared wireless communications. In their haste to advertise infraredequipped portables, vendors are forgetting to provide desktop transcelvers-hobbling this function into an equivalent of the proverbial one hand clapping. Semiconductor Research purchased several infrared-equipped laptops that lacked transceivers. "I wanted this to work so bad." Brownell groans. The same situation applies to Infrared-equipped systems from Gateway, he says. Third-party solutions exist, but Brownell says the accompanying software isn't yet up to par.



Scanner Hewlett-Packard ScanJet licx OCR Software Caere OmniPage Professional 5.0 against competing offerings from Lotus and Novell may partially explain Microsoft's desktop dominance. (Veteran software support winner WordPerfect finally lost out to Microsoft, due in part to WordPerfect's decision to discontinue its popular unlimited phone support policy.)

The suite deal has clearly changed how products compete. Randal Lawson, administrative dean of instruction at Santa Monica College in Santa Monica, California, still relies on a collection of old favorites: WordPerfect for Windows, Lotus 1-2-3, and Microsoft Access. If Microsoft had gotten its way, its winning streak would have extended to the finance category. But the U.S. Department of Justice recently moved to block Microsoft's proposed merger with Intuit, whose Quicken for Windows again topped the personal finance slate. Expect plenty of O.J.-style court wrangling on this one. And despite customer frustration with shipping delays and bugs that surfaced in the 1994 version, TurboTax for Windows beat all comers in the tax realm. (Intuit acquired it when the company gobbled ChipSoft in 1993.)

POWERPC VS. PENTIUM: A YEAR LATER

ast year our panel of experts chose the PowerPC 601 RISC processor as the most promising new hardware. Twelve months later we find ourselves wondering, Did it deliver on its promise?

Not yet. Yes, the powerful new processor designed by Motorola, Apple, and IBM still shows great promise, and Power-PC-based Macintoshes have all but replaced Mac systems using older 680X0 processors. But the PowerPC has yet to become a force in the much larger PC market.

Blame IBM. Set to roll out its first batch of OS/2-flavored PowerPC systems last fall, IBM pulled the plug when it became clear that OS/2 for PowerPC was nowhere near ready.

Accordingly, the first shipping IBM PowerPC systems—slated for June 1995 delivery—will run Windows NT, not OS/2. (These systems will use newer, more powerful 603e and 604 processors, rather than the 601.) The company anticipates shipping an OS/2 version of PowerPC in the fall.

This operating system bait and switch has contributed to confusion among developers, who may opt to wait until one operating system stands out as the clear first choice. Likewise, the vast majority of users are unlikely to commit to the PowerPC until it offers a compelling suite of native applications running under at least one of the operating systems.

With IBM reluctant to send a PowerPC system to market, most other PowerPC makers have held back as well. "It's hard to build a clone market when there's nobody out there to clone," says Linley Gwennap, editor in chief of *Microprocessor Report* in Sebastopol, California.

IBM's false starts notwithstanding, many analysts expect that once the faster, cheaper Power-PC appears, it will stand a good chance of competing with Intel-based systems. "PowerPC is going to provide a price/performance advan-

tage," Gwennap predicts. "The question is, Can IBM translate that advantage to successful product?"

Otherwise, the competing chips are falling where they may. Clone makers AMD and Cyrix, for instance, hope to claim increasing market share with their K5 and M1 Pentium-class chips. Meanwhile, Intel aims to leapfrog high-performance RISC architecture altogether with a new line of chips. Working with Hewlett-Packard, Intel is designing fin de slècle chips using the Very Long Instruction Word (VLIW) design. (Rumor has it that AMD is working on a VLIW CPU.) VLIW is purported to perform like RISC while maintaining backward compatibility with the Pentium and other CISC designs.



dors that provide low-cost Internet access services are garnering attention. Netcom's flatrate Internet accounts and easy-to-learn Net-Cruiser interface made this service our favorite on-ramp. NetScape Communications' World Wide Web browser—NetScape Navigator stole the thunder from NCSA Mosaic, thanks to its security features and tight links with the company's Web server product. Despite America Online's dizzying growth, CompuServe still reigns as the best commercial online service. "I love AOL's interface," says Santa Monica College's Lawson, "but so far, CompuServe offers a lot more services."

A few other repeat winners surprised no one by showing up on the 1995 Best Products list: Autodesk's Auto-CAD remains unchallenged as the acme of CAD tools; and Novell NetWare, Lotus Notes, and Lotus cc:Mail still have workgroups sewn up tight.

Warp Speed for OS/2

Perhaps most surprising of all the winners was our panel's choice for product of the year. Hold on to your antistatic wristrest—it's IBM's OS/2 Warp 3.0.

Who'd have thought OS/2 would beat Windows? It comes as no surprise to *Windows Watcher*'s Berst. "OS/2

users are among the most loyal and vocal users of any product," he notes, adding, "besides which, OS/2 is the first true 32-bit operating system for the desktop, a technical achievement worthy of note." But with Windows 95 looming, Berst isn't sure how Warp will fare next year: "I think it will be harder for IBM next time around. It's one thing to win when you're the only 32-bit desktop operating system, and another when you've got competition."

Indeed, today's winners could be tomorrow's forgotten heroes as the PC marketplace continues its strange morph into the future.

ROBBIE MCCLARAN

Though loyal to classic, top-notch products, PC users are clearly willing to dump old favorites if a newcomer promises productivity breakthroughs or major savings. The best products of 1996 will be those that offer quality at a low price but aren't afraid to take a chance on new technology. Need a blueprint? Look to Microsoft.





Fast Forward: FULL-MOTION

Tired of squinting at herky-jerky video in tiny

little windows? The latest Windows accelerators

speed up and smooth out full-motion video. And

they'll light a fire under your graphics to boot.

VIDEO WITH FULL MOTION is the next wave in PC applications and titles. If you don't believe us, check out any multimedia title: Study the Zapruder film from the JFK assassination in Compton's 95 Encyclopedia, or watch Babe Ruth hit a towering home run in Microsoft Baseball, and you'll get the idea. Games like Quantum Gate and Wing Commander III weave video into their plots to increase the sense

of reality, and businesses can use video for computer-based training and PowerPoint presentations.

One problem: Even the fastest Pentium PC strains under the demands of full-motion digital video, especially when windows are stretched to

fill the screen. The result is distracting, jerky video with dropped frames, chopped audio, and blocky pixels. Conventional Windows ac-

celerators do little to help, since they don't address video functions. But a new generation of boards called *video accelerators* enhance both Windows video and graphics, providing an all-in-one solution for power-hungry multimedia PCs—at a price only slightly higher than that of a stand-alone graphics board. In fact, before long it may be hard to find a graphics card that *doesn't* offer video capability.

To help you prepare for the video future, we rounded up general-video accelerators with prices

ranging from \$195 to \$500 on the street and ran them through a battery of tests to judge video smoothness and quality. We also benchmarked the

boards using the *PC World* Windows Integrated Test Suite (WITS), a collection of six Windows applications designed to test graphics performance. Overall, we were impressed: Compared with conventional graphics accelerators like our baseline



MULTIMEDIA VIDEO ACCELERATORS

Diamond Stealth 64 VRAM board, most of the new cards produced noticeably better video quality. Best of all, you don't have to give up graphics performance to get 'TV-like video quality: All of these boards are competitive with mainstream graphics accelerators, and several of them established new graphics speed records.

But one board stood out from the pack. The Diamond Stealth

Video DRAM vaulted over some tough competition to become our overall Best Buy, thanks to its low \$233 price and the impressive boost it gives to both video and standard PC graphics.

Shrinking It Down

Nothing taxes a PC like video, simply because so much data is involved. A full-motion, full-screen digital video clip that matches the quality of a good VHS tape can demand more than 25MB of data per second. No CD-ROM drive or hard disk can pump data at that speed, let alone store more than a few minutes' worth. That's why all PC video is compressed using a mathematical algorithm called a codec-short for compression/decompression-that spells out how video is shrunk into condensed code and expanded back. Unlike the compression in products such as PKZIP, DoubleSpace, and DriveSpace, almost all video compression schemes lose data in the process. This degrades image quality but lets the codecs achieve compression ratios as high as 40:1 or more.

The most popular compression schemes

for CD-ROM titles and PC video productions are Cinepak and Indeo, software-only codecs that run on almost any PC with a 386 or better processor. Titles such as Microsoft Baseball and VidGrid rely on these schemes to compress and play back video files.

For high-quality CD-ROM video, MPEG (Motion Pictures Expert Group) compression provides superior image quality, 30-fps (frames per second) playback, and better compression ratios than those of Cinepak and Indeo. But the MPEG codec is so complex, an additional MPEG video playback card is usually needed to handle all the decompression tasks. For this reason, relatively few CD-ROM titles use MPEG-based video, although more may emerge as affordable MPEG boards hit the market. (See "The MPEG Connection," which includes a review of four MPEG boards.)

Blowing It Up

General-purpose video accelerators themselves do not decompress video—the CPU does all that. So if you're serious about video, a Pentium PC is a good idea. Once the CPU decompresses the data, the accelerator takes over, converting the data from its compact, video-specific format to one friendly to PC graphics standards.

The accelerator can then scale video images to a larger size, all the way to full screen if you like. In this step, the board adds pixels

A \$233 street price makes it one of the least expensive video-enabled graphics boards in our review, yet its outstanding graphics acceleration and strong video playback are on a par with those of boards costing \$100 more.

that weren't in the original low-resolution image. But these accelerators don't produce the chunky images you see when you normally stretch a video window; rather, they intelligently place pixels and smooth out lines to maintain good image quality—making even small 160-by-120 videos look acceptable when expanded. As our tests show, some boards are better at this trick than others.

> The key to making these accelerators work is a Windows technology called Display Control Interface (DCI). Simply put, DCI lets any Windows application talk directly to graphics hardware, and routes video tasks to the accelerator for processing. To use this capability, the accelerator must have a DCI driver. All but one of the general-purpose boards we reviewed include such a driver (along with a DCI software upgrade for Windows). The VideoLogic PCI Movie, which came in dead last in our tests (excluding the baseline board), lacks DCI capability.

> During testing, we received last-minute DCI driver revisions and encountered several installation snafus, which we note in the individual reviews. Microsoft says that DCI will be built into Windows 95, and by the time that juggernaut arrives, installing a video accelerator for Windows should be a lot closer to foolproof.

Video Voodoo

Our tests produced two types of results: average fps scores (see Test Report: Video Accelerators Smooth Playback) and sub-

jective judgments of picture quality (noted in each review). We used eight video clips, each using 24-bit color and 30 frames per second. Four of these were at 320 by 240, and four were less demanding 160-by-120 clips. To reflect common video applications, we compressed two of the clips at each resolution using Cinepak and compressed the other two using Indeo. We played back the 320-by-240 clips first at their normal resolution and then scaled to 640 by 480. The 160-by-120 clips were stretched to 640 by 480 for testing.

In each test, we used Doceo's Video Compression Sampler utility for Windows to determine how many frames, if any, were skipped during playback—the best measure of general video accelerator performance. As the 'Test Report reveals, these boards improved on the showing of our baseline Diamond Stealth 64 VRAM board—a fast Windows graphics accelerator without video hardware that dropped more than half the frames in the video files. It struggled especially with scaled video, where frame rates fell to one-fifth of normal, yielding playback that was jerky and distracting. Note that every board had a harder time maintaining frame rates in the Indeo tests than with Cinepak, an indication of the comparative efficiency of the two codecs. If you have a fast Pentium PC, you will undoubtedly get smoother playback than what we saw on our Polywell DX4-100 test system.

MULTIMEDIA VIDEO ACCELERATORS

As we suspected, video scaling stressed the boards, causing the slower ones to drop frames even from the Cinepak clips. Nonetheless, when scaling video from 320 by 240 to 640 by 480, none of them dropped to the jerky frame rates of our baseline graphics-only card, and all delivered better-looking scaled images than our baseline board did.

However, expanding the video windows still made the clips look considerably worse than in their native resolution. That's no surprise, considering that these boards are trying to fill the screen by "guessing" what the image should look like. When we scaled 160 by 120 clips to 640 by 480-the most demanding scaling scenario in our tests-all the boards produced images so jagged and chunky, you'd only want to view them from across the room.

Graphics Details

The last thing you want is to lose graphics performance as you gain video acceleration, so you need a video accelerator with graphics performance at least as good as that of the board you

have. When we ran our 12 contenders through WITS, we were not disappointed: In almost all cases, the boards reviewed here should be a match for comparable graphics-only accelerators currently on the market. In fact, several boards-the Best Buy Diamond Stealth Video, STB Velocity 64V, Hercules Stingray 64/Video, and miroVideo 12PD-appear on our Top 10 Windows accelerators list thanks to their outstanding overall value.

Another spec to watch for is the top refresh rate. The higher the refresh rate, the more stable the image, and the longer you can stare at the screen without eyestrain. The card you choose should have at least a 75-Hz refresh rate at 1024-by-768 screen resolution-only the miroVideo 20TD falls short in this group. Higher is even better, though monitors that handle more than 75 Hz at this resolution tend to be pricey. The Diamond Stealth 64 Video VRAM is the champ

here, with 120 Hz refresh at 1024 by 768 and 90 Hz at 1280 by 1024.

Remember, the amount of RAM your board can hold determines the number of colors it can display at a given resolution. If your board accepts only 2MB of RAM, you'll never get more than 65,536 colors at 1024 by 768; with 4MB, you can enjoy 16.8 million colors for photographic quality. The extra 2MB of RAM can cost \$100 to \$200, depending on memory type. Boards that use dynamic RAM (DRAM) are cheaper, but video RAM (VRAM) won't choke under demanding 24-bit color graphics and video.

Finally, have a good look at each company's warranty and tech support. These boards are bleeding-edge technology, and some may simply refuse to work in your machine. Access to the manufacturer through CompuServe, America Online, or a private BBS will ensure that you can get a new DCI driver fast, something we had to do several times in the

course of this review. All in all, the easier a company is to contactby modem, toll-free call, or fax-back service-the better off you are.

Despite a few installation glitches, we were generally impressed by these products. All deliver significant improvements in video quality while also managing to boost graphics performance. With video clips standard in virtually every CD-ROM title-and beginning to show up in everyday business apps-a video accelerator can bring your PC one step closer to being a multimedia powerhouse.

MULTIMEDIA VIDEO ACCELERATORS

Diamond Stealth 64 Video VRAM

PROS: Smooth video performance, good image quality CONS: Installation glitches, slow graphics

The Diamond Stealth 64 Video VRAM placed near the top in our video performance tests, with full-motion playback (29-to-30-fps rates) in all but the expanded Indeo action clips. Better yet, clips looked remarkably TV-like until they were scaled up.

Even with the board's speedy 120-Hz refresh rate and CorelDraw 4.0 bundle, its \$389 street price is hard to justify. Its Windows setup bombed on us, and it finished dead last among general-purpose boards when displaying standard business applications. Our advice: Buy its DRAM cousin, the Best Buy Diamond Stealth Video. *Diamond Multimedia Systems*, 800/468-5846 Reader service no. 678

Diamond Stealth Video

PROS: Smooth video playback, fast graphics, inexpensive CONS: InControl Tools crashed during setup

The \$233 Diamond Stealth Video delivers a potent combination of price and performance. The board dropped nary a frame on its way to a Best Buy, stumbling slightly on the tough Indeo-compressed 640-by-480 action video. And the Stealth Video's 80.7 WITS score makes it a top graphics performer.

The Stealth Video accepts only 2MB of DRAM, and its 75-Hz refresh rate at 1024 by 768 falls behind tested VRAM boards. Diamond's InControl Tools are helpful for checking frame rates and switching resolutions, but the version we used crashed. The board includes CorelDraw 4.0, which—combined with a low price and terrific all-around performance—makes it a resounding Best Buy. *Diamond Multimedia Systems*, 800/468-5846 Reader service no. 679

Diamond Viper Pro Video

PROS: Top video performance and image quality CONS: High price, unexceptional graphics speed

The Diamond Viper Pro Video is the only board we tested that always maintained 29 or 30 fps. Its picture quality topped that of all general-video boards as well, but at \$479 (including CorelDraw 3.0) this board isn't cheap. Its Weitek graphics and video chips clashed with our Polywell DX4-100 test system, so we tested it on a similarly configured Blackship DX4-100. It boasts fast 100-Hz refresh rates at 1024 by 768, while its 2MB VRAM can be upgraded to 4MB for high-resolution, true-color display. For sheer video quality, the Viper Pro Video is clearly the board to beat—except for its steep price. *Diamond Multimedia Systems*, 800/468-5846 Reader service no. 680

Genoa VideoBlitz III AV

PROS: Fast graphics, smooth video, good picture quality CONS: Slight falloff in Indeo picture quality, bare-bones software

The \$369 Genoa VideoBlitz III AV boasts lightning-fast graphics and smooth video playback. Its overall WITS score of 82.7 falls only half a point behind that of the blazing Number Nine 9FX Motion771.

THE MPEG CONNECTION

ou want TV-quality video? Then your only choice is MPEG, the compresslon/decompression scheme (so named after the Motion Pictures Ex-

pert Group). MPEG delivers video quality vastly superior to that of Cinepak or Indeo, even on a singlespeed CD-ROM drive.

We tested four boards that combine MPEG video and graphics, and found outstanding quality. At 352 by 240--standard MPEG resolution--all boards produced video close to broadcast television quality. The best cards even excelled at scaling video to full screen.

It takes a special board to handle MPEG video, so few titles are available. But this appears to be chang-

ing: feature films like *Top Gun* and *Star Trek II* have been compressed to MPEG on two-CD sets. And MPEG games such as Flash Traffic and Silent Steel are gaining acclaim. In fact, MPEG may well help transform the PC into an entertainment center for the home.

We tested the VL-based Genoa GVision DX, Orchid Kelvin MPEG, Sigma RealMagic Rave, and the PCI-based Jazz Multimedia Jakarta.



The Jakarta does it all: integrated graphics, general video enhancement, and hardware-based MPEG decompression.

None matched the polish of the general-video boards we tested. Hardware-based MPEG playback makes skipped frames unlikely, so our tests were based on image quality only. The \$449 GVision DX and \$399 Jakarta won hands down in this beauty contest, with VHSlike full-screen images. The \$429 Kelvin MPEG and \$479 RealMagic Rave produced a shimmering effect similar to "snow" on a TV.

> Installing the VL boards was hairy. The GVIsion DX was the only VL board actually shipping at test time, but setup was clumsy, and selecting a monitor required a familiarity with refresh rates. And the other boards had bugs that need to be addressed.

> Only the Jakarta displayed real sophistication, with easy Installation, polished manuals, and slick packaging. It's also the only board with both MPEG and general-video acceleration (see capsule review). But the Jakarta had problems at

800 by 600 resolution: Moving the cursor jiggled the MPEG window, and windows wouldn't stay on top when selected. If the company fixes these bugs, the Jakarta stands out as an all-purpose video solution.

ULTIMEDIA VIDEO ACCELERATORS

The VideoBlitz kept pace with the top-rated Diamond Viper Pro Video, though it stumbled on expanded Indeo clips. Our preproduction board installed easily, but the software lacks sophistication despite the helpful uninstaller, and Genoa's support policies are slim. The VideoBlitz accepts up to 4MB of VRAM, although an 84-Hz refresh rate at 1024 by 768 is only so-so. Still, this no-frills board impressed us. Genoa Systems, 800/934-3662 Reader service no. 681

Hercules Stingray 64/Video

PROS: Low price, smooth Cinepak video

CONS: Below average Indeo performance, no color data conversion

The Hercules Stingray 64/Video delivers midrange graphics and video for a low \$195 street price. But it produced chunky images when videos were stretched, and 320-by-240 Indeo clips looked jerky. As a graphics accelerator, the StingRay posted an overall WITS score of 75, which, combined with its bargain price, makes it one of four boards in this review to earn a spot on our monthly Top 10 Windows Accelerators chart.

The Stingray installed easily, thanks to a simple DOS program and strong Windows graphics software. But it's limited to 2MB of DRAM, so you can't go beyond 800 by 600 in 24-bit color. Refresh rates max out at 75 Hz at 1024 by 768. Despite these complaints, the StingRay is a strong value for multimedia bargain hunters. Jazz Multimedia Jakarta

PROS: Excellent software, easy installation, MPEG hardware acceleration CONS: Below-average Cinepak and Indeo performance

Matrox MGA Millennium

PROS: Good video performance, 3-D acceleration, excellent 24-bit graphics CONS: None

The \$329 Matrox MGA Millennium is designed for the future, speeding not just graphics and video but 3-D images. The 2MB board fell close behind the Viper Pro Video in our frame rate tests, but its 78.2 WITS score is a step slower than the graphics leaders'.

The board's 24-bit performance is very good, and it accepts a whopping 8MB of unique WRAM (Window RAM)—a new design well suited to demanding video and 3-D graphics—which lets it display 24-bit color at 1600 by 1200. The board's 120-Hz refresh rate at 1024 by 768 tied for highest in the review, and installation and graphics utilities are impressive. While 3-D acceleration isn't terribly useful now, wait a year or so. Number Nine 9FX Motion771



Slick utilities ease installation and use, and you get a lifetime warranty and strong support policies. The Velocity 64V's lack of video prowess kept it from a Best Buy, but blazing graphics and a low price carn it the number six spot on our Top 10 list of Windows accelerators. VideoLogic PCI Movie

PROS: None

CONS: Worst video performance, no color data conversion

The only board reviewed without a DCI driver, the venerable PCI Movie choked on every 320-by-240 clip, dropping two-thirds of the frames in Indeo clips of that resolution. The PCI Movie even trailed the non-video capable Diamond Stealth 64 VRAM baseline board in some tests. A 74.1 WITS score is second-worst in the review.

Like the Hercules Stingray, the PCI Movie scales video clips but doesn't convert video data to RGB format. Future support for DCI may improve the PCI Movie's handling of video, but this is small comfort when you consider the high \$399 street price and 2MB VRAM limitation. 



DRAWING for DUMMES

BY JAMES A. MARTIN Whether you need a quick flowchart, org chart, or floor plan, the latest business graphics packages claim to make it as simple as a click of the mouse. Which ones deliver?



reat news—you've just been put in charge of a new division of your company. But before you uncork the champagne, anxiety hits: You'll need to come up with an organization chart, a floor plan for offices, and flowcharts for quick overviews of four new projects. How to manage it all before next week's companywide meeting?

The answer is easier than you might think. Multipurpose business graphics programs like Visio and ABC Flow-Charter help you track projects and organize resources in visual terms. These programs—like draw packages with MBAs—offer libraries of predrawn shapes that you simply drop into a document and connect with lines. Even if you don't know a T square from a T-bone, you can very easily

create an organization chart to show who is working on your product-marketing campaign, a flowchart detailing the way you'll implement it, or a bar graph to chart your monthly sales figures.

So how well do these programs deliver on the promises of ease of use and versatility? To find out, I looked at the four leading packages—ABC FlowCharter 4.0, Corel's CorelFlow 2.0, Adobe's IntelliDraw 2.01, and Visio 3.0. I created three kinds of everyday business graphics—an organization chart, a flowchart, and a floor plan—in each of the four programs.

Each package has its own distinctive strengths. For example, the \$69 CorelFlow stands out for its large number of shapes and clip art, whereas the \$299 ABC FlowCharter lets you create the most elaborate flowcharts. But when we added everything up, the \$129 Visio nudged past the \$95 IntelliDraw to earn a Best Buy, thanks to its intuitive interface and excellent set of drawing tools.

Ease of Use Reigns Supreme

While all four programs let you drag and drop objects to create your drawing, some make this process easier than the others do. The best

telliDraw and Visio, but the \$129 Visio ulti-

programs, such as Visio, make producing a drawing a straightforward process by clearly arranging all available drawing tools on screen and labeling all buttons and shapes so you know how to use them. Visio also gets high marks for its handy pop-up help windows. IntelliDraw's 99 levels of undo are great for helping you retrace your steps and figure out where your drawing went awry.

The biggest time-savers are templates containing predrawn, preconnected shapes. Why waste energy creating an organization chart from scratch when you can simply customize an existing template? All four of the programs offer basic templates—flowcharts, bar charts, and organization charts—but the best also give you more-specialized tem-

plates, such as cause-and-effect (also called fishbone) diagrams. Visio offers the best selection of business-oriented templates.

For those times when you can't use a template, you'll need to learn how to use your program's drawing tools. Each program ships with a library of predrawn shapes, from simple rectangles and diamonds to fancier objects, such as filing cabinets and fax machines. You can just drop them into drawings and edit them on the fly. The better a program's shapes library, the less actual drawing you have to do. While CorelFlow has the largest number of shapes, Visio offers the most useful selection for business.

But there's more to creating a chart than dragging and dropping shapes from a library; you also need to connect the shapes with lines or arrows. All the programs offer a line tool for this purpose. And all but CorelFlow automatically connect a line to an object's edge once you position the cursor over the object. Look for a program that offers more than just rudimentary line tools; the more options you have, the less drawing you'll have to do. ABC FlowCharter, for example, lets you select from a variety of line types—including straight, right-angle, and curved lines—to create your drawings.

Beyond Drag and Drop

Here are some other important features you should consider.

• Ability to create slide presentations. If you're creating organization charts or flowcharts on screen, chances are you'll use them for presentations. Being able to create a slide presentation within your draw program saves you the time and effort of moving those charts into a dedicated presentation graphics program.

• Spelling checker. Nothing looks worse than a chart full of typos. All but Visio have built-in spelling checkers.

• Automatic line rerouting. What if you take someone off your product-marketing campaign or decide to phase out one of your processes? At times like these, you'll want to rearrange or delete shapes in your chart. All the programs we reviewed except Visio

> can accommodate these changes by automatically realigning the chart minimizing the amount of redrawing you'll need to do yourself.

> • Dimension lines. When you create a floor plan on screen, you'll want to show the scale you're working at

> > (for example, 1 inch equals 1 foot). Dimension lines help you do this by automatically measuring the distance between a line's end points and displaying the measurement. (Only IntelliDraw and Visio offer this feature.)

• Data fields. ABC FlowCharter and Visio both allow you to link a spreadsheet table's data directly to objects in your diagram. This enables you to quickly generate charts and graphs based on the

data-to link sales data to a bar chart, for instance.

• Freehand drawing tools. If you ever want to create a new shape or customize an existing one, freehand drawing tools are a real plus. All but CorelFlow offer these tools.

• Import/export formats. If you want to add clip art or photos to your creations—say, a photo of each employee on your organization chart—your package must support the format that the images are in. CorelFlow and Visio offer the best support for file import/export formats such as PCX and TIFF.

• Alignment tools. All of the programs except IntelliDraw use a page layout grid for documents, which helps you place and distribute objects evenly. When you drag a shape into position, the snap-togrid feature automatically positions the object on the grid. All but FlowCharter automatically center your drawing as well.

• OLE 2.0 support. All but IntelliDraw support the Windows Object

PROS: Handy SnapGraphics module, strong line tools, supports data fields and multipage charts CONS: Expensive, unattractive shapes, can't automatically center charts on page, one level of undo, no dimension lines

ABC FlowCharter aims to be the most complete business graphics program available. Unfortunately, it's a bit overambitious. For those who need to create charts only occasionally, the \$299 ABC FlowCharter is both too difficult and too expensive. You get only one level of undo, and, unlike Visio, the program does-

Linking and Embedding (OLE) 2.0 specification. IntelliDraw supports only OLE 1.0. Both versions enable you to take an object created in one application and embed it in another, but OLE 2.0 streamlines the process by importing tools and menus from the object's native program so you can edit items from within other programs. If you want to embed a Visio flowchart in an Excel spreadsheet, for example, you can double-click on the chart within Excel and edit it in a Visio window; the changes you make will be reflected in both the Excel spreadsheet and the original Visio file. Conversely, you can embed an Excel spreadsheet in any of these business draw packages.

If you need to create only flowcharts or organization charts, you may be better off opting for a dedicated package. See "Just Say Flow" and "Org Charts à la Carte" for more information about these types of programs.

Hidden Costs

Remember when you could call tech support any time and ask as many questions as you wanted, free of charge? Not so anymore. Like many other software programs sold today, each of the packages we review offers a limited number of free calls, followed by high fees charged on a per-call basis. Visio is the least egregious: You ger 90 days of free support, then you must select one of three payment options for future calls.

With the door on free support shutting so soon after you purchase your software, it's all the more important to get a package that won't leave you full of questions. Our Best Buy, Visio, does the best job of getting you up and running quickly, but the other programs have valuable features as well. Read on for more about what each package has to offer. While none is flawless, we think you'll find one that's right for you.



n't lay out all the chart tools you need in front of you. For example, you have to go into the File menu to find the drawing templates. Worse, you can't easily center charts on the page.

The program's acc in the hole, however, is SnapGraphics, an integrated drawing module with a variety of templates that make creating an organization chart or flowchart about as easy as microwaving a TV dinner. (SnapGraphics by itself is \$50.)

FlowCharter, however, has no flowchart or organization chart templates, so we had to create our drawings from scratch—an intimidating prospect, considering FlowCharter's bare-bones interface. SnapGraphics, on the other hand, has on-screen placeholders that make it easy to arrange charts. Just drag a shape from a palette over to one of the predrawn placeholders, and voilà! Then connect, resize, or move the shapes however you want. My only quibble with SnapGraphics is that it doesn't import text into flowcharts, so creating a chart took longer than I liked.

And as for floor planning, both modules fall flat: FlowCharter has no dimension lines for measuring space, and it lets you open only one shape palette at a time, even though its office-furniture and floor-planning shapes are in two separate palettes. What's more,



most of these shapes look clunky and unappealing. SnapGraphics offers no floor-planning shapes or tools at all.

If you're willing to struggle with FlowCharter's interface, you'll find some features (not available in the SnapGraphics module) that let you create more-complex business drawings. The DataAnalyzer module lets you link data fields to chart objects, which comes in handy for charting sales figures or displaying data within organization charts—for example, you can list employees' salaries and start dates below their names and titles. Also, the program's five linererouting options—direct, right angle, curved, organization chart, and cause-and-effect (fishbone)—make it easier to create a wide range of drawings. Best of all, FlowCharter lets you produce charts that flow easily across multiple, tiled pages.

Considering FlowCharter's complexity, Micrografx's support plan of just 30 days of free calls to a toll line is hardly adequate.

If you're new to business graphics, SnapGraphics may be all you need. It lets you whip up clean graphics without much effort. While it's not as full featured as FlowCharter, it's much easier to use and it's dirt cheap. *Micrografx; 800/603-0074, 214/234-1769* Reader service no. 674

JUST SAY FLOW: DEDICATED FLOWCHARTING



True, you can create respectable flowcharts with business graphics programs such as our Best Buy, Visio, but no

program is perfect—a scant shape library here, an awkward connector tool there. Your best bet may be a dedicated flowcharting application. Here's a brief look at some leading flowcharting programs. (For 32-bit Windows 95 flowcharting, see May's Quick Take on Arcland's \$299 FlowModel; 610/ 993-9908.)

Clear Software's allClear III for Windows

If you can type, you can create a flowchart. That's the premise behind the \$180 allClear III, a program geared for beginners who want simple, yet full-featured flowcharting.

What's unique about allClear is that it generates charts from text-based outlines using coding, called scripts. For starters, once you select the type of graphic you want to create—say, a process diagram, organization chart, or decision tree-two windows appear on screen: a diagram window, containing a template of the chart or diagram you've chosen; and a script window, into which you enter text in outline form. The program links the text in the script window directly to shapes in the diagram window. For example, type the words *Begin Process* on the first line of the script, and allClear fills the first shape in the diagram with those words.

Punctuation in a script determines the flowchart's direction; a colon, for example, generates a multiple-choice branch in the chart. You can also spruce up charts with more than 180 editable shapes, clip art, and a variety of line styles. Shapes will also resize automatically to fit your text. And if you forget a task—such as importing Lotus Notes—an instruction window can take you though the process step-by-step. *Clear Soft*ware; 800/338-1759, 617/965-6755 Reader service no. 869

Kaetron's TopDown Flowcharter for Windows

For \$189 TopDown Flowcharter for Windows lets enables you to plan complex projects re-

quiring multilayered flowcharts, with one chart nested inside another.


Simply double-click on a chart object, and you can create a subchart linked to that object. You can also change the hierarchy of subcharts or cross-link them to each other.

Other useful features include TopDown's Drop Anchor—which lets you place a marker in a document for quick retrieval later and the ability to attach lengthy notes to any ob-

Scitor's Process Charter 1.0 for Windows

With its profusion of toolbars, palettes, icons, shapes, and more, Process Charter for Windows makes it easy for beginners to whip up a simple flowchart in a hurry. But flowcharting is just a fraction of what Process Charter can do. This \$480 program is also a high-end data analysis tool that lets you perform time-based what-if scenarios and process simulations. Say you want to create a process chart of incoming tech support calls. You can enter employee info and number of calls per hour into the program's spreadsheet, then assign that data to any object (or step) in the process and specify a period of time. Click the Process Run button, and the program simulates the call

flow, showing bottlenecks in red. Best of all, several processes can run simultaneously.

Process Charter isn't perfect-it doesn't support OLE, undo is limited, and it's pricey. But for sophisticated resource analysis, this tool goes far beyond simple flowcharting. *Scitor Corp.*; 800/549-9876, 415/462-4200 Reader service no. 871

CorelFlow 2.0

PROS: Low price; lots of clip art, digitized photos, and fonts; roll-up window-shade palettes; large color palette

CONS: No on-screen ruler, awkward line tool, no freehand drawing tool, no tiled pages, only one level of undo

No one could ever accuse Corel of being stingy with its CorelFlow 2.0 package. For \$69 you get 1000 clip art images, 2000 symbols (including arrows, shapes, and electical engineering symbols), and 1000 digitized photos on a broad range of subjects. Too bad actually using these shapes to create business drawings is such a chore.

When making my organization charts and flowcharts, I was immediately put off by the way CorelFlow's line tool wouldn't automatically snap to the bottom or side of the objects I wanted to connect. As a result, I found myself drawing messy lines that bled into an object or that weren't perfectly straight. I couldn't connect one line to another or join a line to a text box, either. To generate an angled line, I had to draw the line, double-click to create an end point, draw the rest of the line, double-click again, and so on. Nothing looks worse than an off-center chart. The lack of an onscreen ruler or auto-align feature made it nearly impossible to center my charts with precision on the page.

What's more, CorelFlow is the only program that offers no freehand drawing tool, making it harder to modify predrawn shapes. As with ABC FlowCharter, CorelFlow's lack of dimension lines and inability to blend shapes made floor planning a challenge.


For all its faults, CorelFlow has a few redeeming qualities. I liked how the window-shade palettes rolled up to minimize onscreen clutter; and the extensive color palettes helped me make distinctive-looking drawings.

Corel gives you one free call on its toll-free support line; after that, you pay \$25 per call or \$2 per minute.

CorelFlow is worth buying only if you want to use its huge selection of clip art, photos, and symbols to spruce up drawings made in another drawing package. For creating professional-looking business graphics, spend a little more and get Visio. *Corel Corp.; 800/* 772-6735, 613/728-8200 Reader service no. 675

PROS: Top-notch image library, auto-align feature, good drawing and connecting tools, rich typographic features, 99 levels of undo, ability to lock objects in place

CONS: Nonintuitive interface, OLE 1.0 support only, no time-line templates, no context-sensitive on-screen help

IntelliDraw's attractive, highly malleable image library alone is worth the program's \$95 street price. This Adobe package offers a wide range of useful clip art, as well as many striking and brightly colored images. Best of all, some of the artwork can be broken into smaller, editable components. But a nonintuitive interface keeps IntelliDraw out of the Best Buy ranks.

Creating an organization chart in IntelliDraw is easy thanks to its built-in templates. Although the program lacks a grid, IntelliDraw's auto-align feature—vertical and horizontal crosshairs that pop up automatically over your chart as you drag a shape in place—is a huge help in positioning shapes precisely. I had a harder time creating a flowchart—the template was small and awkwardly arranged.

IntelliDraw makes it easy to import numerical data from text files directly into a chart. If you have a text file that contains annual sales figures for a particular product line, for instance, you can import that data directly into a bar chart; the bars will automatically adjust in size to represent the imported sales figures.

The program handles floor planning exceptionally well, thanks to its horizontal and vertical dimension lines, which measure the space between the line's start and end points after you tell the program what scale to assume. The package also enables you to calculate an area's square footage.

IntelliDraw's text features are the best of the programs reviewed here, complete with leading, kerning, and paragraph formatting controls. You can flow text automatically from one object to another, wrap text around shapes, edit text on a path, and twist and twirl text using special-effects tools. And if you don't like your experiments, don't sweat it—you've got 99 levels of undo.

The program has some drawbacks, albeit not serious. It takes a while to get used to the way IntelliDraw arranges and integrates documents, palettes, and toolbars on screen. When opening the

flowcharting shape palette, for example, I had to resize it so it wouldn't overlap with my workspace window. In contrast, Visio neatly aligns your workspace and window shapes automatically.

IntelliDraw supports only OLE 1.0-a drawback for anyone wanting 2.0's case. And Adobe's tech support is a labyrinth of voicemail menus before you get to talk to a real person. After your first free call to a toll number, count on paying \$3 per minute for help.

IntelliDraw's slightly awkward interface and unimpressive flowcharting capabilities keep it from being a Best Buy. But overall it's a flexible, versatile, and affordable program that's particularly recommended for anyone who wants to generate charts and graphs with both style and precision. Visio 3.0


PROS: Intuitive layout, large selection of high-quality shapes and templates, easy-to-use connector tool, good on-screen help, 90 days of free tech support

CONS: No text importing, weak text controls, no built-in spelling checker, some shapes lose characteristics when placed in a template



Visio's clean and simple layout makes it one of the easiest business graphics programs to use and helps earn it a Best Buy. In fact, I created a basic organization chart in just 15 minutes-without ever cracking open the manual.

First, I opened an organization chart template, which the \$129 Visio calls a stencil. A blank page appeared on the right side of the screen, and to the left was a window containing a SmartShape

library used for organization charting. I chose the shapes I wanted-dragging each from the left and dropping them into the stencil window on the right-then connected the shapes easily with Visio's connector tool. SmartShapes are editable, too; I stretched a rectangle without distorting the entire shape.

Although Visio doesn't have an auto-align feature like the one in IntelliDraw, I found it easy to align my chart on the page by using the Align and Distribute commands. Whenever I was unsure of what I was doing, Visio's status bar helped to clue me in.


If organization charts are all you need, consider Clear Software's \$59 OrgCharts and Banner Blue's \$140 Org Plus. Both are easy to use and can import

clip art, text, and spreadsheets into your charts.

OrgCharts takes a text-based approach to creating organization charts. Simply fill in one of six preset outlines, and the program translates that information into a chart. You can change shapes, colors, and fonts; and add borders, shadows, and text. Clear Software: 800/338-1759. 617/965-6755 Reader service no. 872

Banner Blue's Org Plus takes a different approach to ease of use. Instead of starting with text, you begin with a chart consisting of two boxes connected by a single line-there are 12 styles to choose from. Add to your chart by selecting the Coworker, Assistant, Manager, or Subordinate buttons from a palette, then choose a spot in your diagram where you want them positioned. You can type in text as you go or build the chart first and add text later. Banner Blue Software: 510/794-6850 Reader service no. 873

Visio's luster dimmed just a bit as I proceeded with my next tests, however. Instead of directly importing text into a flowchart, you must copy and paste text into each object. If you decide to resize the object later, you have to reformat the text inside the objects. And curiously, several of Visio's SmartShapes lost some of their characteristics when I dropped them onto a stencil. For instance, when I selected a yellow, three-drawer file cabinet from the SmartShape library and placed it onto a floor plan, the file drawer suddenly lost its coloring and looked considerably less polished.

Visio's support for nearly every aspect of OLE 2.0 clientserver technology makes it particularly well suited for medium to large companies, or for anyone with the programming know-how to write Visual Basic scripts to take full advantage of OLE 2.0. Corporate users will also appreciate the ability to exchange data easily with Lotus Notes.

In addition to Visio's large collection of bundled shapes, Visio Corporation also sells a variety of highly focused add-on shapes libraries, including ones for electrical engineering, insurance, and biotechnology applications. Each of these add-on libraries sells for about \$50 on the street. The company also sells a \$29 instruction book, called *Developing Visio Shapes*, to help you develop shapes libraries customized for your department or company. Visio's tech support is top-notch. You get 90 days of free calls on a toll line, then you choose from one of three reasonable payment options. Each time I called, a support staffer answered the phone promptly and provided courteous, knowledgeable answers.

Visio's excellent graphics tools, terrific shapes, and first-rate help pull it into first place with ease. Visio may lack the graphics sizzle of IntelliDraw, but it does the best job of letting you crank out a wide variety of sharp-looking drawings. *Visio Corp.*; 800/446-3335, 206/521-4500 Reader service no. 677



New notebooks packed with built-in CD-ROM drives, sound, and

speakers promise all-in-one, on-the-road convenience and portability.

Are they worth the price? By James A. Martin

our boss says to get out there and dazzle prospective clients with a new multimedia presentation: video clips, sophisticated graphics, audio narration, the works. No problem, you say—and immediately phone your chiropractor, because in the past, traveling with an ambitious multimedia show usually meant schlepping a spine-twisting, clavicle-cracking assortment of equipment: a laptop and its peripherals, an external high-capacity hard drive to hold that moving presentation, a pair of external speakers, and maybe even an LCD projection panel.

But put that chiropractor on hold for a moment. Within the last six months, several computer manufacturers have released the first wave of integrated multimedia notebooks with built-in CD-ROM drive, Sound Blaster–compatible 16-bit

audio, internal stereo speakers, audio input and output jacks, a speedy processor, two PC Card (formerly called PCMCIA) 'Type 11 slots (or one Type III slot), and a snazzy color display. Now your company can show its Cecil B. DeMille extravaganza using lightweight compact discs, and you can embark on your road show in unencumbered bliss.

At least, that's the premise behind multimedia notebooks. The reality, as I discovered from hands-on experience with five models, is not always so rosy. First, there's the sticker shock: Several no-frills multimedia notebooks are priced at around \$4000, while the most expensive models can set you back almost as much as a new car.

With most models weighing between 8.8 and 11.2 pounds (once you include the AC adapter, battery, and so on), you're not necessarily done with those chiropractor appointments. Meanwhile, a CD-ROM drive sucks up battery juice with gusto-you're lucky if you get two hours of play from one charge. And choosing a multimedia

notebook essentially means deciding which compromise is the least inconvenient. Despite their drawbacks, the best multimedia notebooks offer allin-one-box convenience and portability you just wouldn't otherwise have.

Here's an evaluation of the first multimedia notebooks to hit the market: MPC's CD-Book 875, Aspen Computer's Universa CD, Toshiba's T2150CDT, Panasonic's V41, and IBM's ThinkPad 755CD. To test their multimedia playback capabilities, I viewed the Video for Windows clips from Byron Preiss Multimedia's Seinfeld Screensaver & Planner CD-

ROM, as well as QuickTime movies from the CNN Time Capsule 1994 CD-ROM (Vicarious Software). I checked to see how fluidlyor fitfully-the videos played on each notebook's LCD screen and, for comparison, on an external monitor (NEC's MultiScan 3FGx); and I compared the notebook speakers' sound quality with that produced by external speakers. I also checked out a variety of notebook features-pointing device, traveling weight, physical dimensions, warranty, and so on. (For a quick comparison of features, see the table "Sizing Up Multimedia Notebooks.")

is an attractive machine, if for no other reason than its (relatively) low price. The \$2458 MPC CD-Book I tested was equipped with 8MB of RAM, a 340MB hard drive, and a DX4-75 processor.

But this system will ultimately disappoint anyone needing a multimedia presentation machine. The colors on the MPC display frequently looked washed out, and there was more ghosting (pale streaks of light) going on than in all the Amityville Horror movies

> combined. Fast video motion was annoyingly jittery. For instance, the CNN Time Capsule video of Nancy Kerrigan's side-to-side twists on the ice wobbles as if it were filmed during an earthquake. In comparison, video playback on the external NEC monitor eliminated the video's jitters.

> Giving a presentation can be unnerving enough. Who needs to worry about something as simple as locating a cursor? It's common for cursors to disappear on dual-scan screens, and the CD-Book 875 display is no exception. Add to that the notebook's uncomfortably stiff pointer, and you're

likely to face an awkward moment before your audience, mumbling, "I know that cursor's around here somewhere." (MPC is replacing its pointer with a touch-sensitive trackpad in its next models.)

Sound capabilities are of course a major feature of the multimedia notebooks. Alas, the stereo speakers that fit inside cannot provide the output needed in a presentation. While you can probably get by with the MPC's internal speakers in intimate surroundings, I wouldn't rely on them to fill a large conference room. External speakers are clearly called for-but that means you've got to cart them along as well as the external floppy drive.

Playing a CD on this notebook is a fairly straightforward affair: Unlatch and lift up the keyboard, drop a disc onto the CD-ROM drive's platter, and snap the keyboard back into place. But bewarewith the keyboard propped open, the drive's sensitive optics are vulnerable to fingerprints, dirt, dust, and the occasional clumsy flight attendant with an open Coke can.

The CD-Book was often painfully slow at simple tasks, such as launching Windows or accessing files. While the dual-scan screen significantly lowers the cost of the machine, it also limits its practicality in group presentations. (A crisper active-matrix screen adds \$1049 to the price of a system). Because of these drawbacks, and despite its weight and price, I can't recommend the CD-Book 875. MPC Technologies, 800/672-9979, 714/724-9000 Reader service no. 736

all me a cheapskate. Call me a technology dinosaur. Call me a Luddite, for heaven's

sake, but I'm perfectly content with my current notebook—even though it could be considered multimedia challenged.

Apparently I am not alone. Thousands of other computer users feel the same way, and hardware vendors have answered our whining with sound cards, CD-ROM players, and a legion of other multimedia combo devices we can just plug in for instant upgrades. Which equipment you need to transform your notebook into a multimedia show machine depends on what it can do now.

If you have a notebook with no audio capabilities, you'll need a PC Card (formerly PCMCIA) sound card, speakers, a CD-ROM drive, and possibly a SCSI card to connect the drive. If your notebook is equipped with stereo sound, you'll still have to invest in a CD-ROM drive, a SCSI card, and-for improved sound-a pair of external speakers. You can buy each device individually, but I wouldn't advise it. Individual components have compatibility problems with each other. (I felt like Judge Wapner as I tried to settle the territorial spats between the sound cards I attempted to add and the SCSI card I was trying to configure. When the sound would work, the CD-ROM was unresponsive, and vice versa.)

Sound Without the Fury

Instead, get a combination package that pairs a sound card and CD-ROM drive in a single unit. These lightweight combo devices plug in and install quickly and without a hassle.

The pioneering \$499 **Z-Play**er from Zenith Data Systems —a bantam, 2-pound CD-ROM drive that has stereo speakers integrated with a 16bit sound card—connects to a

notebook with a supplied Type II PC Card. Powered by six AA batteries, a rechargeable NiCd cell, or an AC adapter, the Z-Player was up and running in just minutes after an easy installation program automatically configured the system. The double-speed CD-ROM drive handled video playback adequately, but the stereo speakers were prone to distortion at medium to high volumes. However, the unit comes equipped with output jacks for external speakers. Like almost all other notebooks with PC Card sound cards, the Z-Player is *not* Sound Blaster compatible—which means it can't handle sound on DOSbased programs.

New Media's \$799 CD Sound Studio weighs 4½ pounds in its attractive, notebook-size casing that fits comfortably under your computer. As with the Z-Player, a simple connection via a PC Card Type II slot gets your notebook singing. The sound quality is particularly good-no doubt because the CD Sound Studio was jointly designed by New Media and speaker maker Altec Lansing (which sells a similar model under its own label). The small speakers placed on the front and side of the unit spew out surprisingly rich treble and bass considering their size.

Axonix's \$559 ProMedia Player has all the bells and whistles: 16-bit audio, 4-watt amplified stereo sound, built-in stereo speakers, a double-speed CD-ROM drive, and output jacks for speakers and a microphone. The ProMedia Player is modular: Each part is also sold separately for \$329

each. Already have or don't need sound on your laptop? Then just plug in the CD-ROM reader module. Sound quality was good enough, if a bit shrill at high volume. The CD-ROM drive offered acceptable playback of data, video, and audio.

Two Cards in One

If you impetuously purchased a portable CD-ROM drive and then realized you didn't have the sound to go with it, you can get a PCMCIA sound card that has a SCSI adapter built in—thus solving the eternal SCSI—sound card conflicts and saving a PC Card slot to boot.

New Media's Multimedia Combo offers 16-bit stereo sound with a high-performance SCSI adapter in a single Plug and Play card. The \$499 PC Card device includes Microsoft Windows Sound System and CorelSC-SI software for no-brainer installation of sound and just about any CD-ROM drive.

ROM to Travel

If you already have 16-bit sound integrated into your notebook, then CD-ROM is all you need to make it multimedia worthy. Your choice of **continued on next page**

continued from previous page drives seems to expand on a monthly basis, too.

EXP Computers' \$449 CD940 is unique in its design: It has no power supply. Instead, the double-speed drive gets the little juice it needs from your notebook via a foot-long cable attached to a PC Card Type I. A 15-second installation procedure gets the 2.8-pound CD940 spinning quickly. It automatically switches off when not in use; that's no big deal, since it doesn't drain battery power.

NEC 'Technologies' \$415 MultiSpin 3Xp Plus is the only

triple-speed portable CD-ROM drive on the market. It transfers data at 500 kilobytes per second (K/sec) with an average access time of 240ms. (Most double speed drives average 300ms access times.) The MultiSpin weighs 4.6 pounds and is powered by an AC adapter or optional battery pack. It does not include the SCSI adapter card you need to connect it to a notebook, making it the most expensive CD-ROM solution we reviewed. While it installed to an NEC Versa notebook in less than a minute, it was troublesome to set up on non-NEC portables. If speed is of the essence, the Multi-Spin 3Xp Plus may be worth the hassle.

Media Vision's \$349 Reno Portable CD-ROM Player (MV0400SE) is the cheapest one available-if you already have a SCSI adapter for your notebook. But it's a "penny wise, pound foolish" solution. A flimsy plastic case brings the drive itself in at just 1.2 pounds (1.8 pounds with batteries). Unfortunately, you must always keep the battery pack attached-even when using the AC adapter-which makes the Reno inconvenient to haul around and assemble. The connection at the rear of the unit is wobbly at best. While this drive might be appropriate at the beach, it certainly would not exude a professional image in the executive conference room. And if you don't have a SCSI card to connect the Reno to your portable PC, add another \$299 to the price. Sony's PRD-150 costs \$499.95 but includes the necessary PC Card connection to hook up the double-speed drive to your notebook. Weighing less than a pound, it is powered

by two AA batteries or an AC adapter. Like the Media Vision Reno, it comes with headphones and front-panel audio CD controls. The clamshell casing is also, alas, like Reno's, and made of unreinforced plastic. So what you save on space and weight, you lose in shock resistance, although its 300 K/sec data transfer rate is fast enough for most multimedia playback.

Panasonic boasts that its KXL-**D720** is the lightest CD-ROM drive available, and at half a pound it might be-if you didn't figure in the AC adapter or six AA batteries it needs to run. The \$399 doublespeed drive is bundled with a PC Card Type II SCSI connector. It sports a clamshell design, but its plastic feels a tad sturdier than that of its competition. Installation was effortless: In less than 5 minutes, my notebook became a multimedia pro.

Parallel Ports in a Storm

Face it—parallel ports are for printers. And since they require no configuring to use, they're convenient—but also slow: A printer does not need the quick, back-and-forth communication a CD-ROM drive demands from a computer's CPU. Still, wouldn't it be nice just to plug in a CD-ROM drive like a printer and get going immediately?

Micro Solutions' **Backpack 4X CD-ROM** provides a 250ms access time, amazingly fast for a parallel port connection. The \$529, 3%-pound, AC-powered drive is solidly constructed and works with both standard and the newer, faster enhanced parallel ports. Installation with the included software takes less than a minute. A printer cable attaches to the throughput connector on the back of the drive.

While this cross section of add-ons is by no means comprehensive, it should give an idea of the ever-increasing choices available—and end the days of your portable being multimedia challenged.

Aspen Universa CD



Let's face it: If you want to project a professional image, you simply can't afford to breeze into a client's office and beam proudly as your presentation plays—on a dual-scan screen. You might as well walk in with toilet paper stuck to your shoe.

Aspen Computer has taken some of the sting out

of buying a notebook with an active-matrix display by equipping its Universa CD notebooks with screens that are slightly smaller (and less expensive) than the Toshiba, IBM, or Panasonic displays. The model I evaluated, for instance—with a DX2-66 processor, 9%-inch active-matrix color display, 8MB of RAM, and a 520MB hard drive—has a manageable list price of \$3675.

Universa's active-matrix screen offered respectably crisp colors and hues. The unit's comparatively sluggish DX2-66 processor, however, caused video frames to freeze now and then, and at times fast movements in the video were jerky on playback. Even more troublesome than the subpar video was the Universa's poor sound quality.

The internal speakers produced a tinny sound that became easily distorted when the volume was increased. Given the Universa's 10.6-pound traveling weight—the second-heaviest notebook I evaluated—I doubt you'll want to lug a pair of external speakers as well.

The Universa's industrial design is well intended but unsuccessful in execution. The computer ships with a floppy drive built for either internal or external use; you can replace the internal CD-ROM drive with the floppy, or connect the floppy to an external port. And while physically swapping the two drives was no problem, the computer didn't recognize the floppy drive when it was installed. I had to fiddle with the config.sys file a bit before the floppy was

accepted in its internal berth.

Another drawback is that the CD loading tray doesn't pull out far enough; to place a disc on the tray, you have to insert it at an awkward angle. In addition, if you don't remember to lock the tray in place with a switch, the computer won't recognize the CD-ROM drive.

Speaking of switches, the on/off switch, located on the top left side, practically takes two hands: one to secure the computer while the other moves the switch. This means you don't have to worry about the computer accidentally switching on in transit and wasting your battery. By the same token, though, you can kiss your fingernails goodbye.

Although the Universa's design quirks are not a huge problem, they certainly won't make your life on the road any easier. And when you factor in the notebook's inferior sound, spotty video playback, and hefty weight, it all adds up to a multimedia portable that, although decently priced for an active-matrix model, requires too many compromises.

(At press time, Aspen introduced an upgraded Universa CD notebook with a zippier DX4-100 processor and 10.4-

Believe it or not, there was such a thing as a multimedia portable before the current wave of sleek notebooks. Toshiba's T'6600C/CD, for example, had a 10.4-inch active-matrix screen, a graphics accelerator, a built-in CD-ROM drive, 16-bit stereo, internal speakers, a decent amount of memory, and a

large hard drive. There were a few slight problems, however: It weighed 19 pounds, looked like a portable sewing machine, had no battery operation, and cost more than \$7000.

I am so thankful that the same functionality now comes in more svelte proportions that it feels like sour grapes to find fault with Toshiba's latest entry in the field—but, alas, I do. First, though, let's consider the Satellite Pro's gold stars. The notebook has a comfortable traveling weight of 8.8 pounds. The internal CD-ROM drive

While more notebooks are being equipped with built-in sound, the tinny tones issuing forth from their diminutive speakers do not enhance a multimedia presentation, let alone private listening. Clearly, you need external speakers with more resonance, and I found the right pair to travel with—the JBL Media 2. When JBL Media 2

upright, the 5-watts-per-channel

speakers are L-shaped. A hinge allows them to lie flat in a carrying case. And they put out sound with enough oomph to carry across any boardroom. No doubt that's because they house separate 3-inch woofers and 1%-inch tweeters, plus a built-in subwoofer to carry the bass sounds usually lost by lesser speakers. The units (\$159.95 a pair) also have an automatic sound-sensitive on/off switch with a power indicator light. JBL Multimedia Division, 800/366-4525 Reader service no. 740 - M. S. L.

is positioned conveniently, in the upper right corner, and the disc tray pulls out far enough so you can easily load a disc. At 5.33 hours (without the CD-ROM drive in use), the Toshiba's battery lasted the longest of the multimedia notebooks we tested. Best of all, the stereo sound issuing from the Toshiba's twin internal speakers was top-notch, capable of reaching high volumes without distortion.

Ultimately, however, the Satellite Pro was a disappointment. The DX4-75-powered computer played back Video for Windows files

without much of a problem, save for occasional jerkiness. But Quick'Time for Windows files suffered from some extreme synchronization problems. In a news clip from the CNN Time Capsule disc, for instance, Tonya Harding's words were always about 2 to 3 seconds behind her mouth movements; this, while perhaps poetic justice, does not help sell a multimedia presentation. Other CNN files produced similar results.

Meanwhile, the Toshiba's 10.4-inch active-matrix display suffered from poor contrast and color saturation. In fact, several people in the PC World Test Center were convinced it was a dual-scan screen. Given all that, the price of the model I evaluated—\$3799—secms too high. After a few hours with the Satellite Pro, in fact, I felt twinges of nostalgia for that chunky Toshiba multimedia portable of yesterday. At press time Toshiba announced new 700C Series 90-MHz Pentium notebooks with 11.3-inch color displays, 16-bit audio, and optional quad-speed CD-ROM drives. *Toshiba America Information Systems*, 800/334-3445, 714/583-3000 Reader service no. 738

PROJECTING THE RIGHT IMAGE: LCD PROJECTION PANELS

ou can have an absolutely dazzling, knock-'em-dead, multimedia blitz of a presentation. But if those images aren't projected on a big screen with the sharpness and clarity they require, you might as well be standing there with

handwritten paper flash cards.

Projecting high-quality images requires an LCD projection panel—typically a notebook-size, two-sided screen connected to your portable computer's external monitor port and placed on an overhead projector. None of these panels are cheap—from \$2500 to \$7000, depending on screen quality and their multimedia capabilities.

With that type of investment, it's all the more important to select a panel that produces a crisp duplicate image of what appears on your computer screen. The four key criteria for selecting an LCD projection panel are:

 Portability. Keeping down the panel's weight is as important as making sure it's easy to carry—particularly in combination with your other equipment. • Durability. With repeated setup and disassembly, the panel needs to withstand constant handling.

• Usability. Not only does a panel need to project well, but it must be able to make

your presentation an easy process. Extra technical hassles are the last thing you need when you're trying to make a good impression.

• Features. It should be able to output at least 256 colors—and ideally up to 16.8 million; screen resolution should equal what a monitor could handle—at least 640 by 480 and preferably

up to 1024 by 768; it should be an activematrix model, which offers crisper imaging than dual-scan; and it should be laden with multimedia capabilities (built-in stereo speakers, external ports for additional speakers, and inputs for VHS and broadcast reception).

Of course, all panels are dependent on the intensity of the light source in the overhead projector they are paired with. My focus is on multimedia capability. Accordingly, I looked at midpriced panels from three leading vendors: In Focus Systems, nView, and Polaroid. I assessed how well these fairly sophisticated devices measure up to the four criteria. All models offered active-matrix, high-resolution display; multimedia sound and video output; and remote control operation. For the first


> three criteria, I ranked the models as Acceptable, Good, or Excellent.

By far the bulkiest of the three panels I used, the 5%-pound, \$5799 Panel-Book 550 cleverly stores its controls in a sliding drawer that even has a re-

cessed compartment for its convenient remote control unit. The hardest part of setting up the PanelBook was figuring out how to open the drawer—and once I did, it was difficult to open it without leaving fingerprints on the screen. Installation took 5 minutes and consisted of plugging in the power cord and the connector cable to the computer's external monitor port. On-screen imaging from the 9.4-inch ac-

With their crisp, vibrant, and large color LCD screens, high-speed DX4-100 processors, and various multimedia extras, the Panasonic V41 and IBM ThinkPad 755CD are the only notebooks of the current crop worth considering for professional multimedia needs. Of course, with their prices-\$4599 for the V41, \$6799 for the Think-Pad-no one but professionals with serious multimedia needs could justify buying them anyhow.

The Panasonic's 10.4-inch, active-matrix screen renders up to 65,536 gorgeous colors and yields superb contrast. Indeed, when placed beside the ThinkPad's high-quality, 10.4-inch, active-matrix screen (also capable of 65,536 colors), the Panasonic display was noticeably-though not dramatically-superior.

Video playback, for the most part, was smooth on both systems, with none of the fast-motion jitters or cursor disappearing acts 1 noticed on some other notebooks. But like the Toshiba, the V41 had sync problems matching audio with video in some Quick'Time for Windows clips. The Panasonic played Video for Windows files from the Seinfeld platter without problems.

The ThinkPad, with a built-in video accelerator that optimizes avi files, had a slight edge over the V41 when playing Video for Windows files at full screen. The difference in performance was



Capable of handling about 16.8 million colors from a computer or any video source-and with all requisite ports clearly marked for quick setup-the panel is housed in a sturdy, high-impact plastic shell case. I didn't need the instruction book to figure out how to set up or use the remote control, which handles the onscreen mouse for truly free movement during presentations. A built-in stereo amplifier that connects to any audio source (including a microphone and external speakers) is a convenient plus. A "mask" feature let me hide my presentation screens until I was ready to reveal them. With the remote's easy-to-learn special effects, I was able to freeze, enlarge, or do an inverse view of the screen-on the fly.

CARRYING THE LOAD: AN OPEN-AND-SHUT CASE

otebook computers are designed to travel, right? Then why do so few notebook manufacturers include a protective carrying case with machines that can cost more than \$7000?

While the omission might seem like cheapskate marketing, it is also a blessing in disguise. Third-

party luggage and accessory companies have leapt in to fill the void with a vast array of carrying cases—from traditional soft-sided leather and nylon attaché-style luggage to more pragmatic notebook backpacks and even packs with a neoprene wetsuit-like fabric that fits your notebook like, well, a wetsuit.

No matter what fabric or design you favor, some important considerations should figure in your buying decision:

• How much weight will the bag add to your carrying load? Three to six extra pounds might not seem much, but it certainly does if you have to schlep it to the last gate at the airport.

• Does the bag offer enough padding to protect your notebook in case you drop it? One of the single largest causes of notebook malfunctions is impact damage.

• Are there enough compartments to store accessories—power cord, multimedia speakers, files and office supplies for the road?

Are the dimensions right or adjustable to fit your notebook?

With those criteria in mind, I cased out the cases that would let me pack my road warrior equipment safely, snugly, conveniently, and above all else, *lightly*.

Zeos is one of those rare computer vendors that actually includes a carrying case with many of its pricier notebooks. For the lower end models, bags are strictly à la carte. One of my favorites is Zeos's \$59 case made of ballistic nylon (the almost indestructible material used in parachutes); while it is specifically designed to fit Zeos units, I was able to jam my larger ThinkPad in the well-padded compartment. The 3-pound nylon bag is not only the lightest of the briefcase-style cases, it also sports a sturdy, soft foam handle that makes carrying a breeze. For \$118 you can buy a soft-sided 3.8-pound leather version that looks très executive but lacks its nylon sibling's firm handle. If your notebook is more than 8 inches long or 12 inches wide, the Zeos bags will be too small. Zeos, 800/554-5220, reader service no. 741

While the \$42 Lands' End Original Attaché was not designed

with computers in mind, it's a nice match for virtually *any* size notebook. For another \$25, you can get a canvas computer case that slips around your portable like a padded glove and fits easily in the main compartment of the attaché (which comes in eight colors), along with all your accessories. The combined weight for the attaché and the computer case is 3.8 pounds, and when I'm not carrying a computer, I have lots of space for other things that I often tote around.

If your traveling road show includes a heavy or bulky entourage of equipment, try Mascot Metropolitan's \$195 high-tech Tutto Compu-Cruiser. The 20-by-13-inch bag has four built-in

wheels (instead of the usual two) on a fiberglass frame that's sturdy enough to handle a top-loaded 100-pound stack. Inside the ballistic nylon case are removable padded bags to protect computer equipment and a bevy of side pockets for files and accessories. A retractable Ushaped puller bar made hauling a 50-pound load seem like carrying feather pillows. To top it off, the Compu-Cruiser fits most airlines' carry-on requirements. Mascot Metropolitan, 800/949-1288, reader service no. 743

Silicon Sports' \$60 to \$200 Notebook Back-Packs (in nylon or leather) will appeal to just about anybody who has previously endured the aches and

pains of lugging conventional shoulder-strap cases. The wellpadded, hands-free bag has accordion dividers for paperwork and books and assorted pockets for accessories and other equipment. I like the feather-light 1.8-pound backpack because it camouflages the presence of an expensive computer. Silicon Sports, 800/243-2972, reader service no. 744

Among the glut of conventionally styled notebook PC attachés, a couple stand out. The designers of Targus cases must actually use the bags they create-they offer comfort and practicality. The \$119 Universal Notebook Case has all the expected (and needed) pockets for cords, AC adapters, floppy disks, accessories, papers, and other doodads. The squat 4-pound case fits not only a notebook but a personal printer or similar-sized device in separate padded, counterbalanced compartments. Targus, 800/390-4622, reader service no. 745

ASU's \$70 nylon JT Madison Softside Portfolio Case weighs 3.4 pounds and looks like an unobtrusive attaché. It's designed for frequent fliers by a company that specializes in luggage for airline flight crews. And while Kensington's \$89 nylon Notebook Traveler weighs in at a relatively hefty 4.2 pounds (the leather one is a whopping 5.4 pounds), its sturdy foam-covered handle and roomy interior offer both carrying comfort and padded security for computers, accessories, and lots of files.

So I'm walking through the PC World Test Center, carrying my notebook in Coach's Organizer Brief-the elite leathersmith's first attaché designed for mobile warriors-when a technician at a Pentium PC yells, "Hey, that's a smart-looking attaché you got there, can I try it out?" Imagine, someone wanting to try out a briefcase? But this is a Coach, a name synonymous with luxury, meticulous craftsmanship, and smart design. "Wow, that leather is just like buttah, isn't it?" Yes. "I bet it costs a lot." Yup, and at \$488, the No. 532 is more an investment than a simple purchase. But given Coach's track record, it will last a lifetime. Although it looks particularly sturdy, it weighs just 4.6 pounds. Sleek zippered, ballistic-nylon-lined sections for papers and accessories and an adjustable padded compartment for any notebook help balance the load, making it easier to carry. marginal but still perceptible. The Seinfeld clips looked almost realtime on the ThinkPad, as if I were watching a broadcast on a somewhat snowy TV screen.

If full-screen playback is important to you, take note: Panasonic is also shipping the CF-VEV411, a \$649 MPEG plug-in module that lets you play files in any software-video format at full screen, without loss of resolution. (At press time, Panasonic also announced two new Pentium-based multimedia notebooks with suggested list prices from \$6799 to \$7399. These notebooks are additions to the Panasonic mobile multimedia line and are identical to the V41 except for their faster processors, the company said.)

As with the MPC notebook, you access the Panasonic's CD-ROM drive by lifting the keyboard and dropping a disc onto the drive's exposed optics (just hope a disc is all you drop onto the drive). The floppy drive shares the same slot as the main battery, so you can't have both CD-ROM and floppy drive access while running on batteries. Not that it would matter: PC World Test Center battery tests showed the Panasonic running out of juice after 2 hours and 18 minutes-and that's without using the CD-ROM drive.

The ThinkPad CD-ROM drive uses a more traditional CD loading tray. The drive's optics are visible on the tray, so once again, butterfingers beware. Like most major ThinkPad components, the drive is removed by lifting up the keyboard and pulling the drive from its slot. You'll have to remove the CD-ROM drive, in fact, if you want to use a floppy, as the two drives share a slot. I found the keyboard difficult to unlatch, and after a few openings and closings, one of the latch springs went sproing, making it virtually impossible to snap the keyboard entirely shut on the left side.

Overall, the ThinkPad has more multimedia bells and whistles than the other notebooks I looked at. Its internal speakers are excellent, although I did notice some distortion at higher volumes. There's also built-in video capture for importing still images and motion video into your presentation. The IBM Mwave digital signal processor offers a 32-voice MIDI synthesizer, a 14.4-kbps faxmodem; and computer telephony capabilities, including a fullduplex speakerphone, an answering machine, and voice messaging.

The ThinkPad has other advantages over the V41: It's lighter and smaller, and IBM's textured, rubber-tip TrackPoint III input device is easier to use than Panasonic's trackball. More important, the ThinkPad is backed by a 30-day money-back guarantee, on-site service, and 24-hour telephone support; the V41 is not.

The Panasonic V41 is a solid machine. But if you're willing to spend \$4599 for it, consider spending more to invest in the feature-rich ThinkPad 755CD instead. IBM now offers a faster \$7499 75-MHz Pentium version, the 757CX. Panasonic Personal Computer Company, 800/742-8086 Reader service no. 739 IBM PC Company, 800/426-2968


The Dream Machine

If the top-notch ThinkPad *still* isn't perfect, then what would it take to make a flawless multimedia notebook system? I'd start with the MPC CD-Book 875's price tag (\$2458); throw in the Panasonic V41's display and zippy CPU performance; and stir in the Think-Pad's easily exchangeable components, fluid video playback, telephony features, full-size keyboard and TrackPoint, and sleck black casing. I'd add some petite, internal Bose speakers—something powerful enough to knock every tchotchke off the shelf. I'd include speech-recognition hardware and software ("Computer, play Myst for me!"), and batteries that last at least 4 hours—with the CD-ROM drive in use, natch. And I'd want to use an internal CD- ROM, floppy, and hard drive *without swapping components*. Finally, I'd want this dream notebook to weigh 5 or 6 pounds, tops.

This dream is still a couple of years away. Until then, corporate travelers with a multimedia mandate have a choice: Spend \$6799 on an IBM ThinkPad 755CD—or keep paying those chiropractor bills.





nly last year, getting a Pentium system was a distant dream for most of us. Pentium-60 PCs had just rolled onto the scene with great fanfare and steep \$5000 prices. Sure, they were screamers, but who could afford them?



Note that we say *Pentium-level* power. Over half the PCs on the Budget Desktops chart are not based on Pentiums at all, but on a variety of 486 chips—mostly the 100-MHz DX4. However, DX4-100 systems using both Intel and AMD ver-

sions of that chip perform every bit as well as a typical Pentium-60 PC in common business applications and often cost noticeably less. It's no surprise many vendors have dropped Pentium-60 computers from their product lines in the last few months. In fact, the Pentium-75 PC may be the next star of the budget category. Four Pentium-75 desktops—including the top-rated



Vektron and the number five Best Buy Dimension XPS P75 from Dell—grace the Budget Top 20 this month.

Newcomer Vektron sent us the most stunning example of the kind of PC you can get on the cheap these days. Its PCI P75 minitower is very fast even for a Pentium-75 system. While it falls noticeably behind the Pentium-90s on our Power Desktops Top 20 chart, the PCI P75 delivers an awesome amount of performance for such a low-cost system. In fact, it keeps pace with a third of the Pentium-90 computers we have in our desktop PC database. The PCI P75 also has commendable features, including an 852MB hard disk and a 15-inch monitor. Would you believe a price of \$1695? Even with minimal support policies, including a short one-year warranty and a brief 8 hours of tech support per weekday, this PC is still a sweet deal and easily earns the number one slot on our Budget Desktops chart this month. Even if you added a CD-ROM drive, you'd still pay less than \$2000 for this system.

Close on the heels of the Vektron are two minitowers

from Micro Express. Our number two system is the MicroFlex-VL/80. This Am486DX2-80 is light on components, but at \$1383 it's your top choice if you want Pentium-60–level power at a rock-bottom price. True, the VL/80 doesn't keep up with the actual Pentium-60 PCs in our Budget Desktops Top 20 chart, but it's as fast as the typical Pentium-60 in our database. Plus, it's eminently upgradable. Coming in third is Micro Express's MicroFlex-PCI/104, based on AMD's AmDX4-100 CPU. It offers nearly the same performance as the VL/80, and it comes with 16MB of RAM and a double-speed CD-ROM drive—a superb deal for \$1599.

If you want power, power, and more power, the Pentium-120s are where it's at. New last month, these top-speed systems took the Power Desktops Top 20 by storm. All but one of the Pentium-120 desktops we've reviewed so far, including this month's Everex If you're looking for a first-class power note, however, and money is no object, we suggest you start your search with the T4900CT it excels in every regard. One of the few notes to sport a Pentium-75 CPU, the T4900CT is every bit as fast as the top-rated Liberty, and it's decked out with a huge 810MB hard drive and beautiful 10.4-inch active-matrix screen that displays over 65,000 colors at once. Plus, Toshiba offers some of the best support you can find among purveyors of notebooks. You pay a premium for all this quality, though: Toshiba just slashed the price of the T4900CT by \$940, but the unit still sells for a cool \$6499.

The WinBook XP SX-33 Monochrome heads up the budget list for the third month running. If you can live with a monochrome screen and a small 260MB hard disk, this system is your best choice, thanks to a great \$1739 price and the longest battery life

HOW THE TOP 20s HELP YOU FIND THE RIGHT PC

Our monthly roundup of desktops and notebooks helps even the terminally technophobic quickly choose the best system for their needs. We examine all the aspects of a PC--performance, feature set, upgradability, reliability, and service and support--and compare the system not only to the other computers reviewed this month, but to all the systems we've reviewed in the past ten months that are still on the market. Every month we call vendors to get the latest prices for all the desktops and notebooks previously reviewed, and we note any configuration changes, such as larger hard disks or faster CD-ROM drives. Our database ranks have swelled to more than 300 computers—meaning we come up with the best of all the systems out there. *PC World*'s Top 20 charts are the only source you need to make a fully informed buying decision.

(8.8 hours) we've ever seen. Another WinBook, the Win-Book XP DX2-50 Monochrome, slides into the number two spot in the budget section of the Notebook PCs Top 20. Even though this \$1799 unit is based on the DX2-50 processor, it's a near perfect twin of its SX-33based sibling in terms of performance and features, and it has an excellent 6.8-hour battery life. Both of these WinBook models are extremely portable, weighing

Step SP/120, are in the Power Desktops Top 20, and three of them are Best Buys. Dell's Dimension XPS P120c and Micron's P120 Millennia, both reviewed last month, stay at number one and two. Both are awesome performers, especially the Micron, which is one of the fastest PCs on the planet. The Dell edges it out, however, even though it's considerably more expensive than the Micron (\$4689 versus \$3799). Why? The XPS P120c has superior features and a superb reliability record. In third place is Dell's Dimension XPS P90. Even though the top power systems offer more muscle and features than ever before, these hotshots are more affordable than you might think: The typical Top 20 power system costs well under \$4000. Most of the Pentium-90 systems on the Power Desktops chart sell in the low \$3000s.

The action is quieter on the notebook front, but we're seeing some motion there, too. Three new totables entered the Notebook PCs Top 20, including the top power Best Buy, Gateway 2000's Liberty DX4-100, a feisty little system with a very friendly \$2979 price. The Liberty DX4-100 is the fastest unit available if you don't want to spend big bucks on a Pentium notebook—plus you get an amazing 6.8 hours of battery life, a removable 352MB hard disk, and a 10.4-inch dual-scan screen. Gateway managed to squeeze all this—along with an external floppy drive—into a slim 6.6-pound package measuring just a little over an inch thick. The Liberty is such a good deal, in fact, that it managed to keep Toshiba's classy T4900CT notebook out of the number one power spot. only 6.8 pounds, and both come with 14.4-kbps fax-modems.

The upshot? If you've put off buying a system during the last year, it's time to take another look at your budget. Whether you're searching for a desktop or a notebook, you can now get more power and features than ever in an affordable computer.





Now these systems occupy over half the Power Top 20 chart, and nearly all our power Best Buys are based on one of these two chips. Pentium-90 PCs have had their heyday on the power chart; it shouldn't be too long before cost-conscious buyers start adding Pentium-90 computers to their shopping lists. In fact, half a dozen Pentium-90 systems we've tested sell for less than our budget category's price ceiling of \$2250.

The top power desktops these days are packing stunning peripherals. Massive 1GB hard drives and 16MB of RAM are the norm, and chances are good that the PG comes with a 17-inch monitor. Half of these powerhouses also come with high-quality multimedia capabilities, including quadruple-speed CD-ROM drives, 16-bit Sound Blaster–compatible sound cards, and speakers.

The supplied 14.4-kbps fax-modem does the legwork for both.

The AT&T Globalyst 630 offers plenty of room to grow, with three free drive bays and six free slots, including three for PCI. And the company backs the unit with a three-year warranty and around-the-clock toll-free tech support. Readers responding to our Reliability and Service Monitor rate the company extremely highly for system reliability and give it high marks for service as well. The only drawback to this machine is the manuals, which are sparse on illustrations and simple explanations. Even so, the AT&T Globalyst 630 is an outstanding package and well deserves its Best Buy status.

marks slightly ahead of a typical Pentium-90 PC. But the Ready 9510 really gets down to business with a telephony card that combines voice mail, 16-bit sound, 14.4-kbps fax and data communications, and voice mail. This system also includes a fast quadruplespeed CD-ROM drive, speakers,

and a microphone. To top it off, NEC bundles Microsoft Encarta '95 and Intuit's Quicken.

True, the NEC Ready 9510 misses a beat here and there. Its beautiful 15-inch NEC XV15 monitor is ill served by the limited 1MB integrated graphics subsystem—we recommend you get 2MB of graphics RAM. Also, expandability is just okay, with four free slots and three free drive bays. Still, there's much to recommend this reasonably priced power system, including NEC's topnotch service and support. While toll-free technical support is available 11.5 hours per day weekdays only, you get a long threeyear warranty, excellent documentation, and one year of free onsite service. Best of all, the company has done very well in our reader fax-back survey, with above-average marks in system reliability and some of the highest service marks in the business.

In short, if you need to set up shop, you can't go wrong with the NEC Ready 9510. Its strong performance, solid price, and intriguing set of features make it a great home or office tool.

By performance standards the PowerPlus is tops, besting nearly every Pentium-100 we've seen and placing respectably among the handful of P-120s we've tested so far.

Austin complements the desktop's Pentium-100 processor with 16MB of RAM and a spacious 1083MB hard drive. The graphics



are guided by a 4MB 32-bit Stealth 64 VRAM graphics card. Sitting atop the compact desktop case, the 17-inch programmable monitor from Smile International offers a generous viewable area of 15.8 inches and is capable of 76-Hz refresh rates at 1024 by 768 resolution (for a review, see "Big Screens," April 1995). For fast Net surfing or snappy remote-control

communications, Austin packs the U.S. Robotics 28.8 Sportster fax-modem, which cruises along at 28.8 kbps. Multimedia offerings include a Toshiba quad-speed CD-ROM drive, a 16-bit sound card, and a pair of external Jazz speakers. The PowerPlus 100 also comes with one of the better software bundles we've seen, includ-

Expandability is okay, considering this compact is already pretty loaded. The PowerPlus 100 comes with three free expansion slots and three free drive bays. An impressive warranty includes three years of coverage, 24-hour tech support available seven days a week, and a year of free on-site service.

The verdict? This is not a PC for the budget-minded buyer. But for those who need a complete power desktop, the Austin Power-Plus 100 is one of the most attractive systems you can find.

Vektron Ultimate Power Station P100

PROS: Superspeedy performer, huge 2GB hard drive, fast quadruple-speed CD-ROM drive CONS: A bit pricey, one-year warranty, cable clutter, so-so support policies

The \$4040 Vektron Ultimate Power Station P100 should dazzle even the most jaded PC buyer. Not only does it outshine the average Pentium-100 system, but it's also as fast as most Pentium-120 PCs we've seen. This unit's 16MB of RAM certainly contributes to its amazing speed, and the whopping 2147MB Seagate SCSI hard

drive should handle your storage needs for some time to come. The PC also has a built-in SCSI port.

The Vektron's vast hard disk capacity and great graphics performance make it an alluring system for graphic artists. The 2MB ATI Graphics Pro Turbo accelerator is one of the fastest boards we've

ever tested, and it lets you view flicker-free images at resolutions up to 1280 by 1024 on the unit's 17-inch monitor. A fast quadruplespeed SCSI CD-ROM drive enhances the loading of CD-ROMbased clip art and applications. The system lacks some multimedia features, however-you need to spend another \$150 or so if you want a sound card and speakers.

The expansion options on the Ultimate Power Station are quite good. This tower has five free drive bays and five free slots, including two PCI slots. However, Vektron's support policies could use some punching up. The company offers a short one-year warranty and brief 8-hour-a-day, weekday-only tech support. But you do get a 30-day money-back guarantee, and on-site service for one year is available for \$50.

If you crave a feature-packed system, the Vektron Ultimate Power Station P100 should be on your short list. Its huge hard disk, fast CD-ROM drive, large monitor, and speedy accelerator card will please many a power user.



PROS: Excellent performance, 17-inch monitor, three-year warranty **CONS:** No multimedia

Everex successfully throws its hat into the Pentium-120 ring with the Step SP/120, a strong value in a power desktop. As you might expect, this PC is very fast, although it's no faster than some of the Pentium-100 systems we've seen. Yet its \$3395 price is on a par with that of a typical Pentium-90 unit. You get 16MB of RAM, 256K of secondary cache, a big 1278MB hard drive, and an attractive, spacious 17-inch monitor. The 64-bit ATI Graphics Pro Turbo card, equipped with 2MB of VRAM, displays images at resolutions



up to 1280 by 1024 on the big screen-terrific for graphic artists and others who need to see fine detail on screen. Both the monitor and the graphics card support a reasonably fast refresh rate of 72 Hz.

Where the Everex falls short is in multimedia components-there aren't any. But the Step SP/120

gives you lots of room to grow. This minitower comes with six free drive bays and five free slots, including two for PCI; you can increase the secondary cache to 1MB; and there's plenty of room to add RAM. No need to worry about getting adequate support for this powerhouse, either. Everex backs its computer with a lengthy three-year warranty, free on-site service for the first year, and a three-day turnaround on factory repairs, as well as the usual fax and BBS support. Lack of weekend tech support is the only surprisewe're used to seeing this from the better-known vendors.

The Everex Step SP/120 has plenty to tempt savvy buyers. The system is fast, it has quality components, and it doesn't cost a fortune. You'll have to pay extra for the multimedia upgrade, and the lack of weekend support can be limiting, but this is an excellent package for the money.



Top 20 Budget Desktops

THIS MONTH'S PCS REVAMPED THE BUDGET Desktops Top 20 chart. There are seven new entries, including two new Best Buys.

The Pentium-75 PC bears watching. The Vektron PCI P75-a nicely decked-out system for an amazing \$1695-debuted at the top of the chart. Meanwhile, Dell's multimedia-ready Pentium-75 PC held its Best Buy status for the third month in a row. The Dimension XPS P75 is slow for a Pentium-75, but this \$2163 minitower has a solid configuration, including a 545MB hard disk, a 15-inch monitor, and a CD-ROM drive; and Dell provides highly reputable service and support. Right behind the Dell is Netis's Pentium-75 PC, new this month. Netis's support doesn't stand out, but the \$2115 N575 is a bruiser-as fast as some of the slower P-90-based units we've tested. It comes with a cavernous 1278MB hard drive and multimedia components, including a quad-speed CD-ROM drive.

Expect prices to keep dropping as rival CPU makers keep the pressure on Intel. Six of this month's budget PCs are based on AMD processors, the most ever in any category. AMD's presence should grow-Compag plans to use the company's 90- and 100-MHz 486 chips in its Presario line. Compag also plans to use Pentium-level NexGen processors in future systems.



Vektron PCI P75

PROS: Fastest PC available under \$2000, good expandability, large hard disk CONS: Short one-year warranty

This Vektron's \$1695 price is so low, we thought it was a typo, especially after our benchmark testing clocked this Pentium-75 PC at speeds comparable to those of most Pentium-90 systems we've seen. We're used to seeing machines this fast at twice the price. This minitower features a roomy 852MB hard drive and 256K of secondary cache upgradable to 512K, and most users will be satisfied with the graphics subsystem, which consists of a 2MB Stealth 64-bit card and a 15-inch monitor.

Upgraders will be pleased to find plenty of expansion space: three free drive bays and six free slots. Unfortunately, Vektron's support policies are less generous: a one-year warranty, optional on-



site service, and a two-day turnaround on factory repairs. Tech support is toll-free, but you can call only during business hours.

Bottom line? Budget PC seekers will be hard-pressed to find a better price on a high-speed system. This machine is so inexpensive that it would still be a great deal even if

you spent extra money adding multimedia features. The Vektron PCI P75 absolutely deserves its number one ranking this month.

Micro Express MicroFlex-VL/80 **REVIEWED: March 1995**

This nice AMD Am486DX2-80 minitower with 8MB of RAM, a 425MB hard disk, a respectable 15-inch monitor, a 2MB graphics controller, and good expandability performs almost at the level of a typical Pentium-60-and has a fantastic \$1383 price.



Micro Express MicroFlex-PCI/104 **NEW THIS MONTH**

It's amazing to find a multimedia system with Pentium-level speed from a reasonably well known company for only \$1599. Even though the competition is keener than ever, the MicroFlex-

PCI/104 is an astounding deal and an obvious budget desktops Best Buy. This roomy AmDX4-100 minitower moved briskly through our benchmarks, turning in speeds comparable to those of Pentium-60 systems. The 540MB hard drive and 256K of secondary cache are par for the course, but we were



pleased to find 16MB of RAM and a double-speed CD-ROM drive. And the graphics subsystem is okay-the 2MB 32-bit PCI accelerator is paired with a 15-inch monitor. Upgradability? You get three free slots, including one for PCI; four free drive bays, three of them externally accessible; and three free SIMM sockets for cost-effective RAM expandability.

Micro Express's support policies are solid, including a two-year warranty and free on-site service for the first year. You get only 9 hours of toll-free support on weekdays, but during evenings and weekends you can call a toll number, leave a message, and get a callback (usually within a few hours, according to the company). All in all, the Micro Express MicroFlex-PCI/104 is a tremendous package for the price.

We're seeing more and more budget Pentium-75 PCs, and this latest Netis machine is a good example. The N575's fine performance almost earns it a Best Buy.

The Netis's performance is excellent, with scores falling between those of the average Pentium-75 and Pentium-90 systems. You also get some great components, like a cavernous 1278MB hard drive, a quad-speed CD-ROM drive, a sound card, and speakers. Together, the 2MB PCI graphics adapter and 15-inch mon-



itor support resolutions up to 1280 by 1024.

This compact has decent expandability-you get four free drive bays and four free slots, including two for PCI. But the support package is just so-so, with a minimal one-year warranty and tech support available just 10 hours a day, Monday through Saturday. Also, the manuals are too technical and confusing, lacking illustrations and detail. Still, the N575 is a superb deal for \$2115.



Modestly priced at \$1849, PerComp's 4100VIP multimedia desktop vaults high onto our Budget Desktops Top 20. Despite its pedestrian 8MB of RAM, this AmDX4-100-based computer performs on a par with a typical Pentium-60-class PC. In addition to a big 850MB hard drive, you get a double-speed CD-ROM drive, a 16-bit sound card, a set of speakers, and a good selection of Microsoft CD titles, including the Works integrated package and Encarta. The graphics setup is middle of the road: A 15-inch monitor teams up with Diamond's Stealth 64 1MB PCI graphics accel-

erator to provide images at up to 1024 by 768 resolution. You can install four more cards (three PCI), four free bays allow room for more drives, and one free SIMM socket gives you room to upgrade RAM. PerComp backs its PC with a long three-year warranty; seven-day-aweek, 24-hour toll-free technical support; and a promise to turn around factory repairs within a sin-



gle business day. All things considered, the PerComp 4100VIP's aggressive low price, solid performance, decent multimedia bundle, and impressive support package earn it a comfortable spot on this month's Budget Desktops Top 20.



tested had no secondary cache. However, it came with 16MB of high-performance EDO RAM, the likeliest cause of the excellent performance. This minitower also comes with a 540MB hard drive, a 15-inch monitor with a 2MB 64-bit graphics accelerator, and a doublespeed CD-ROM drive. And there's

plenty of room to add components: You get five free bus slots (including one for a VL card) plus four free bays. Polywell stands behind all its systems with an excellent warranty for five years on labor and two years on parts. Tech support is available Monday through Saturday.

Pentium-75-level speed, good expandability, and above-par support for \$1950-no wonder the Polywell DX4-100ED makes our Budget Desktops Top 20 chart.

The Premier's graphics subsystem is a mixed bag-the 2MB 64-bit PCI graphics accelerator is nice, but we



were disappointed by the fuzzy 14-inch monitor.

Expandability is okay for a loaded compact: You get four free expansion slots and three free drive bays. However, both SIMM sockets are filled, so you must dispose of one or both of the existing SIMMs to add RAM. Austin's support policies are good. This PC comes with substandard manuals but is backed by a three-year warranty and 24-hour tech support.

The bottom line? Despite quibbles about design and upgradability, the Premier PCI DX4-100 is an exceptional deal even in today's ferociously competitive PC market.



Top 20 Notebooks

TWO NEW POWER NOTEBOOKS HIT THE Notebook PCs Top 20 this month. Gateway 2000's Liberty DX4-100 soared right to the top with impressive power, a long 6.8-hour battery life, and a light 6.6-pound weight. If you're looking for a true multimedia notebook, check out Toshiba's Satellite Pro T2150CDT, the number five note in the power section. At \$5199 it's expensive, and it weighs a heavy 8.8 pounds, but it offers a built-in doublespeed CD-ROM drive, 16-bit sound, a color-rich active-matrix screen, and a long 5.3-hour battery life. MPC's TouchNote 700, number three in the budget section, is the sole new budget entry this month, and a worthy one: \$2345 buys you fast DX4-75 speed, a 528MB hard disk, built-in sound, and a near 5-hour battery life.

Notebook features have improved across the board. Nearly all our Top 20 units have color screens: vivid active-matrix on the power units and dual-scan on the budgets. The average hard disk size on the budget units is over 300MB, and over 500MB on the power portables. Meanwhile, the price of the power number ten MidWest Micro SoundBook Plus P-90 Color (reviewed in April) dropped by over \$600. This superspeedy Pentium-90 note is among the fastest you can buy, and it's now a lot more affordable.

Power Notebooks



Gateway 2000 Liberty DX4-100

PROS: Fast DX4100 performance, outstanding battery life CONS: Dull screen, awkward pointing device

A portable computer has to have a lot of things to finish high in the power portion of our Notebook PCs Top 20 chart—speedy performance, light weight, outstanding battery life, and good expandability, as well as decent backing from the company. Gateway 2000's Liberty DX4-100 delivers so well on all counts that it's this month's top choice for a power notebook. The Liberty is one of the fastest DX4-100s we've ever tested. The battery life is excellent as well—almost 7 hours on a single charge. An extra nickel-metal-hydride (NiMH) battery is included, and the Liberty will accept lithium-ion battery packs when they become available for this unit. You also get 8MB of RAM, a 352MB removable hard disk (useful for data security), and 256K of secondary cache. The 10.4-inch dual-scan color screen is one of the largest you can buy, and it displays 640 by 480 resolution at 256 colors. It may not be your first choice for presentations or heavy-duty

graphics, but most users will be satisfied. Plus, the system lets you display up to 1024 by 768 resolution onto an external monitor. The price for all this? Only \$2979, not too much above our budget category's price ceiling for notebook computers.



There's more good news. The Liberty is exceptionally portable, weigh-

ing only 5.8 pounds without the external 3½-inch floppy drive. If you take the drive with you, the notebook ensemble tops out at a still-light 6.6 pounds. At just over 1 inch thick, this is one of the thinnest notebooks we've seen, yet it still has good expandability. If you need to plug in a fax-modem, you can use the PC Card (formerly called PCMCIA) slot, which accepts either one Type III card or two Type II cards.

Some users may find the EZ Point pointing device awkward because of its stiff action and its placement away in the upper right corner, but the keyboard feels solid and comfortable. The Liberty DX4-100 has a convenient pair of flip-out hind feet to tilt the keyboard slightly forward for those who prefer it that way.

No, it's not always a perfect world even when you're number one. This PC's dual-scan passive color suffers from a dull gray-blue tint. Also, Gateway's support policies are unexceptional. While the company backs its notebook with a 30-day money-back guarantee and 18 hours of toll-free technical support Monday through Saturday, the one-year warranty is short. Still, with tremendous DX4-100 performance, great battery life, and a low \$2979 price, it's no wonder the Liberty DX4-100 soared to number one in the power section of our Notebook PCs Top 20.


Toshiba Satellite Pro T2150CDT **NEW THIS MONTH**

PROS: Excellent performance, built-in CD-ROM drive, integrated audio, long battery life CONS: Expensive, heavy, awkward battery-swapping method

It takes an extraordinary totable PC to fly by the competition and land near the top of the power section in our Top 20 chart, but the speedy Satellite Pro T2150CDT did just that. Its fast DX4-75 performance, impressive battery life, and great run of components make it a mobile multimedia powerhouse.

True, \$5199 is a lot of money. But if you're looking for a powerful notebook that's excellent for presentations, this Toshiba can't

be beat. Its performance is great-the Satellite Pro raced through our tests faster than a typical DX4-100 unit. And the spacious 10.4-inch activematrix screen provides more than 65,000 colors, yielding much richer images than most notebook screens, which are capable of displaying only 256 colors at once. You also get 8MB of



RAM expandable to 32MB, a roomy 500MB hard drive, and a built-in double-speed CD-ROM drive that's conveniently accessible on the right side of the notebook. There's also an external floppy drive, speakers, a microphone, and a PC Card (formerly called PCMCIA) slot that accepts either two Type II cards or a single Type III card. Despite all the high-end components, however, the Satellite Pro managed to run for a very lengthy 5.3 hours in our battery run-down test.

The Satellite Pro T2150CDT isn't perfect. Its traveling weight, including the external floppy drive and AC adapter, is a hefty 8.8 pounds. Also, the screen's brightness control is hard to find. Finally, swapping the nickel-metal-hydride (NiMH) battery pack can be a hassle: It's hidden below the keyboard's palm rest, which is confusing to open and requires some force to pry loose. These few gripes aside, we found the system very comfortable to use. The Accupoint pointing device, which looks like a green eraser in the middle of the keyboard, is easy to use and works in tandem with the mouse buttons on the palm rest.

Toshiba's lengthy three-year warranty includes on-site service-a rare extra among notebook vendors-for \$50 a year. If you run into trouble, you can call the company's technical support around the clock. And according to our reliability-and-service fax-back survey, a clear majority of Toshiba notebook owners were satisfied with the help that they received from the company.

Simply put, the Satellite Pro T2150CDT has it all-blazing benchmark scores, great features, long battery life, and excellent support. If you need full multimedia capabilities for your on-theroad presentations, this portable is a must-see.





Every so often we find a well-equipped system with a price so affordable we do a double take. Such is the case with the MPC TouchNote 700. At a time when many DX4-75 notes cost up to \$4000, the TouchNote sells for an amazing \$2345. No wonder this portable achieved its laudable ranking high up in the budget section of the ultracompetitive Notebook PCs Top 20.

There's much to commend in this tiny titan. One plus is its long battery life-almost 5 hours in our test. Another is its generous 528MB removable hard drive, which is upgradable to 810MB. We were also impressed by the touchpad-a device beneath the <Space> bar that allows you to move the on-screen pointer



simply by dragging a finger across the touch-sensitive pad. This device is very easy to use and makes a great substitute for a trackball or mouse. Also built into the notebook are 16-bit stereo sound, a microphone, and speakers.

In areas where the MPC TouchNote 700 didn't excel, it at least held its own. The 9.4-inch dual-scan screen displays at 640 by 480 resolution and in 256 colors. This system is reasonably fast, too, achieving speeds typical of a DX2-66 notebook-putting the TouchNote 700 in the middle of the pack of the top ten budget notes in terms of performance. The machine also comes with 8MB of RAM expandable to 32MB, as well as a PC Card (formerly known as PCMCIA) Type III slot and a connector for hooking up a docking station. The PC Card slot alternatively accepts two Type II cards. The TouchNote 700's traveling weight is a highly manageable 7.6 pounds.

The keyboard has a slightly mushy feel, a characteristic that got mixed reviews from our judges. But where MPC falls down most is in its service-and-support policies. You get a scant one-year warranty and no specified turnaround time on factory repairs. Tech support is toll-free but available only during business hours. BBS and toll-free fax-back assistance is available, however, and the company offers a 30-day money-back guarantee on all its systems. We haven't received enough responses to our reader fax-back survey to comment on MPC's service-and-reliability record.

Even given the keyboard and support drawbacks, the Touch-Note 700 is an excellent deal. This notebook provides more-thanacceptable performance, great battery life, and a nice feature set, all for an affordable price. If your bottom line really is the bottom line, this near Best Buy warrants serious consideration.





This Month's Contenders



BEST

Systems are arranged in order of overall performance from best to worst, based on the normalized, weighted scores from seven tests. A system may have a better overall performance rating than another system that took less time to complete our test suite.

Methodology

We tested each system as supplied by the manufacturer, using the version of DOS supplied. If we installed Windows, we used the default installation. We configured Windows with an HP LaserJet III as the default printer, disabled Print Manager, and attached a null printer to LPT1. We set video resolution to 800 by 600 pixels in 256 colors using the supplied video driver where possible. We loaded the test applications and files and test automation software and scripts.

Word 2.0 for Windows

We worked with 1-, 9-, and 28-page business documents. Operations included creating, saving, opening, scrolling, editing, checking spelling, formatting, previewing, and printing.

Excel 4.0

We opened a file and performed several data extracts, entered new data, altered calculations, formatted, scrolled, moved blocks, previewed, printed, and saved.

Paradox 1.0 for Windows

We used a custom form to add a moderate number of records to an existing table, performed several queries, and generated a report.

Freelance 1.0 for Windows

We built a six-page presentation using a standard template, clip art, text, and charts; applied several views to the presentation; then previewed and saved it.

WordPerfect 6.0 for DOS

We performed a variety of editing, formatting, previewing, and printing tasks on documents ranging from a single-page memo to a long report. Due to memory requirements, the amount of free memory for DOS in the first 640K dramatically affects this test.

1-2-3 release 3.4 for DOS

Using the graphical Wysiwyg add-in and working in three different files, we created and altered formulas, built graphs, saved, and printed.

Paradox 3.5 for DOS

We tested Paradox 3.5 running under Windows in a DOS window. We entered data, searched records, updated, and generated reports from a simple customer list.



Top 10 Windows Accelerators: Meet the Video Generation

f you're not convinced yet that multimedia is here to stay, take a look at this month's Top 10 accelerators. Our list features four value-packed newcomers that combine full-motion video capabilities with impressive graphics talents, letting you run the latest graphical business apps and video-heavy CD-ROM titles with equal

aplomb. Of the 12 video accelerators we review this month (see "Fast Forward: Full-Motion Video Boards"). the Diamond Stealth Video, STB Velocity 64V, Hercules Stingrav 64/ Video, and miroVideo 12PD all made

Four newcomers run graphical business apps and CD-ROMs with equal aplomb.

it onto our Top 10. Whether you're scrolling through a Microsoft Excel worksheet or looking up a video clip in Compton's Encyclopedia, video-enabled Windows accelerators offer terrific value.

How do they do it? By combining excellent graphics performance with affordable prices. The \$299 STB Velocity 64V landed at number six on our list thanks to an astounding 82.4 WITS score-due in part to its new video-capable S3 Vision968 chip. The \$233 Diamond Stealth Video used the DRAM version of this chip-the Vision868-to race to an 80.7 WITS score and a fourth-place finish. Number eight, the Hercules Stingray 64/Video, came in with a WITS score of 75, making it the slowest board on our list. But with its low \$195 price, the Stingray is the cheapest video-enabled board on the street. Meanwhile, the \$229 miroVideo 12PD clocks in at number ten with a respectable 77.4 WITS score and good video performance.

> But speed alone doesn't propel a board onto our Top 10. The Number Nine 9FX Motion 771 and Genoa VideoBlitz III AV produced the best WITS scores we've ever seen, but their high prices (\$329 and \$369, respectively) kept them out of the

running. The best accelerators also give you a little extra for your money-like pan and zoom functions and easy resolution and color switching. Diamond has added a video playback and frame counter module to its InControl Tools software, and STB, Hercules, and ATI all stand out with excellent utilities. Boards from Number Nine and Matrox also boast impressive ease of use.

WITS was developed by Jon Peddie Associates, a PC graphics consulting firm. Jon Peddie and Fred Dunn are the firm's principal officers.







Small Business for Small Change

Tips for running your business on a shoestring.

FOR MANY SMALL BUSINESSES, every penny saved can be a vital link in the survival chain. But occasionally, as the adage says, you can be penny-wise and pound-foolish. How can independent entrepreneurs do things cheaply without compromising quality or expending too much valuable time? Answers to the following frequently asked questions offer inexpensive solutions for businesses with limited capital.

Where can I get the best deals on software?

Mail-order outfits offer software for as little as half the suggested retail price. Check out the ads for mailorder companies in computer publications such as *PC World*. Generally, you'll find the listings in the back of each issue. Remember that ordering from a firm outside your state will often save you sales tax as well,

though you'll have to pay for shipping.

National chains such as Price Club/Costco and Sam's Club offer prices close to wholesale on selected major office applications. For a greater variety of ti-

tles, check out major computer and office supply outlets like CompUSA, Egghead Software, and Office Depot. It's not uncommon for these stores to offer discounts of up to 50 percent off the suggested retail price. If you are in the market for a new computer, many retailers offer special software bundles as an incentive to buy. Often the application you need will be part of that package. But if it isn't, don't be afraid to ask for the software to be thrown in as part of your hardware deal.

You can also download shareware from bulletin boards or commercial online services like CompuServe,

> America Online, and Prodigy. Once you've evaluated a program, you pay a small fee usually between \$5 and \$50—to register.

> If you are modemless, consider getting a collection of shareware

on CD-ROM. While the majority of these compilation discs are a potpourri of applications, utilities, and games, some of them—Quantum Axcess's Home Office Executive for Windows, for example—offer appli-





cations tailored to the needs of the small or home office.

When should I invest in multiple phone lines?


An extra line costs extra money typically from \$12 to \$32 per month plus installation, depending on where you live and whether you are listed as a business or a residence. That extra expense, however, can be money well spent. You'll need a separate line for your business if you live with other people who use your phone, have a high volume of phone *and* fax work, use E-mail as well as phone and fax, or need to keep your business phone charges separate from your personal ones.

But don't go to the expense of an additional line until you're sure you need it. And consider less expensive options. For instance, check with your local phone company about prices for special services, such as voice mail that takes messages while you are on the phone. But beware of call waiting, which irritates some callers and can interrupt data transmissions inadvertently.

Should I buy a multipurpose (fax, printer, scanner, photocopier) machine rather than separate equipment?

When multipurpose machines first hit the market, you were likely to pay a premium of \$100 to \$150 over what you'd spend if you bought the components separately—just to save space.

Now, for around \$700 total, you can buy an HP OfficeJet, a combination ink jet printer, plain-paper fax, and low-end scanner/photocopier; separate comparable components would cost \$1200. Lexmark's new Medley 4sx provides similar functions, plus color, for roughly \$900—about the



Does it pay to incorporate?

For a home business, probably not. For a small business, it depends. Most home businesses are sole pro-

prietorships: There is no legal wrangling; you simply announce that you're in business.

Incorporation, on the other hand, will cost you—initially and every year thereafter. Moreover, your paperwork

will multiply. For instance, after incorporation you'll have to file corporate as well as personal income taxes.

According to San Francisco smallbusiness consultant Paul Terry, people generally incorporate to get a tax advantage, to sell shares or parts of the business, and to avoid liability (unlike with a sole proprietorship, debts and damages that have been incurred by a corporation cannot be assessed against the owner personally). In certain situations, however, you and your business can be sued separately, so incorporation is not a complete shield against liability.

The amount of tax savings depends on the dollar volume of your business as well as the state in which you live, and may be negligible. (Before you do anything, check with your accountant.) One other downside to incorporation: You can't use business losses to offset income on your personal tax return, as you can in a sole proprietorship.

How can I build a client list inexpensively?

The best source of new clients is referrals from current clients. The next best source: everyone else you know. Put every potential lead into a database right away, and update names and addresses quarterly. If you're looking to build a quick list, association or convention directories are an inexpensive way to go.

"The more specific your list, the better your response rate will be," points out Alan Cundall of Hayes Orlie Cundall Advertising in Sausalito, California. "You can get a list of left-handed Hispanic paperhangers, if that's your target." List brokers

> and mailing houses rent lists for \$30 up to \$200 per thousand names, per use. (The more targeted the list, the pricier it is.) Investigate the broker and the source of the data to make sure the list is

accurate. To get broker referrals, contact the Direct Marketing Association in New York (212/768-7277).

Except in New York, it's cheaper to send jobs of over 100 copies to a copy shop. Your printer might be more convenient, but you pay a premium.

Can I save money by photocopying instead of printing?

It's generally cheaper to print out small jobs—especially if you have a laser printer—than to use the copy shop. Studies show that laser printing costs about 3.5 cents per page. (For example, a \$70 toner cartridge for the Hewlett-Packard 4L laser printer is good for 3000 pages—a bit more than 2 cents per page. If you figure paper costs a minimum of a penny a page, then a laser printout will average 3.5 cents per page.) Photocopying, on the other hand, can cost up to 10 cents per page for 100 pages or less. (See chart at left.)

The more pages you reproduce, however, the less this principle applies. When you duplicate a page more than 100 times, photocopying costs fall rapidly—to as little as a 1.8 cents each in the most competitive markets. And relying on your printer can mean tying up your PC until the print job is done, thus costing you work time—and that equals money.

If you're making more than 1000 copies, check your copy shop's prices for offset printing, which frequently costs less than photocopying.

Wear and tear on the printer is *not* a factor worth a home office user's consideration, says HP product marketing manager Linda Crozier. "We don't even specify life expectancy of a printer in terms of pages."

Business Advice for Free

When Hal Smith's Minneapolis employer eliminated his division but gave Smith the rights to the laboratory equipment-testing product he'd been working on, Smith decided to strike out on his own and become self-employed. However, he lacked not only capital but also business expertise. So he turned to the Minneapolis office of SCORE (the Service Corps of Retired Executives), a division of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

SCORE's Bud Levinger, whose varied business background includes marketing, finance, and engineering, became Smith's personal counselor. Over the course of a few free, hour-long sessions, Levinger instructed Smith in some of the basics: how to write a business plan, keep records, and take a product to market. He also provided a list of venture capitalists in the Twin Cities area. Smith was soon launched in a thriving enterprise.

SCORE, which has 13,000 volunteer consultants and 300 offices nationwide, also offers low-cost workshops. And it's only one of many fonts of business lore from which a shoestring entrepreneur can drink. In fact, there's so much free, or almost free, advice to be had that you'll never again be able to reasonably use the excuse "I didn't know how." Here are some more sources:

Government Entities

The SBA maintains a library of publications and videotapes, some free and others cheap. Check your local telephone book, under the United States government listings, or call the national SBA answer desk at 800/827-5722. Some SBA locations feature chapters of ACE, the Active Corps of Executives, as well as of SCORE.

Small Business Development Centers, usually administered by the state and often affiliated with local universities, offer free one-on-one consulting, business data, publications, permit and licensing assistance, and other aid. Such centers may go by a different name in your area; check with your state's Department of Commerce or another economic development organization.

Business Incubators

Business incubators, sometimes called microenterprise incubators, are a hot new trend, offering low-cost or (occasionally) free assistance ranging from consulting and workshops to space where you can share office equipment, meeting rooms, and the company of others.

"We target women, minorities, and lower-income people who have traditionally had difficulty starting or growing a business, but we're open to others, too," says Claudia Viek, executive direc-

What's the least expensive approach to shipping?

Short messages: If your clients are information-highway savvy, you can send E-mail to their online service or Internet address. Obviously, you'll save big on postage and paper.

If you rely on faxing, try to do it after 11 p.m., when phone rates are lowest and signal throughput is fast-

est. Any decent fax machine or fax software package can schedule a fax for later transmission.

1-ounce mailings: Postal regulations are so complex that your first step should be to talk with your local postal business center rep.

In general, you save money by doing as much of the post office's job as possible: presorting, bar coding, bundling, and supplying carrier route num-

tor of one such outfit, the San Francisco Renaissance Entrepreneurship Center. Renaissance, which receives funding from the Department of Housing and Urban Development as well as from businesses and foundations, is part of a nationwide network of 600 centers. Networking Through the Net

Want to chat with someone who's met and conquered the very problem you're now facing? Go online. Find a forum on your favorite bulletin board, or check in with one of the larger commercial bers. If you mail to ten addresses on the same carrier's route, for example, you may pay as little as 15 cents for third class or 25.4 cents for first class per piece.

The next-cheapest rates are for mail with delivery-point bar codes (16.6 cents third class, 25.8 cents first class) if you meet quantity and package or tray requirements. The bulk mailing fee of \$85 per year is cost-effective only if you mail more than 2000 pieces a year. To do your own bar coding, you need post office-certified software—a common feature of label printing packages.

Packages: For shipment of a 5pound package from New York to Los Angeles, the U.S. Postal Service's Priority Mail, at \$6, beats other

Or look at telephone-style directories, such as The Internet Yellow Pages.

Can I save by using accounting software rather than an accountant?

Accounting software is inexpensive; for example, you can pick up the popular Peachtree Accounting 3.0 for

Windows for about \$115. Tax software costs even less—around \$35, for example, for Turbo-Tax for Windows. But at tax time you'll probably need an accountant, too. No computer program will give you per-

sonalized financial planning advice, provide tips on the latest tax-law changes, or attend your audit.

"Never rely on software to get you the best tax break," advises Claude Whitmyer, coauthor of *Running a One-Person Business.* "It's almost always worth it to have an accountant at least look over your figures before you file; you're likely to save a lot more than the accountant charges you." But using such software to generate the figures will save the accountant's time and thus lower the fee.Peachtree Accounting 3.0 for Windows \$169; Peachtree Software; 800/228-0068

Is there an inexpensive way to make my office ergonomic?

"People who exercise or practice yoga for health will put up with the

> most abusive work environments," points out Gordon Inkeles, the coauthor with Iris Schencke of *Ergonomic Living.* "People can easily transform their offices into uscrfriendly environments.

There are lots of cheap, quick fixes available. For instance, if your com-

puter or printer is noisy, you can put foam pads underneath the machines to reduce the decibel level."

Repetitive-strain injuries, aches, and eyestrain can be costly in terms of both medical

expenses and lost productivity. But what if you can't afford fancy ergonomic equipment, such as a \$2000 BodyBuilt chair or a \$600-or-more workstation? Here are some economical approaches to body-friendly work environments.

Wrist support: When you type, elbows should be roughly at a right angle, with wrists level. If your keyboard is too high, lower it with an under-desk shelf that's long enough to accommodate the keyboard and mouse pad. Alternatively, you can raise your chair and use a footrest.

Back and neck support: Sit with both feet flat on the footrest or floor, not under the chair. Place the screen slightly lower than eye level. And remember to take frequent breaks.

Lighting and noise: Don't place your monitor facing or opposite a window—glare and reflection can hurt your eyes. Buy a diffuser for your overhead light, plus a dimmer

> (each about \$3). Clamp a task light with a shielded grill on the desk (on the left side if you're right-handed).

Reduce noise by moving peripherals away from you. Listen to equipment before you buy.

Adds author Schencke: "If you buy one piece of ergonomic equipment, make it a chair. But you don't necessarily have to get an 'ergonomic' chair. Get one that has adjustable arms and good back support. Buying a secondhand chair is a good way to save money and get good value. Check used office furniture outlets or major office furniture companies such as Herman Miller Company and Steelcase Corporation, which sell refurbished equipment from their factories."

The OfficeF/X is jumperless, so it's relatively easy to hook up; it also has Plug and Play support, so it's likely to be even easier to install when Windows 95 rolls around. Plus, it's smart: It figures out if an incoming call is a voice, fax, or data communication and then routes it to the appropriate software-whether the bundled WinFax Lite for faxes and WinComm Lite for data, or any





Tip of the Month

MULTIMEDIA ON THE CHEAP: With a fast video board and a big hard drive, you can add modest multimedia capabilities to your Windows PC at minimal expense.

For video, download the latest run-time release of Video for Windows, version 1.1e. Look on CompuServe for vivile.zip in the Windows Multimedia Forum (go winmm) or on PC World Online (go pwo), or look on America Online in the PC Multimedia Forum (keyword; multimedia) or on PC World Online (keyword; pc world). Place the file in its own directory, decompress its files with PKunzip, and run Video for Windows' setup.exe. For sound, download the PC Speaker driver (speak.exe), which you'll find in the same forums; place the file in its own directory; decompress it; and then run Control Panel's Driver applet to Install it.

With these drivers, you can play .avi video files (samples are in the same forums) in Media Player and .way sound files in Sound Recorder. You can also create multimedia documents; in WinWord 6.0, for example, use Insert • Object • Create from File and choose the file. You can then play that object with a simple double-click. You can also use Control Panel's Sound applet to assign sounds to specific events. Shane Rau, Technical Editor

Laptop-to-Desktop Backup

I'd like to back up the data on my laptop computer using the tape drive on my desktop system. Can I do the backup directly to tape, or do I have to transfer data to my desktop hard disk and then back up onto tape? I use Conner Backup Exec for Windows and also have DOS 6.0 with Interlink. Is Interlink the way to go? Robert Ahrens, St. Louis, Missouri

Interlink lets you transfer your laptop's hard disk data to the tape drive in your desktop system, but LapLink Remote Access-a component of Traveling Software's Commworks that lets your laptop and desktop systems share their disks in a similar way-is faster.

However, if you do full backups often and find the parallel port connection too slow, it may be worthwhile to furnish both your laptop and desktop with ethernet adapters (if they're not already so equipped). You can then use Windows for Workgroups with your backup software to transfer the data as fast as your tape drive can accept it.

I want to send E-mail from America Online to a friend on GEnie. I have tried many addresses, but nothing works. What's the secret? Lynn Beck, New York

To send E-mail from anywhere on In the Internet (including America Online) to GEnie, enter e-mail_address@ genie.gels.com as the destination address. If it bounces back, try sending E-mail explaining the problem to postmaster@ genie.geis.com. Just be sure you post your messages to your friend's E-mail address, and not to his or her user ID.

Sharing Modems

I would like to know how I can use my computer, which runs Windows for Workgroups, to access a modem attached to a different computer on my

home office network. What do I need to buy? Will a remote program like Symantec's pcAnywhere work? Chris Kopenec, Internet

Remote programs such as pcAny-A where are useful if you want to run a PC by remote control, but they're really not designed to let you share modems across a LAN. What you need is modem server or asynchronous communications server software. There are many commercial offerings, but most are for Novell NetWare only. The following list is a sampling of products that work with Windows for Workgroups. One of them, nmp2.exe, is a shareware package (you can find it on PC World Online as nmp2.exe). And that's a good thing, because at some of these prices it may make more sense to buy another fax-modem and pay for an additional phone line.

PostScript for LaserJet II

Q I would like to print a PostScript file on my HP LaserJet II printer. Do you know of a way to do it? And is there any conversion program that lets me view it as graphics? *Domtnt, America Online*

A To print a PostScript file on a Laser-Jet, you need a PostScript cartridge, a PostScript upgrade board, or a software PostScript interpreter that runs on your PC. Some of the hardware products add RAM to your printer, and some increase the resolution to 600 by 600, or even 1200 by 1200—the equivalent of buying a whole new unit.

If you'd rather have a software upgrade, several commercial software interpreters are available—and one, Ghostscript, is free (you can find it on PC World Online as gs261win.zlp, gs261386.zlp, gsfiles.zlp, and gs261doc.zlp). Also, some drawing programs, such as CorelDraw, have PostScript interpreters built into them.

dard I/O port addresses from both the original PC and the AT (3BC, 378, and 278), but only two ports can be interrupt-driven unless both the card and the file server let you set a different interrupt for the third. (You will usually run into trouble trying to do this, so most file servers allow you to set up the third parallel port for polled rather than interrupt-driven operation. This eliminates the need for a third interrupt.) Adding a fourth port is even more of a challenge, since you need a card that can be set to a nonstandard, unused address, as well as software you can configure to use that address.

If you want your system to be as standard and trouble-free as possible, I recommend using no more than two parallel ports. If you have more than two printers, consider running some of them through direct ethernet connections (which are much, much faster than a parallel port and can take a load off the server) or via serial ports.

Ghost Drives in the SCSI

At our office, we have a PC with a builtin SCSI adapter on the motherboard. The PC has only one SCSI hard drive, but it thinks it has two. All the software shows that the machine has a D: drive with contents identical to those of the C: drive. What could make this happen? KevinM7277, America Online

The most common causes of "phantom" hard drives on a SCSI system are incorrect termination on the SCSI bus, a duplicate SCSI ID number, or a problem with the configuration of the SCSI host adapter's built-in BIOS. Make sure the devices at both ends of the SCSI bus have terminator resistor packs installed to prevent bus errors. Also check that all devices on the bus have unique SCSI ID numbers; normally, the host is 7 and the first hard drive is 0. Finally, run the configuration software for your motherboard host adapter. Make sure that it's set to control only one hard drive and that emulation of the IBM PC/AT hard drive controller (sometimes called ATA or WD-1003 emulation) is disabled.

You might also try removing any memory management software temporarily to see if

it might be causing the problem—sometimes its attempts to "shadow" the disk controller's BIOS ROM produce strange results, including phantom drives.

Last Impression

Q The PowerBase Star-Dot-Star Volume 5 disk contains a tip that lets you change the opening graphic you see when Windows starts up. I used it, and it worked fine. But yesterday, when I started Windows, the graphics reverted to the original logo. Why?

A You can change the "splash screen" that appears when Windows starts by rebuilding win.com to include a different bit-map file. If the splash screen changes, it is because some other application has rebuilt win.com. This can happen when you install new graphics drivers, when you upgrade to a newer version of Windows, or when you install certain hardware or software. (Cyrix, for instance, changes the splash screen to show its logo when you install a 386 upgrade chip.) If this occurs and you don't like the new screen, just redo the steps in the tip. Or, if you haven't upgraded Windows, you can restore your old win.com from a backup.

QEMM Quandary

Q I recently tried installing Quarterdeck's memory manager, QEMM 7.5, but I began to get messages warning of a 'video device conflict' or an 'error loading device.drv' when entering Windows. I have a Diamond Stealth 64 video card with 2MB. What's wrong²

A The Diamond Stealth cards, like some other video adapters, use parts of memory that Quarterdeck's QEMM may try to co-opt for other purposes. To avoid conflicts, configure QEMM so that it doesn't attempt to use upper memory blocks in the region that includes segments A000-BFFF—and in particular, the monochrome text region from B000-B7IFF. QEMM's setup program lets you disable use of the monochrome text region; or you can edit config.sys yourself by appending **x=a000-bfff** to the line reading 'device= c:\qemm\qemm386.sys'.

Here's How

SPREADSHEETS Q&A

Calculate the Last-Saved Date in Excel or 1-2-3

Q How can I make my Excel reports display the date they were last saved, and not merely the date they were printed (which I can do using the *Page*•*Setup*•*Header*/*Footer* controls)? I want something that will allow me to check for discrepancies in case someone neglects to save a file.

Melrose Johnson, Tullahoma, Tennessee

A It would be nice if Excel, like 1-2-3 release 5.0, supplied a function to calculate this value. Instead, you can create a macro containing a simple custom function that does the job. (I'd like to thank Robert Davidson of Irving, Texas, who helped us develop this macro via the Internet.)

First, create your worksheet and save it. Then use *Insert* • *Macro* • *Module* to create a new macro, and enter the userdefined function shown in **FIGURE 1**. Next, go back to the sheet where you're creating your report and enter =saveddatetime().You'll see the code number for the date and time the file was last saved. Select *Format* • *Cells* • *Number* and choose an appropriate *Date* format for the cell.

You also need to set the workbook's recalculation to manual mode so Excel

doesn't automatically change the lastsaved date to the current date when you open the file. Select Tools • Options, click the Calculation tab, click Manual, and make sure Recalculate before Save is checked so the date and other formulas are current when you save the workbook.

For those interested in the macro details, here's a quick note: The expression Application.Caller refers to the cell that holds the function; Parent.Parent refers to the workbook that contains that cell; and FullName is its file name and path.

1-2-3 release 5.0 users get off a lot easier. Just enter the formula **@info("last**revision-date"). Then format the cell by selecting *Style*•*Number Format*•*Dates* and choosing a date format. To make the file recalculate manually, use *Tools*•*User Setup*, click the *Recalculation* button, and check *Manual*. Just be sure to press <**F9**> or click the *Calc* button on the status bar to recalculate the worksheet before saving it.

And While We're at It, How About Full-Path Footers?

Q At my organization, we use Excel on a LAN. Is it possible to get the footers in my Excel reports to show the entire path of the file name? For exam-

ple, can a footer display f:\data\finserv-\ir_req.xls, instead of just ir_req.xls? Richard Aagaard, San Francisco

A You can't do it with the tools Excel provides in the *File* • *Page Setup* • *Header/Footer* dialog box, but you can create a simple macro to do it. Create and save your Excel workbook, insert a module with *Insert* • *Macro* • *Module*, then enter the macro text shown in FIG-URE 2. Execute the macro by selecting *Tools* • *Macro*, then double-click *Set-Foot*. Now you're ready to print.

The LeftFooter property puts the text at the lower-left corner of the page, RightFooter puts it at the right, and CenterFooter in the center. (Note: You might want to incorporate a statement like this as part of a macro that prints the current worksheet.)

If you use Quattro Pro or 1-2-3, begin by creating and saving your file. In Quattro Pro 5.0, select *File* Page Setup and enter **#F** as the footer text. In 1-2-3 release 4.0, choose a cell outside the area you want to print, and enter the formula **@cell("filename",A1)**, which displays the full file name and path. Select Range Name and assign the name FooterText to the cell. Then select File Page Setup and enter \FooterText as the text of the footer.

Customized Sort Orders in Windows Spreadsheets

Q I import data from our company's minicomputer into Excel in text format, then I arrange it into a list that I subtotal for a monthly sales report. I want to sort the list by sales region in column A, but Excel's sort feature arranges the regions in alphabetical order. I must later rearrange the regions into the order that's traditional for our company. It takes a lot of cutting and pasting. Isn't there a faster way? And can this be done in Quattro Pro 6.0, which I use at home?

A Fortunately, Excel lets you customize the way you sort lists. For Quattro Pro or 1-2-3, you can create a lookup table to get the same effect.

In Excel, select *Tools* • *Options*, then click the *Custom Lists* tab in the dialog box. Make sure *New List* is selected in the Custom Lists box, then type your region names in order into the List Entrics field, pressing **<Enter>** after each one. When you're done, the dialog box should look like the example below:

Click OK, and you're all set. (Alternatively, if your custom sort order has already been typed into a range in the worksheet, you can create a custom list as follows: Simply highlight the list, select Tools • Options • Custom Lists, and click the Import button at the bottom right of the dialog box.)

Next time you want to sort the data, click in the Region column in your sales data worksheet, select *Data*•*Sort*, click the *Options* button, and choose

your custom sort order in the First Key Sort Order list. Click *OK* twice, and you're finished.

When you're working at home with Quattro Pro 6.0, you'll have to use a more roundabout approach. FIG-URE 3 gives step-by-step instructions for setting up a custom sort order. The lookup table on sheet A, which is shown at the top

of Figure 3, assigns a sort order to each region. The formula in column D of sheet B matches the sort order number with each Region entry using the formula @vlookup (A2,\$SortTable,1). Just follow the directions in Figure 3 to use the column of formulas as the key column for the sort, and you're all set.

Summing Absolute Values in Excel 5.0

Q I use Excel to track the scoring of road rallies, in which two-person teams compete to finish a course laid out on public roads within a pre-specified time period. Penalty points are assigned for deviations: negative for early finishes, positive for late.

To calculate the overall score, I need to sum the absolute values of the deviations so that, for example, arriving 2 minutes early counts the same as arriving 2 minutes late. I would love to have an absolute value sum function similar to the regular sum function. Any suggestions for solving this problem with a simple formula? *Greg Lester, Akron*


A Excel's array formulas let you perform calculations like this using the regular abs (absolute value) and sum functions. Let's say your points are located in A1:A10; just type the formula =sum(abs(A1:A10)) and make sure to press <Ctrl>-<Shift>-<Enter> to enter the formula as an array.

Quattro Pro 6.0 users can perform the same calculation with the formula @sum(@abs(A1..A10)); the application requires no special keystroke to enter array formulas. 1-2-3 release 5.0 lacks arrays but lets users employ a pair of functions that selectively sum the negative or positive values in a range. To perform the calculation use the formula @sumpositive(A1..A10)-@sumnegative(A1..A10). By Richard Scoville

WORD PROCESSING Q&A

Better-Looking Headlines in Word 6.0 for Windows


Q I use Word 6.0 for Windows to create a newsletter for my business. It works great except for one thing: When I use large fonts in headlines, some characters look like they're either too close together or too far apart. Can I adjust the spacing between characters? *Patricia Wilson, Cleveland*


A Yes. WinWord 6.0 makes it fairly a casy to adjust the space between two characters (a process desktop publishing types call *kerning*). Kerning problems typically occur when you have a wide letter (like w) next to a thin one (like *i*). They're so common that most fonts have information built into them to adjust spacing between certain letter pairs automatically.

To access automatic kerning in Win-Word, highlight the entire block of text you want to adjust. Select Format• Font and click the Character Spacing tab in the Font dialog box. Mark the Kerning for Fonts check box and set the Points and Above measurement to the size of your font. If you want Win-Word to kern smaller fonts, enter a lower number. But remember that kerning isn't necessary at all font sizes, and it slows WinWord down.

Automatic kerning doesn't always do the job, however. For those instances when your letters still don't look right, WinWord lets you manually change the spacing. The trick is to select only the first letter of the pair you want to adjust. (If you select both letters, Win-Word also changes the spacing between the second and third letter, which may not be what you want.)

With the first letter selected, display the *Character Spacing* dialog box as described above (see FIGURE 1). Go to the Spacing drop-down list and choose *Expanded* or *Condensed*. Enter the amount of space you want to add or remove (measured in points) by clicking the arrows next to the *By* window or typing in a number. When you're done, click *OK* to apply the changes. Odds are you'll have to repeat this operation a few times until your headlines look the way you want.





A WinWord 6.0 Calendar for All Seasons

Q I need to create monthly planning calendars in WinWord 6.0 that let me insert text on a particular date. I've tried to do this using tables, but creating a new table for each month is incredibly time-consuming. I'd also like to put an entire year's calendar on a single page, if that's possible. You'd think there'd be a macro that does this, but I couldn't find one in WinWord. Can you help?

You're in luck. I did an online search and found a macro that creates a neat planning calendar for any month of any year. It also creates calendars for 3-, 6-, or 12-month periods on a single page. It's part of STAR File Utilities, a shareware product from STAR Retrieval Systems that includes several other useful macros, most having to do with file management. The entire package is a WinWord document, with buttons you double-click to install any or all of the macros. Best of all, the registration fee for the whole collection is only \$15. You can find it on PC World Online as star16.zlp.

Directory Assistance for WinWord 6.0

Whenever I try to open a document in WinWord 6.0, the default directory in the Open dialog box is always the WinWord home directory. I store my document files in another directory. How do I change the default so I don't have to switch directories each time? *Jim Brennan*,

Cambridge, Massachusetts

A Fire up WinWord, then select Tools• *Options* and click the *File Locations* tab. Highlight *Documents* in the File Types list, then click *Modify* to get to the Modify Location dialog box. In the Directories list, select the directory where you keep your documents, click *OK*, then click *Close* to return to your document. The directory you selected becomes the new default.

Hiding Text in WordPerfect 6.0 for Windows

Q I want to create text in my Word-Perfect 6.0 documents that appears on screen but not on the printed page. Try as I might, I can't get to the program's Hidden Text feature. I can see Hidden as an option in the Font dialog box, but the check box is grayed out. What's the deal here? Alexis Winters, Chicago

A The deal is that you need to select View • Hidden Text. That will add a check mark next to the Hidden Text menu item and turn on the Hidden check box in the Font dialog box. As long as the menu item is marked, you can format any text as hidden.

But WordPerfect's implementation of hidden text is awkward at best. Hidden text looks like ordinary text on screen, which makes it easy to hide text you don't want to hide and vice versa. The best way to handle this is to type your text first, highlight it, then select Layout•Fonts and click the Hidden check box to format the text as hidden. You may also want to make hidden text easier to identify by assigning it a different color or other text attribute from the Font dialog box.

Unfortunately, WordPerfect prints any text that appears on screen, regardless of how you've formatted it. If you don't want the hidden text to print, you'll have to select *View* • *Hidden Text* again to remove the check mark and hide the text.

Small Fonts in WordPerfect 5.1 for DOS

Q I use WordPerfect 5.1 for DOS. When I use fonts that are smaller than the default font, I have to scroll to the right to see all my text. This is very annoying when I'm editing documents. Is there a way to fix it? *Leon Luey, San Francisco* A Sure, provided you're willing to upgrade to version 5.1+. That version comes with an add-on program called ScreenExtender that expands the number of characters you can view and edit on the screen. The \$49 upgrade offers a number of other valuable improvements, including the ability to access TrueType fonts, but it still runs well on older, slower PCs.

If you'd rather stick with the original, I'm afraid you're stuck with this problem, since version 5.1 offers no way to fit text to the screen. In that case, your best solution is to avoid formatting the document until you've finished editing. That way, you'll see all your text without having to scroll.

Bigger Cursors in WordPerfect 6.0a for DOS

WordPerfect 5.1 for DOS came with a program called cursor.com that let you adjust the cursor's size and shape. I've recently upgraded to version 6.0a, and cursor.com is nowhere to be found. Since I use the program on an old monochrome laptop, I really need this feature to help me find my nearly invisible cursor. Where can I find an update for this utility? Leslie Morgan, Baltimore

A WordPerfect failed to include an updated version of cursor.com when it released the latest DOS upgrade. Fortunately, a version that's compatible with WordPerfect 6.x is available for downloading. You can find it in the WordPerfect forum on CompuServe (go wpfiles) as utils6.zip, or on PC World Online as wpcurs.zip. Or you can call Novell-WordPerfect at 800/451-5151 and order the WordPerfect 6.0 for DOS Utilities Disk for free.

Custom Ami Pro Page Defaults

Q Every time I create a new document in Ami Pro 3.01, I have to change the layout settings manually. Isn't there some way to make those changes permanent? Phil Knowles, Lenox, Massachusetts

A Sure. What you need to do is save your layout as a style sheet, then tell Ami to use it as the default—the one it loads when you launch the program.

Start by opening a new document, then select $Page \cdot Modify Page Layout$ and change the page layout settings to the ones you want to use as the new defaults. Once you've got your page set up correctly, select $Style \cdot Save$ as a Style Sheet. Leave all the settings in the Save as a Style Sheet dialog box as they are and click OK. When asked if you want to overwrite _default.sty, answer Yes. That's it. From now on, your customized page layout will be the default for new documents.

You might want to keep the original default settings in case you decide to switch back later. Simply save the old style sheet with a different name before starting this process.






Tracking the Infiltrators

I install and delete a lot of Windows applications. How can I keep track of all the new files added by installation routines, so I know which files to delete if I uninstall the program? Wil Shrader Jr., America Online

Many Windows applications rudely A install multiple files to multiple directories (especially the \windows and \windows\system directories) without warning, and this makes removing programs difficult. If you don't mind shelling out a few bucks, check out Remove-It in this month's Windows Toolbox. But if you're on a budget, you can create a couple of batch files to monitor which program puts what files where. The main inconvenience is that you have to remember to run the first

batch file, pre.bat (FIGURE 1), immediately before you install an application, and the second, post.bat (FIGURE 2), right after installation.

Pre.bat first switches to a working directory (\temp in this example). Then it converts the file listings of your \windows and \windows\system directories into two files (win_dir1.txt and sys_ dir1.txt). Finally, it copies and renames those all-important configuration files, win.ini and system.ini. Post.bat does much the same thing, creating the same four files under different names. Next, post.bat uses the DOS command fc (file compare) to see what's different and record the changes in changes.txt. It then politely deletes all eight comparison files and loads changes.txt into DOS's editor.

Note that these batch files only track changes to Windows and its \system directories; they don't list the directory in which you installed the program's main files. If you put each application in a unique directory, this shouldn't be a problem.

Remember that post.bat records all changes to your Windows directory. If you run pre.bat immediately before installing an application and run post.bat immediately after, most of the recorded changes will reflect only those made by

> the installation. However, some sound, wallpaper, and screen saver utilities make frequent changes to win.ini and other files. so if you use such utilities, do not be surprised to see these variations show up in changes.txt; these trivial changes can be ignored.

> If you create a Program Manager icon for each batch file, you can just double-click the pre.bat icon before installing a program and then dou

ble-click the post.bat icon afterward. Since post.bat overwrites your old changes.txt list each time that you run the batch files, you will probably want to move the text file to the directory in which you installed the new software. Then you will have a record of how to uninstall each application, in the directory where its main files are stored. Happy tracking.

Travelin' Task Man

In your November column, Denise Culver asked how to make Windows' Task Manager appear someplace other than the middle of the screen when you call it up ["Moving the Task List"]. There is a way, but you won't find it in the Windows documentation. First, open system.ini in Notepad and look for taskman.exe=taskman.exe in the [boot] section. At the end of this line, add one of the following coordinates: 11 to move it to the upper left corner, 1000 1 for the upper right corner, 1 1000 for the bottom left corner; and 1000 1000 for the bottom right corner. Make sure there's a space before each number-for example, to display the Task Manager in the bottom left corner, edit the line so that it reads taskman.exe=taskman.exe 1 1000.

Thanks for this undocumented tip. This technique works when you start Task Manager with the keyboard shortcut <Ctrl>-<Esc>, but if you start it by double-clicking on the desktop, the results are less predictable. The Task Manager will still open in one corner, but it may not be the corner you expect.



tremely exact control over font size, width, and optical size—but the Create button in the ATM control panel is grayed out. What gives? Andrea Lasky, New York

Apparently you haven't installed any Multiple Master fonts under Windows. Although the normal Adobe Type Manager 3.x package includes a number of typefaces, including one Multiple Master font (Tekton), Adobe also ships ATM with a variety of other products, many of which do not include Multiple Master fonts. These fonts can be recognized by the double capital *M* in their name—for example, TektoMM (see **FIGURE 3**). To check whether you have any Multiple Master fonts on the disk from which you

Windows Toolbox



Want to get rid of an old Windows application? Deleting a program's main directory usually leaves fragments that take up space and .ini file modifications that may cause trouble. Vertisoft Systems has a capable remedy called Remove-It. This utility stores unwanted fragments (including .ini file lines) in compressed form and lets you undo the removal later. No uninstaller removes previous installations perfectly, but if you load the memory-resident Watch-It and Log-It modules, Remove-It will monitor all future installations and remove them with 100 percent accuracy. There are other good uninstall applications, but I found Remove-It's button-studded interface and plain-English labels easiest to use. Remove-It sells for \$39.95 on the street. installed ATM, put that disk in the disk drive. Start up the ATM Control Panel and click Add. Change to the floppy drive and search for any font names that include the MM abbreviation. If you find one, select it and click Add to install it. The Create button should now be available.

Setup Snafu

Q After installing Windows for Workgroups 3.11, I get a

message that wdetrl can't load because of a conflict with another virtual device.

Just what is happening? I didn't have this problem with Windows 3.1. How can I fix it? James G. Bennett, Oakton, Virginia

This problem can A occur if Windows' system.ini file lists more than one virtual device driver for a given device-in this case, your hard drive. To fix it, roll up your shirtsleeves and prepare to modify the [386Enh] section of your system.ini file. Naturally, you'll want to make a backup of system.ini before messing around. Since you'd have to restart Windows to see any of the changes take effect anyway, you may want to exit to DOS and open system.ini with DOS's own text editor. Go to your \Windows directory, and type edit system.ini at the DOS prompt.

Once you're in system.ini, scroll down to the [386Enh] section and look for the lines device=*wdctrl and device=*int13. If the latter line is not there, disable the line device=*wdctrl, or add the line device=*int13. To disable any line, insert a semicolon at its beginning. If you find both lines, look for yet another line that reads device=multis.386. If it exists, disable it or disable the two lines mentioned above.

If you find the first two lines but not device=multis.386, the conflict probably lies with some other third-party device driver for your hard disk controller. You'll need to contact your hard disk controller manufacturer or consult its documentation to learn which line is causing the problem. When you find it, try disabling that line or the line device=*wdctrl.

Now save the file and try to start Windows. If you get the message 'Fastdisk validation error', open system.ini again, and disable both the device=*wdetrl and device=*int13 lines Good luck.

you thought it would be simple. All you wanted was Windows 95, which should finally be available next month. But when you get to the store, alongside those new Windows boxes you're going to see loads of software carrying the "Designed for Windows 95" logo. Does this mean you'll need to upgrade your applications, too?

That depends. Although Windows 95 runs Windows 3.1–style 16-bit applications with aplomb, any app bearing the 95 logo must be 32-bit. There are other logo requirements—support for long file names, for instance—but the 32-bit rule is the most misunderstood. After all, the 16-versus-32 debate focuses on operating systems, not applications. So what are the real differences between 16-bit and 32-bit Windows applications?

Performance

Common wisdom says that 32-bit applications are faster than 16-bit apps. Beware common wisdom. Not only is 32 bits no magic wand for speed, but today's 16-bit Windows applications are the product of years of performance tuning. For example, my simple recalculations ran noticeably faster on 16-bit Excel than on 32-bit Excel. The best advice is to check the product reviews. Unless they say a 32-bit version is faster than its predecessor, assume it isn't.

Multitasking

Like Windows 3.1, Windows 95 cooperatively multitasks 16-bit applications. Cooperative multitasking is like giving ten people an hour to describe themselves: Some will talk for 15 minutes, some for 5, and some not at all. The applications, not the operating system, choose when to cede control of the system—there's no referee. The result is that 16-bit applications don't multitask too smoothly under Windows 95 activities in one application may halt when another is performing a task.

Conversely, Windows 95 preemp-

tively multitasks 32-bit applications, much like a moderator who enforces a 6-minute rule for all participants. The 32-bit applications don't cede control; instead, Windows 95 interrupts them as it sees fit in order to provide the smoothest multitasking, so that everything seems to be happening at once.

From my experience, 32-bit applications are better multitaskers. For example, a macro running in 16-bit Word stopped while I was opening a file in a 16-bit version of the draw program Visio. But when I did the same with 32-bit Visio, the 16-bit Word macro chugged right along. As another exam-

ple, during a long recalculation in 16-bit Excel, I could only twiddle my thumbs. But I could do anything at all while recalculating in 32-bit

Excel. The bottom line: The more 32bit (and the less 16-bit) software you run, the smoother you'll multitask.

Stability

Windows 95 runs 16-bit applications in a shared memory space, as Windows 3.1 does, but it runs 32-bit applications in separate memory spaces. So the latter should be less likely to crash each other than the former. In some of my tests, one 16-bit application crashed another while a 32-bit program kept going. But that doesn't mean you won't crash Windows 95 if you run only 32bit applications; you may.

Instead, the key question is, "How much less often will I crash if I run 32bit applications?" There is no simple answer, since many factors come into play. For example, buggy video drivers—a major cause of crashes under Windows 3.1—should become just a bad memory because of Windows 95's improved video driver architecture. This one improvement may make your system dramatically more stable even when you're running only 16-bit applications. So the extra protection afforded by 32-bit applications may be incremental (but still nice to have).

Long File Names

Although Windows 95 eliminates the antediluvian 8.3 limit on file names, it won't matter unless your applications can also open and save files with long names. Today's Windows and DOS applications can't—they can "see" only 8.3-type file names. So while you could create a file named "LETTER TO RICHARD" in Windows 95's built-in word-processing utility, it would appear

> as "LETTER-1" in your old word processor. I find that tracking two names—long and short—gets irritating very fast. So if you really want to use long file names, you have to upgrade your applications. It's that simple.

> Should you upgrade, then? There's no one answer yet. Some upgraded applications will have a host of new features beyond 32 bits to tempt you; others will simply be 32-bit versions of 16-bit apps, with little else added. For me, long file names and multitasking are enough to justify upgrading my key applications—my word processor and spreadsheet—if their performance is the same or better (still a big if). As for my other applications, I'll wait and see what else they offer before deciding.



Picking Your Data Directory in Approach

I keep my Approach 3.0 data in a directory called e:\data. Can I make it my default directory? Steve Pardus, Bolingbrook, Illinois

A The secret's in Windows' Program Manager. Highlight the app's icon, then select *File*•*Properties* or press <**Alt>**-<**Enter>**. In the dialog box's Working Directory field, type the path to your data directory (in your case, e:\data). Click OK. Next time, the Open dialog box will list the e:\data files.

You can start Approach or any other Windows database by double-clicking a data file, including one whose icon you've dragged from File Manager into Program Manager for easier access.

Sorting a Paradox for Windows Tabular Report

Q l've designed a tabular report for listing sales amounts in Paradox 5.0 for Windows. The original table is sorted by invoice number, but I want my report sorted by customer name. I've tried adding a group band, but that gives me a separate table for each customer. What I want is one big table sorted by customer. Is this possible? Danielle Zale, New York

A Paradox 5.0 makes this easy. Open your report in design mode and click anywhere in the All Records band to select it. Right-click in the band but away from any fields, and choose *Sorr* from the properties menu. In the resulting dialog box's Fields list, doubleclick the name of the field to sort by. Click OK to return to your report design. When you run the report, you'll see your records in customer order.

Single-Spacing an Access Report

How can I single-space a report in Access 2.0? I can't get anything but double- or one-and-a-half-line spacing. *Tim Brady, Chicago* A What you can do is adjust the detail area of your report design so less space appears after each record. First select your fields and drag them up to get rid of white space at the top of the band. Next, click the Detail band and drag the bottom border of the band up to get rid of white space below.

You may also need to shrink the height of your field controls. The easiest way to make all the controls the same size is to select them together with **<Shift>**-clicks, then right-click any one. Select *Properties*, then change the number for the Height property. If your data doesn't show up completely, you've made the number too small.

Changing Access Text to Proper Case

In February I asked for suggestions on changing an Access text field to proper case—where the first letter in each word is uppercase and the rest are lowercase ("Changing Case in Access Text"). I received many solutions, but the best and casiest came from Robert Walkenhorst via the Internet. He notes that Microsoft's sample Northwind database already has a Proper() function you can copy to your database.

To copy the function, open your database and right-click the margin or a tab of the Database window. Select *Import* from the pop-up menu. In the resulting dialog box, double-click *Microsoft Access*. A standard Windows filehandling dialog box opens; move to your access\sampapps directory and double-click *nwind.mdh*. A third dialog box appears; select the 'Object Type' *Modules* and the 'Objects in NWIND-. MDB' Utility Functions. Select Close to return to the Database window.

To convert existing text to proper case, use your new Proper() function in an update query. First, select the Query tab in the Database window and click New. Click New Query in the next window to open the Add Table window. Double-click the name of the table you want to change, then click *Close* to enter the Query Design window.

Once there, click the Update Query button. Drag the name of the field you want to convert into the Field row in the first column of the query grid. In the Update To row directly below, type **Proper([Field Name])**, where Field Name is the field to convert. When you click Run and confirm the change, Access converts the text in that field throughout the table. When you close the query, there's no need for you to save it unless you think that you might need to convert the text again.

To avoid that possibility, use Proper() in your data entry form to correct new text as it's entered. Open your form in Design mode, right-click the control for the field whose values should be in proper case, select Properties, and click After Update and then the ellipsis (...) on the same line. Choose Macro Builder and enter a name like Proper Case. In the Macro window, select the Action SetValue. In the Item field box, enter [Forms] [Form Name] [Field Name]. where Form Name and Field Name are the names of your form and field. In the Expression field below Item, enter Proper([Forms]![Form Name]1[Field Name]). Then close the Macro window and the Properties dialog box.

When you use that form to enter data, Access converts the text in the field you've altered to proper case. It's not a perfect solution—*LeBlanc* becomes *Leblanc*, for instance, and you can't correct for that except to use another form or edit the data table directly.


Vou'd never hire someone just because his or her résumé looked good. But, then, you'd probably never grant that someone an interview if his or her curriculum vitae looked like it had been slapped together in five minutes on a Selectric. The lesson: When it comes to putting together your own résumé, pay attention to design.

But how do you find the right look for your particular résumé? To give you a few ideas, we asked our expert, Daniel Will-Harris, to redesign the résumé you see below. We created this Before ourselves, basing it on some particularly unfortunate real-life specimens that together defied virtually every rule of good design.

We asked Will-Harris to come up with two designs—one traditional, the other modern. We asked him to do so using only a word processor-in this case, Microsoft Word for Windows.

Although the two Afters look dramatically different, both use the same base layout. Will-Harris used Word's Table feature to create this framework. Tables give you the power of columns without the hassle; they also make it easy to add creative border designs. The base layout—headings in a lefthand column, text in column two with a ragged-right margin—is simple, clean, and light.

When résumés are sent into large corporate environments, they must often traverse a maze of fax and copying machines before they arrive at the appropriate desk. And once they arrive, they're often fed into scanners and optical character recognition (OCR) software for screening. That's why, for our



traditional design, we used a Bodoni typeface—an easy-to-read choice for humans and machines alike.

We also reorganized the résumé visually. We set different text elements headings, dates, main text—in different type sizes; we set the dates in italics to highlight our career chronology. To keep the mood brisk, we divided the résumé into distinct sections with short horizontal rules.

The Creative Approach


For our modern alternative, we wanted something appropriate for more freewheeling, less corporate settings. It's designed for human consumption only; the dotted lines and reverse type would flummox an OCR program.

As a base font, Will-Harris chose Triplex Serif from Emigre, a hip but readable typeface. He also used Word's Draw feature to create the white-onblack type. The page has a lot of borders, and they aren't just for show. The six-point line down the left side of the page gives the résumé a neat, self-contained look, while the 4-point lines separate the document's sections.

In either design, notice which information stands out: the name, job titles, dates, and education—in other words, the real meat of the document. Both designs are intentionally spare, like a restaurant menu. And like a menu, your résumé should be designed and written to whet your reader's appetite for the real meal—in this case, the interview that will get you the job.

Quick Steps to Creating Your Own Web Page

Q I've been cruising the World Wide Web and have noticed that a lot of businesses have Web pages, with pictures of their products and catalogs. It seems like these Web pages would be a great way to advertise (much cheaper than mass mailings or magazine ads). Can I set up my own page? Is it hard? *Mary Poling*,

A While cynics say the only people you'll find on the World Wide Web are college students and computer geeks, there's no question that the Web has become the hottest online destination. (I'or those who've spent the past year playing Doom, the Web is a part of the Internet consisting of hypertext pages full of text, pictures, and even sound.) One of the coolest things about the Web is that just about anyone can set up a Web page.

To do so, you first need to create a file with your content formatted using the HyperText Markup Language (HTML). HTML is a relatively simple scheme for conveying links, graphics, and text (for a sample, take a look at the figure below). You can create HTML files in several ways. While there are stand-alone HTML utilities and HTML add-ons for Word and WordPerfect, it's not that hard to do HTML coding by hand in a simple text editor such as Notepad. Several pages on the Web show you basic HTML coding; you just insert the appropriate codes in your text.


Once you've created your file, save it as plain ASCII text with the extension .htm. To preview your page, load it into Mosaic by selecting *File*•Open Local *File* (you don't need to be online).

You now need to put your HTML file where other Websters can find it. Most users rent space on a *Web server*; usually from an Internet service provider; charges vary wildly, depending on where you live, who you are, and what's on your page. Your provider will assign you a directory on the server and a Web address.

Now you must tell the world about your page. The easiest way is to include your Web page's address in your E-mail signature. Also check out the major directory pages (such as Yahoo) to find out how they add pages to their listings. Finally, you can post a message to the comp.infosystems.www.announce Usenet news group. For more information, see "Web Publishing Made Easy" (*Top* of the News, June).

Quick Tip

Want to search the entire World Wide Web for information on a specific topic, such as stocks or SCSI ports? Simply point your Web browser to Carnegie Mellon's Lycos search robot at http://lycos.cs.cmu.edu/. Enter your search terms, and Lycos will come up with a list of names and descriptions for applicable Web pages. One hint: Be sure to increase your search hit number from the default of 10 to get a good selection of pages. AT&T's ImagiNation Network, formerly The Sierra Network, is the place for you. You'll find more than 30 interactive games—including Mini-Golf and Paintball—that you play in real time with other subscribers. There are also role-playing games (with names like Shadow of Yserbius and Fates of Twinion); the more sedate will find parlor games like bridge, euchre, and checkers; and for the high rollers, there's an online casino where you can gamble for play money.

The subscribers I contacted online appeared to be almost cultishly addicted. For \$9.95 a month you get 5 free hours, after which you pay \$2.95 an hour. You can also sign up for 25 free hours online each month for \$49.95.

When the World Appears to Be Going Faster Than Your Modem

Whenever I log on to my local Internet service provider, I get a message that says I'm connected at 19.2 kilobits per second. That's great, but my modem's fastest speed is 14.4 kbps. What's going on? *Lillian Putten, Whittier, California*


A That message is from your modem, not your service provider. Your modem talks to your Internet service at 14.4 kbps, while it talks to your PC at 19.2 kbps. Why? Your modem uses error compression (V.42bis or MNP-5). As data comes from the Net over the phone line at 14.4 kbps, your modem uncompresses it, then passes the uncompressed data via the serial port to your PC. Because more data is going from your modem to your PC than from the phone line to your modem, your modem must communicate with your PC at a faster rate. **By Judy Heim**

Faster Windows with 32-bit File and Disk Access

All the articles I've read say that 32bit file and disk access greatly improve Windows' performance. We have several systems with IDE hard drives larger than 528MB, and we can access every megabyte but can't get 32-bit disk or file access to function. Can you give us some information on the problem?

Larry Phillips, Sugar Hill, Georgia

A You're right. These special Windows features can speed up disk operations considerably—although using them can be tricky. There's a lot of misinformation on this topic, so just to set the record straight: The 32-bit *disk* access feature accelerates performance by enabling Windows to bypass your system BIOS when Windows goes to disk, and in doing so reduces the time your CPU spends switching into real (that is, 8088-compatible) mode.

You generally get a much bigger boost from 32-bit *file* access, which re-

places DOS's old-fashioned 16-bit file system with a 32-bit system very similar to the one planned for Windows 95. Enabling 32-bit file access also automatically replaces whatever disk cache you're using with a superior one called Vcache. Used together, disk access and file access are greater than the sum of their parts, because your CPU never needs to flop into real mode when performing disk operations.

The biggest "gotcha" is that 32-bit file access is available only in Windows for Workgroups 3.11. And even if you're running WFW 3.11, you may still need to do some troubleshooting for this scheme to work. Here's a checklist of things to look for if you're having problems:

• Make sure you have a permanent Windows swap file, because temporary swap files cause Windows to switch back into real mode. To see which type you have, double-click Control Panel's *Enhanced* icon and click the *Virtual Memory* button. If you have a temporary swap file, click the *Change* button,

choose the Type *Permanent*, accept the recommended swap file size, and reboot as prompted.

• In the [386Enh] section of your system.ini file, look for one of these lines: NoEMMDriver=On or device=c:\nav\symevent.386. If either appears, put a semicolon at the beginning of the line.

• If you're using the popular print spooler Printcache, disable it and use Print Manager instead.

• Remove any 'subst' statements from your autoexec.bat file.

• In the [386Enh] section of your system.ini file, if you see the line 'device=*BLOCKDEV', replace it with these two lines:

device=ios.386

device=vxdldr.386

• Check that the rmm.d32 driver is in your windows\system directory. If it isn't, you'll need to load it from your original copy of WFW 3.11.

• Make sure there's a line for Windows' ifshlp.sys driver within your config.sys file. But if you don't have one, adding the line device=c:\windows\ifshlp.sys should do the trick.

Follow these steps, and WFW 3.11's 32-bit file access should work, although I've probably overlooked some of the more obscure problems and solutions. If you discover any, let me know.

Note that you can adjust the amount of memory used by Vcache in the Virtual Memory dialog box (see FIGURE 1), although the default recommendation will probably be fine. Also, Vcache uses *write caching* by default, which speeds disk writes by temporarily writing data to memory instead of to disk—but at the same time, it slightly increases the possibility of data corruption if your system crashes. To turn off write caching for drives C:, D:, and F:, for example, add the line ForceLaryOff=CDF to Windows' system.ini file.

Now for your 32-bit *disk* access problem. First, some older hard drives are simply incompatible with this feature.

Second, with IDE hard drives, 32-bit disk access works only if the drive is hooked to your primary IDE interface (the interface assigned IRQ 14). Third, you can't enable 32-bit disk access for IDE CD-ROM drives, and if you hook one to the same interface your hard drive uses, you'll disable 32bit disk access for the hard drive, too.

Most likely, however, your problem lies in the size of your drives. Any IDE drive over 528MB is considered to be an *Enhanced IDE* drive (see "Enhanced IDE: Myths and Realities," *Hardware*, March 1995). To access the entire drive, you must have one of the following: an Enhanced IDE system BIOS, an Enhanced IDE interface eard that bypasses the system BIOS, or special hard disk setup software (the least reliable option). Judging by your question, you've already implemented one of these solutions.

Now, the reason you can't enable 32-bit disk access is that Windows has its own way of detecting drive sizes. When it detects the big drive, it thinks it's receiving bad information and prevents you from using the 32-bit disk access option. But there's a solution: a replacement 32-bit driver downloaded from your drive manufacturer's BBS. For example, Western Digital offers a driver called wdcdrv.386, which you enable by adding the line device=wdcdrv.386 to your system.ini file and adding the driver itself to your windows\system directory. The wdcdrv.386 driver works for more than one hard disk, as long as there's a Western Digital drive present. Micro House International and Ontrack Computer Systems offer "universal" replacement drivers for drives that have used these companies' hard disk setup software, which comes bundled with drives from many manufacturers.

Quite a mess, isn't it? All I can say is that Microsoft promises that Windows 95 will remedy the situation entirely. We shall see.

Hard Disk-to-Hard Disk Backups?

Q Now that hard disk prices have dropped, is it smart to buy a second hard drive and use it as a backup device? *Gregory Andracke, New York City* An interesting question, since a medium-size hard disk costs about the same per megabyte as a tape drive and a couple of tapes. And backing up one hard disk with another would be faster.

Nonetheless, using tape is smarter. You'll want a copy you can put in a safe place in case of fire or other disaster. Also, if your machine goes down, you won't be able to access your data on the backup hard disk unless you install that disk in another system, a process that is often painful and data-threatening. Tape, on the other hand, enables you to restore data—file by file if you wish—to any machine with a compatible tape drive. Perhaps most important of all, tape lets you archive any number of files you need to keep but don't want cluttering your hard disk.



I needed to find some way to make a batch file pause for a few seconds before it moved onto the next command. So I created one.

Our company's mail server had a problem: If the power went off briefly in the middle of the night, the DOSbased mail server would be up and trying to send and receive mail before the NetWare-based file server was ready for it. So I created a program called Delay and put it in the mail server's autoexce.bat file. Delay simply waits a set number of seconds, holding up the batch file until its count is finished or a user presses <Esc>.

Editor's note: This program comes in handy for any batch file that needs a timed delay—whether it's needed to allow a disk drive to spin up to speed or a modem to connect. The program

counts out a delay in seconds, constantly updating a count on the display.

Sheong wrote the original program in Turbo Pascal. To make the listing useful to more readers. I've translated it into QBASIC, an interpreted language that comes with every version of MS-DOS since 5.0 (but not with current versions of IBM's PC-DOS). To create the program, simply copy the commands in FIGURE 1 to an ASCII text file called delay.bas. Because of QBASIC's limitations, you need to place two commands in your batch file to use the program. The first is set delay=n, where n is the length of the delay in seconds; for instance, set delay=60 will give you a 1-minute delay. The other command, qbasic /run delay.bas, runs the program. (If delay,bas is in another directory, you have to give the path to it, as in qbasic /run c:\utility\delay.bas.)

Sheong's original program has some definite advantages over the OBASIC version, so I've made the compiled .exe file (which doesn't require Pascal) available on PC World Online, (Look for the file delay.zip.) With this version, one simple command, delay n, where *n* is the number of seconds, can replace the pair of lines that you must use for OBASIC. And if you put delay.exe into a directory in your autoexec.bat's path statement, you won't have to include its path with the command. And what's more, this version does not flash a blue screen as it loads, it sets errorlevel to a nonzero value if the user aborts the delay, and (unlike the QBASIC program) it doesn't leave you in the QBASIC interpreter if you hit <Ctrl>-<Break> while the program is running. For the benefit of any curious Pascal programmers, delay.zip includes Sheong's source code for your examination.

Extracting Lost Excel Spreadsheets

If one of your Excel 4.0 workbooks becomes corrupted, you may lose access to all the worksheets within it. Here's how I managed to recover my worksheets after Excel reported a bad workbook file.

First, I opened a new worksheet file in the same directory as the damaged one. Next, in cell A1, I entered the formula =[workbook.xiw]sheet.xisla1, where workbook and sheet were the names of my workbook file and one of its worksheets. I then clicked the lower-left corner of the cell and dragged it, first across and then down, until it covered at least as many cells as the data in the original worksheet. With those cells still selected, I first ran Edit • Copy and then selected F.dit • Paste Special. This sequence brought up the Paste Special dialog box, where I selected Values and clicked OK. I then repeated this procedure for each of the spreadsheets in the corrupted workbook to recover my data.

Editor's note: A variation of this trick will work with Excel 5.0. The only difference is that your formula should read =[workbook.xls]sheet[a1.

There's no surefire way to save a corrupted file—if the information is gone, it's gone—but importing data to a new file is always worth a try. After all, if an important data file is corrupted and you don't have a backup, you have a lot to gain and virtually nothing to lose, as long as you make a copy of your original file before attempting to recover data from it.

If this procedure works, you'll still lose your formulas, formatting, and charts—only your data will be saved. What's more, every cell that's blank in the corrupted file will contain a zero in the copy. You can eliminate these zeros by replacing the original formula with =if(not(isblank([worksheet.xts'ia1, "m]), [worksheet.xtw]sheet.xts'ia1,"m]. If you fail to recover your data using Excel, and you think it's still buried in a partially corrupted file, you might want to try the importing functions in other programs such as Word for Windows, 1-2-3, or Quattro Pro. One of them may be tolerant enough to let some errors pass, allowing you to get to the data that's still intact.

No Need to Confirm

Star-Dot-Star is one of the best parts of the magazine, but I found a mistake in the tip "Switching Sounds" [February]. In this tip, you say it's necessary to disable the copy command's confirmation message if you're copying files through a batch file in DOS 6.2 or higher. In fact, the confirmation is the default only if you use copy from a DOS prompt. In a batch file, copy automatically skips the confirmation. David Larson.

Editor's note: You're right. In DOS 6.2 and later, when you run copy from the DOS command prompt, it asks you to confirm any command that overwrites an existing file. (You can override this default by specifying the /y parameter on the command line or including /y in the copycmd environment variable.) But when you use copy in a batch file, the default is just the opposite. Copy skips the confirmation unless you use the command line parameter /-y or include this parameter in the copycmd environment variable.

Room to Expand?

Some DOS programs need expanded memory, and others work best without it. I found I had to create batch files that did one thing if I had expanded memory and another if I didn't—for instance, you probably don't want to load Windows with expanded memory on.

That's why I created emmtest.com, a program that checks for expanded memory and controls your batch files accordingly. It returns an errorlevel of 0 if there's an expanded memory manager in the system, and a nonzero value if there isn't. Emmtest.com works by trying to "open" the driver as if it were a file called emmxxxx0 an operation that, according to standard MS-DOS conventions, works if there's an expanded memory manager around. If it's successful, you have expanded memory.

Editor's note: This simple but useful program makes it easy to test for the presence of an expanded memory manager. If you are on PC World Online, you can download emmtest.com directly from our library. Otherwise, you can create the program by entering the text shown in FIGURE 2 into an ASCII text file called emmtest.scr. Then, in the same directory, type debug < emmtest.scr at the DOS prompt. Debug will create the file emmtest.com. The batch file in FIGURE 3 demonstrates how to use the program.

Finding Fonts

In "Clean Up Windows Litter" [Star-Dot-Star, March], Betty deCarlo recommended moving fonts out of the windows\system directory. She said to edit win.ini to reflect the new location, but I can't find a reference to font location in win.ini. When I moved the fonts, some applications couldn't find them. What's the correct procedure? Constance H. Shutt,

Editor's response: Several readers have asked this. Each entry in win.ini's [fonts] section contains a file name on the right side of the equal sign. By default, Windows looks for these files in your windows\system directory. If you move a font from windows\system to another directory, you must provide a full path with its file name, as in c:\f*filename.*fot, so Windows still knows where to look. To avoid enlarging win. .ini too much—it can't be more than about 64K in length—use a short name for the font directory (in the example above, I've used c:\f, for fonts).

Also consider which font files deCarlo suggested you move. All TrueType fonts on your hard disk, active or not, are .ttf files. When you add a font to the active list with Control Panel's Fonts tool, Windows creates an .fot file, which it deletes automatically when you remove the font (the option to 'Delete Font File From Disk' refers to the .ttf file). Both file types usually land in windows\system. In short, moving .fot files requires editing win.ini. You can put a .ttf file in any directory, as long as you tell Control Panel's Add Fonts dialog box what directory that is. **By Brett Glass**

Twisted Games Behind the Carnival Tent

our boss asked you to stay late to be sure that overseas fax comes in. But there's no reason you have to crunch numbers or run reports while you wait. Why not take advantage of the empty office and check out some multimedia entertainment? You'll need something that's simple, unproductive, and utterly meaningless to pass the time. As this month's guest columnist, I'll help you spend your stolen time wisely.

A Blow to the Head

Frivolous entertainment is just what you'll get with Take Your Best Shot, the latest offering from the folks at 7th Level, who completely wasted our time last year with Monty Python's Complete Waste of Time. This time, 7th Level eschewed the search for intergalactic success in favor of a trio of classic distractions featuring slapstick animation from Bill Plympton. You may have seen his characters on MTV.

The three games include Head Shot, a version of the old Breakout and Arkanoid games that features animated heads you blow off the screen with a silver cannonball. Hot Shot is a sick version of Pong in which you bounce the puck off a fatuous head; Line Shot is a digital version of the old baseball dart game you played as a kid.

The subtitle of Best Shot is "Twisted Arcade Games for Twisted Minds," but if your brainpan is really curved, you ought to spend some time behind the curtains at The Residents' Freak Show. Blame it on the old days when I was fascinated by county fair performers such as the Turtle Boy and the Amazing Ape Lady. Or maybe it was the stint I did as a circus roustabout. But I find there's nothing as fascinating as a carnival sideshow.

The Freak Show opens with a roadside carnival that rivals the one in Todd Browning's 1932 cult classic film, Freaks. Step right up as Tex the Barker introduces you to Wanda the Worm Woman, Jelly lack the Boneless Boy, and other performers and human oddities. Then, when Tex isn't looking, slip behind the tent flaps for some real ad-

venture. Learn what goes on inside the mind of Jelly Jack—if you dare. The artwork, animation, sound effects, and odd musical bits make this collection of digital strangeness as entertaining as it is eerily mesmerizing.

Armed for Revenge

It takes more than stories to interest some people, though. If you're a Doom or a Steven Segal fan, you probably think plot just gets in the way. In that case, Descent may be for you. Descent is another in a rash of graphical 3-D games that cast you as the hero. This time, you're a renegade pilot hired to undertake mercenary rescue and revenge on behalf of the Post Terrain Mineral Corporation. You live in a scary Third Wave future where the bad guys fly ships bristling with arms.

The graphics and flight control are nothing short of fantastic, although you can easily lose your bearings in the deep mine shafts because of 360-degree rotations. But if you like to fly fast, shoot faster, and die in a hurry, download the shareware version from Compu-Serve (go gaming) or PC World Online, and go for a brief tour of duty.

If futuristic combat isn't your style, you could try the Atari 2600 Action



Pack, where the action exists somewhere in the creaky and cobwebstrewn neural pathways of the Pong generation. While Take Your Best Shot uses old games as a launch pad, this collection of arcade nostalgia puts an Atari 2600 right in your Windows PC.

In The Residents' Freak Show, you cross paths with strange individuals like Jelly Jack the Boneless Boy.

If you're desperate for a blast from the past, you'd be better off tuning in to *Nick at Nite* or the local classic rock station. (Use headphones, please.) The Atari 2600 was the game machine of its day, and I spent more than a few hours of my reckless youth mired in its electronic clutches. But looking at these games now, you've got to wonder how we ever got interested in the first place. If you think it might be cool to share these classics with your kids, be sure to hide the Nintendo and the Sega first.

While old video games try for a comeback, comic books are enjoying a renaissance. Anyone can watch the X-Men on TV, but with Comic Creator you can draw your own graphic adventure. Start with one of ten heroes such as Arca, who reads minds and uses the power of persuasion to defeat enemies.





PULL UP MICROSOFT WINE GUIDE when you're wondering which vintage will go perfectly with dinner.

You get a full slate of bad guys too, like the lovable Pustule, who comes in a becoming shade of infectious green and vomits acid that, according to his biography, "makes his opponents ill." I bet it doesn't do much for his friends, either.

Cast these characters in settings ranging from cities to swamps, throw in bystanders and weapons, then click the Idea Dice for suggestions on where to go next. You can save your story to disk, or print it and start your own Marvel empire. The great artwork and endless possibilities will appeal to anyone who's ever dropped three bucks on a mutant adventure.

All right. By this time you've done your duty. The fax came in and all looks well. Time to head home, relax in an armchair with a book, and enjoy a glass of wine. If you're unsure what bouquet goes with the latest Grisham thriller, consult Microsoft Wine Guide. As a

guide to everything from choosing the right wine at dinner to starting your own cellar, this multimedia tour is invaluable.

The disc takes you from the vine to the finished bottle, giving you the reasons behind the different flavors in the world's great wine regions. You can search 6000 vintages for the wine that matches your criteria. You can narrow searches by variety, food, and star rating, for example—but unfortunately not by price. You can, however, build and store your own list of personal favorites. Now this is time well spent.



ate at night, deep inside my computer, TIFFs were mating with GIFs, multiplying at an alarming rate. There was no other explanation—by morning, another 10MB of new graphics files had appeared on my hard disk.

Well, maybe that isn't the only explanation. More likely, every Tom, Dick, and word processor was dumping a ton of clip art into my system. WinWord added some, as did Microsoft Publisher, Quattro Pro, and CorelDraw. And I've downloaded plenty of pictures from BBSs myself. So I shouldn't have been surprised when I recently discovered I had 1562 clip art files taking up over 30MB of hard disk space. These files included two dozen Santa Claus drawings and more than 60 graphic renditions of a computer.

Just Say No

Now when I install a new application, I seriously consider turning off the 'Install Clip Art?' option. I usually don't, however, because a good piece of clip art is worth its weight in magnetic oxides (who knows, there might be a better Santa Claus image somewhere). So my strategy now is to examine the clip art once it's installed and weed out what I don't like.

Don't bother trying this with Windows' File Manager, though—if you can't see the art, you can't judge it. Programs like Outside In and PC Tools' File Manager replacement let you look at your pictures, and they'll do in a pinch. But the best tools I've found for trimming and organizing my clip art collection are a couple of shareware masterpieces.

My favorite of these is ThumbsPlus, a \$55 product by Cerious Software. What first attracted me to ThumbsPlus was its ability to scan my entire hard disk, find all my graphics files, and display 63 of them at a time as tiny thumbnails (I use 1024 by 768 resolution). In minutes I was able to locate and organize each and every picture on my drive, browsing through hundreds of thumbnails, viewing them full size when necessary, and immediately comparing images. I quickly got rid of redundant Santas and dragged and dropped files into more-appropriate directories. ThumbsPlus handles more than 21 file formats, including Kodak Photo CD images and True Type fonts. And it can convert your files into 7 of those formats.

However, what I really like about ThumbsPlus is how it uses DOS directories. I tend to group files of various types into directories by content or project, and ThumbsPlus makes it easy. Not only can I move and copy files, but I can create new directories and change the volume label on floppies. Try it for yourself; it's on PC World Online as thmpls.exe.

If I weren't so enamored of directories, I'd use JASC's Media Center. It's even more powerful than Thumbs-Plus, and at \$39, it's cheaper. In addition to supporting more than 30 image formats, Media Center catalogs and plays Windows sound and music files (.wav and .mid), as well as video and animation files (.avi and .flc). And when it comes to the art of converting graphics file formats, Media Center beats ThumbsPlus hands down: It offers 24 conversion formats, compared with ThumbsPlus's 7.

Media Center uses an album metaphor to get you organized, letting you gather together, say, your holiday files, independent of what directory they're in. You can add descriptions and keywords to your pictures, making future searches much easier. And since Media Center remembers where your files are, it's great for tracking clip art collections on CD-ROM. Grab yourself a copy on PC World Online, where it's available as mc20.zlp.
